## Nine Raids Held Here Saturday

Sheriff Gerald Green said Wednesday that Saturday's liquor raids were the most intensive in this county during the past week and further raids have yielded little results.

There were nine raids Saturday afternoon conducted by Sheriff Green, Deputies Nona Chaffin and Bonnie Knight and Third District Constable Paul Short. They were assisted by three assistant inspectors, Bert Duncan, Wood Stringer and Hank Waycaster, and state highway patrolmen, John McCutley, Hubert McDaniels, Charlie Goforth, John Kerr, Jessie Coke, C. D. Curtin, Johnny Price, Mitchell McWhirter and Johnny McMasters.

The group fanned out from the court house and went to suspected places. The biggest haul was from Harold Loyd Brinkley of Route 2, Booneville. Officers confiscated 21 pints and 63 half-pints of whiskey and a half pint of vodka. They also confiscated a 1966 pick-up and released it and most of the whiskey to the state, keeping only enough for evidence. Second District Justice of the Peace Coy Yates set his bond at \$2,000.

## Fourteen Species Of Tree Seedlings Are Offered Landowners

Fourteen species of tree seedlings are now being offered to Mississippi landowners by the Mississippi Forestry Commission for the 1966-67 planting season according to Prentiss County Area Forester, B. K. Killebrew.

The Forestry Commission began taking orders for seedlings on July 1. The sale continues until October 15. Shipment of seedlings will begin about December 15, with orders being filled on a first-come first-served basis.

Area Forester, Killebrew, said that the following species are available: Loblolly, Slash, Longleaf Pines; small amounts of Yellow Poplar, Sweetgum, Sycamore, Baldcypress, Black Locust, Green Ash, Red Cedar, Cherrybark Oak, Nuttall Oak and Cottonwood.

A/F Killebrew urged that landowners get their orders for seedlings in early while the supply is sufficient to meet the demand.

Landowners may receive one thousand trees at no cost except for the 35 cent delivery fee. Orders in excess of one thousand seedlings will cost \$4.50 per thousand plus the 35 cent per thousand delivery fee.

Applications are available from any Forestry Commission employee and from the County Agent's Office.

## Local Advisory Committee Is Formed For Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway

A local Advisory Committee to help encourage and promote the construction of the proposed Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway was set up here Friday in a luncheon meeting at the Town Motel Restaurant.

R. W. (Dub) Lawley, Jr., of Columbus, administrative assistant for the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, was present to bring the group up to date on the status of the Waterway. He said that similar committees are being formed in towns along the waterway route to help keep up public interest in the project and to push for its completion.

Mr. Lawley said that the Corps of Engineers has completed its report on a two-year study of the project and submitted it to the Chief's Office of the Corps of Engineers in Washington for review. Congressman Thomas G. Abernethy stated last week that the report was believed to be favorable and that it was possible some money may be appropriated before the end of the year.

Mr. Lawley showed slides at the Friday meeting which illustrated much of the proposed waterway, and showed large industries which selected their locations chiefly because of navigable waterways.

Economists believe the waterway will speed the Southeast's economic development by attracting additional heavy industry - not lured from other areas but new capital investment generated by the availability of low-cost water transportation.

Other benefits would be the provision of bulk transportation of grain, coal and fertilizer, with resulting lower costs to the users. Mr. Lawley pointed out. Also the pools created by the dams on the waterway will be a boon to water sports and outdoor recreation.

