





## Farm Safety Week, July 24-30

Rural traffic accidents in 1965 took a toll of 552 lives throughout the state of Mississippi while injuring an additional 5,331 persons and causing estimated property damage of over \$6 million. Only the county, Montgomery, was spared a rural traffic fatality while Tunica County, with 20 fatalities, led the rural harvest of lives on our road-

Prentiss County recorded 108 rural traffic accidents with 4 deaths, 55 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$3,100.

These figures released in the spring of 1966 by the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol point up the need for enthusiastic support of the various safety campaigns that will be a part of the observance of Farm Safety Week, July 24-30.

In signing a proclamation for statewide observance of the special week, Governor Paul B. Johnson urged Mississippians to also take steps to help curb the rural accidents other than traffic which last year accounted for 72 deaths in the state. Tractor mishaps were a leading form of this fatality run-down.

Most county Farm Bureaus in Mississippi are joining in the observance this year with special activities designed to focus attention on the accident problem, according to Harold Cummings, Safety Director of the Mississippi Farm Bureau

In addition to the statewide proclamation by the governor, Cummings said many county Board of Supervisors and Mayors of municipalities are also issuing proclamations calling public attention to the need for additional safety efforts to save

Among major projects of the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation to aid safety is the campaign to install slow moving vehicle emblems on the rear of all farm and industrial equipment that share highways at speeds of 30 miles an hour or less. Over 7,400 emblems have been distributed in the state by the Farm Bureau.

#### Horn Fly Control

One of the cheapest and most effective methods of controlling hornflies on dairy cattle is to use a backrubber treated with 2/3-cupful ciodrin (Simax) liquid mixed with a gallon of diesel fuel.

Backrubbers should be retreated when flies again begin bothering the dairy cows. This is usually in three to four weeks.