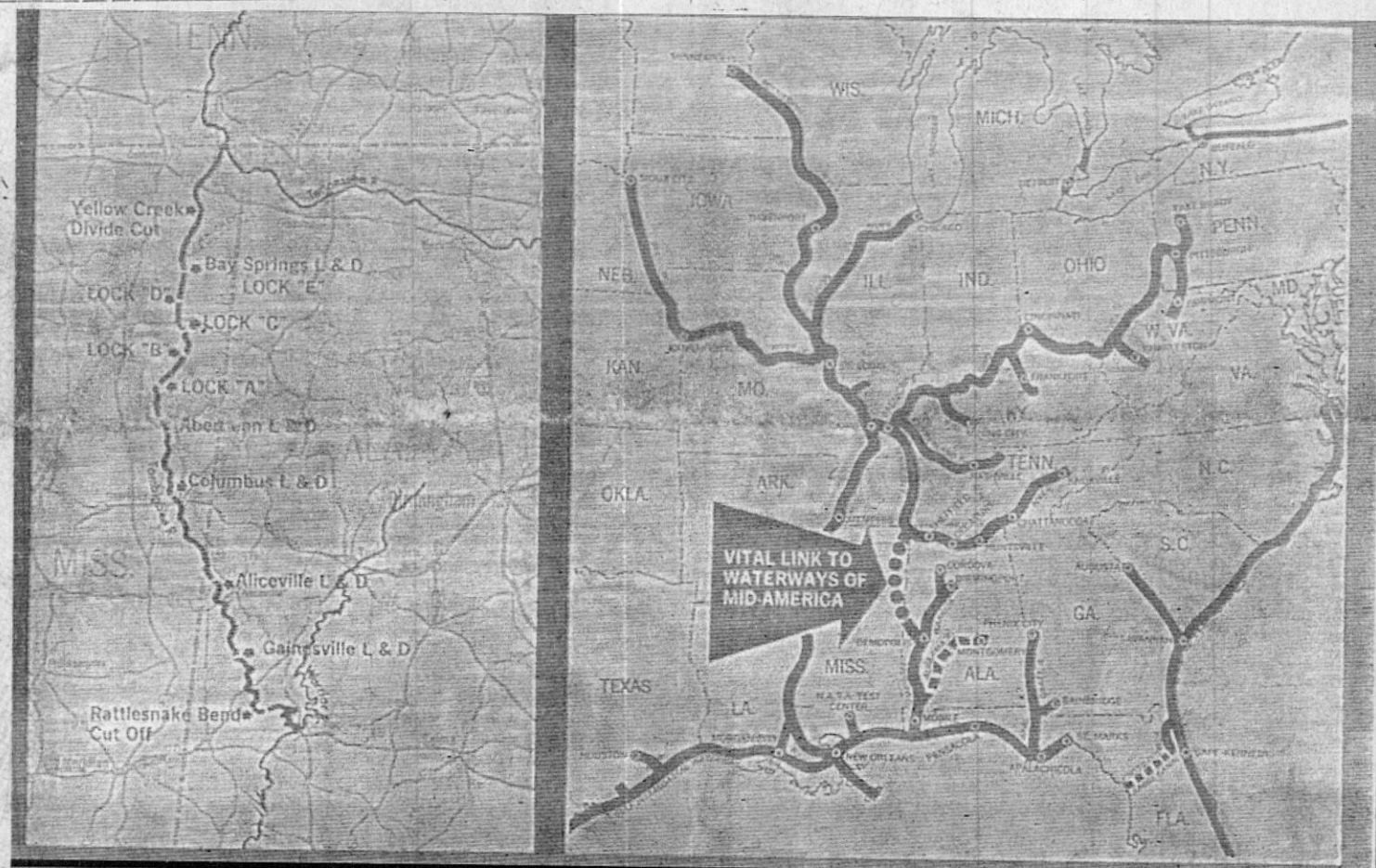
Total cost of the project is estimated at \$281,025,000, most of which would be spent between Amory and Pickwick. To overcome a 341-foot difference in water levels from a normal pool elevation of 73 feet at Demopolis, Ala., to an elevation of 414 feet at Pickwick, a series of locks and dams will be

built. The northernmost dam and lock is to be located at Bay Springs, and it will be by far the largest, raising the level there to the same as Pickwick.

All of the locks are to be of standard dimensions - 110 feet wide and 600 feet long - which is sufficient to permit most barge tows to pass in a single locking, being able to handle eight barges and tow, Mr. Lawley said.

The waterway would save more than 800 miles in water distance from the Tennessee River ports to the Port of Mobile and the Gulf of Mexico. Mr. Lawley said that studies indicate that the need for the waterway is such that if it were in existence now, it would already be operating at full capacity.

## Contract Approved For Wheeler Road

The State Aid Road Division has announced its approval of a contract awarded on July 5, 1966, by the Prentiss County Board of Supervisors, providing for the improvement of the Wheeler Road. The announcement was made by the State Aid Engineer, Frank T. Moore.

The contract, designated as Project No. SAP 59 (18), provides for 1.854 miles of grade, drain, base, and double bituminous surface treatment, and was awarded to William Russell Bonds of Juka, Mississippi, the low bidder, in the amount of \$74,687.00.

Bowyer & Johnson Construction Company of Jackson, Tennessee, and Worsham Brothers of Corinth, Mississippi, also submitted bids on this project.

The project is located in Supervisor Charles M. Gordon's district. Engineering supervision will be handled by Mr. Leland B. Cook, County Engineer.

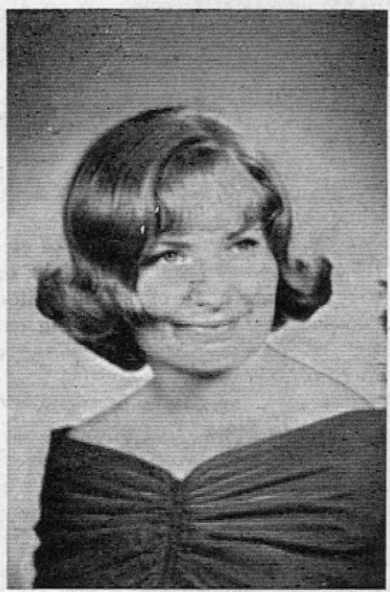

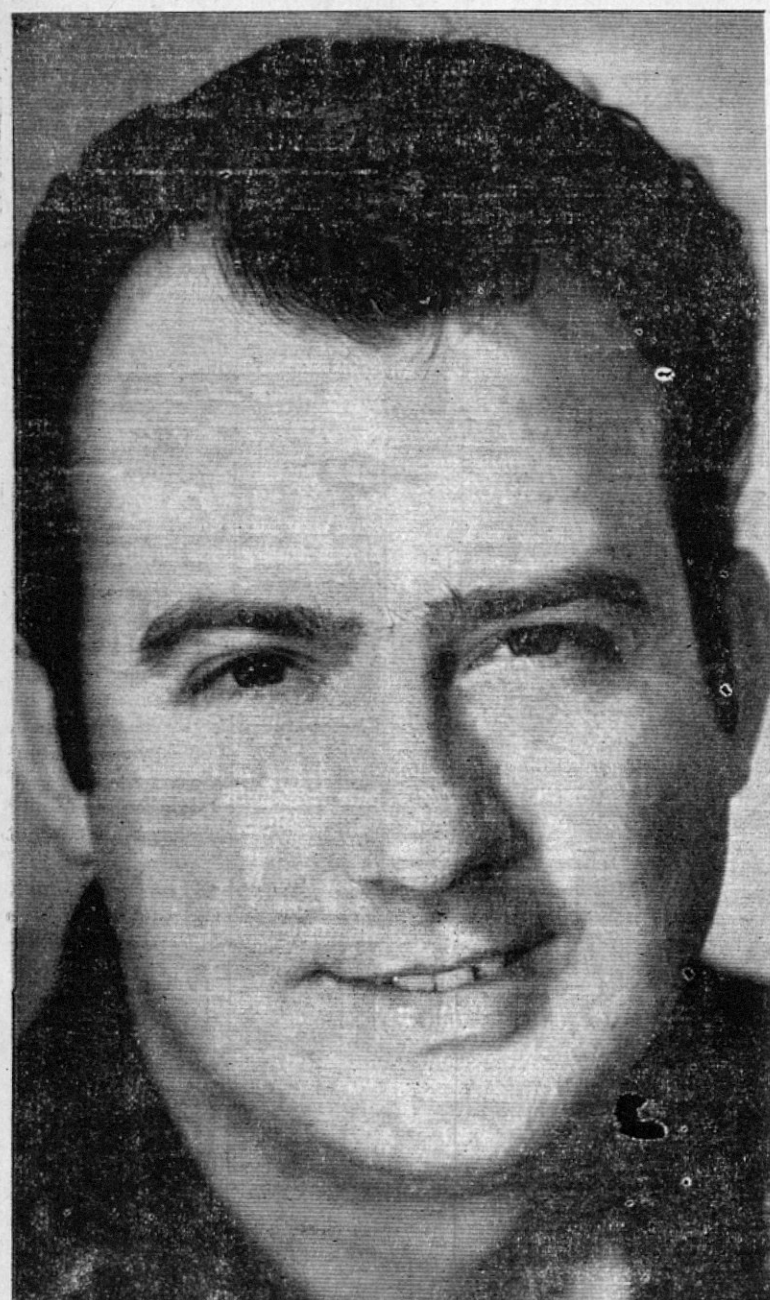

#### Cotton Insects

Spider mites are a real problem in some areas. Heavy "spotty" infestations have been found. Keep a close watch for boll weevils. The first hatch of this pest has been found in several counties.

Now is also a good time to check up on your ground spray rigs. Make sure that the nozzles are not more than eight to ten inches above the cotton plant.

Bulk Spreading  
Lots of folks are considering bulk spreading as a method of getting

fertilizer out on their pastures. This method could save two ways: First by cutting down labor requirements that would be needed for use of small equipment; and then there is the saving in cost of bulk materials rather than sacked fertilizer.

If you are going to use bulk spreading, consider providing a "flagging service" to the person doing the spreading. This will help make sure that the entire area is covered without strips skipped.

\*\*\*\*\*

#### Lime

Application of lime is still the number one soil fertility practice on most farms. Soil with a pH of less than 5.5 will never produce enough to make the kind of profit you should have from row crops. Pasture land should have a pH of 6.0 or above for higher profits.

Lime can be applied any time spreader trucks can get over the fields. It will not injure crops. Some suggested places to apply lime now are:

Skip row cotton areas, permanent pastures, where land forming has been completed and before chiseling or plowing, diverted acres, areas being fallowed for fall planting and temporary grazing areas to be planted or already planted.

#### Horn Fly Control

One of the cheapest and most effective methods of controlling hornflies on dairy cattle is to use a backrubber treated with 2/3-cupful ciodrin (Simax) liquid mixed with a gallon of diesel fuel.

Backrubbers should be retreated when flies again begin bothering the dairy cows. This is usually in three to four weeks.

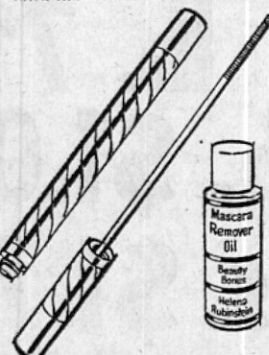

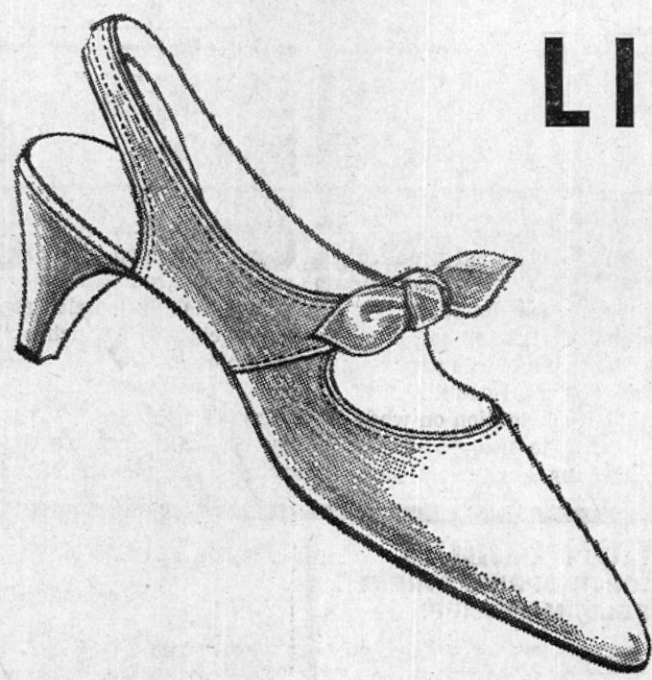

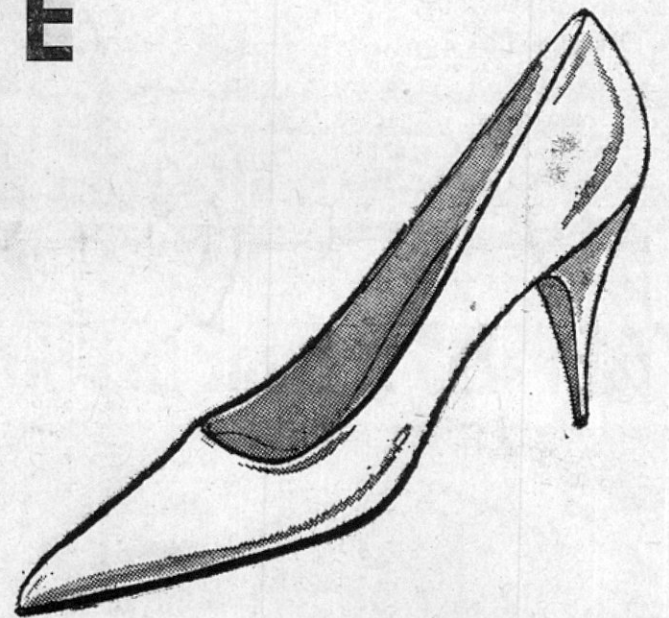

This day came on to be considered by the Board of Supervisors of Prentiss County, the matter of the assessment of personal property for the year 1966 and of real property for the year 1966 and it appearing affirmatively to this Board that John M. Morrow, Tax Assessor of said County, has completed the assessment of both real and personal property for the said year; that said Assessor filed the real and personal property assessment rolls with the clerk of this Board of Supervisors on or before the 5th of July, 1966 as provided by law; and that said assessor made an affidavit and appended it to each of said rolls; that said affidavit showed that he had faithfully endeavored to ascertain and assess all the persons and property in said county; that he did not omit any person or thing, and did not place upon, or accept, an under-valuation of any property through fear, favor or partiality; that he required every taxpayer to make the oath required to be taken by the person rendering a list of his taxable property, wherever possible:

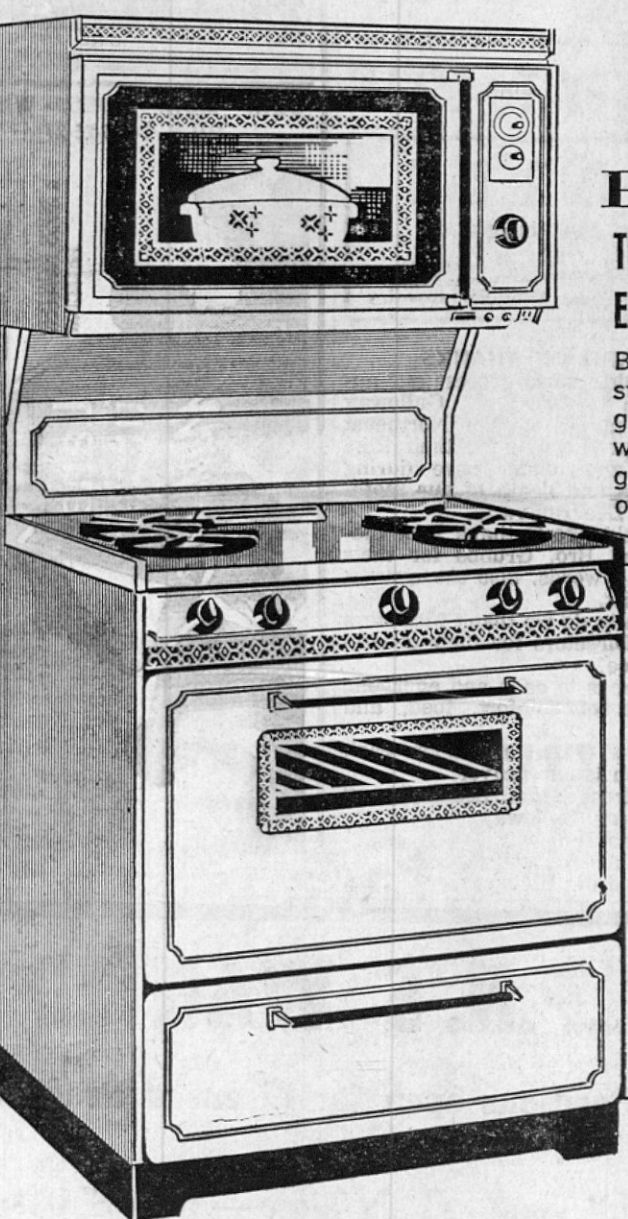

## Prentiss ASCS County News

Cotton farmers who are taking part in the 1966 cotton program will begin getting final program payments soon after August 1, 1966, Willie Hatfield, Chairman, Prentiss Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today.

The payments represent any unpaid part of the estimated diversion payment and the additional price support to growers who voluntarily signed up and then met applicable provisions of the program. Growers could request that half of the estimated diversion payment be made in advance at the time of the sign-up last spring.

The diversion payments are figured at 10.5 cents a pound on the projected yield of the acreage diverted at the level signed up. The price support payments amount to 9.42 cents a pound on the projected yield of the acres planted within the farm's domestic allotment (65 percent of the effective allotment). The payments will raise return from the 1966 upland cotton crop substantially. Cotton farmers on the larger farms took part in the 1966 program by reducing their cotton plantings by at least 12.5 percent below the farm's effective allotment, putting the diverted acres into an approved conserving use, and meeting other program provisions. Acreage for diversion could be 12.5, 25, or 35 percent.

Growers on small farms (with allotments not over 10 acres or with a projected production of 3,600 pounds or less) could receive payment without having to reduce plantings provided they signed a program application. If the operator chose to reduce the acreage on such a farm, an additional diversion payment was available on the acres actually diverted at the level signed up.

Cotton growers who signed up and participated in the program are also eligible for price support loans on all the cotton produced on the farm; the loans average 21 cents a pound for Middling 1-inch cotton at average location.

## Northeast Jr. College Awarded Grants

The Northeast Mississippi Junior College Board of Trustees has approved a program in Adult Basic Education, under Title 11 B of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, for a five county area.

Northeast will serve only as the coordinating agency for the program and all classes will be conducted at facilities provided within each of the five counties.

Growers had the opportunity to request that half the estimated diversion payments be made in advance at sign-up time in the spring, and where this was done the payment now available represents the balance of the diversion payment due and all of the price support payment earned under the program. The payments will raise return from the 1966 feed grain crops substantially. Farmers participating by diverting acreage under the program are also eligible for loans on their entire 1966 crops of corn, barley, and grain sorghum.

The diversion payment for shifting part of the farm's feed grain base to a conserving use does not apply to the first 20 percent diversion except on farms with small bases. The price support payments are earned on the projected production from the acreage scheduled for planting up to 50 percent of the farm's total feed grain base for the farm; one or more of the feed grains — corn, grain sorghums, or barley — could be planted on the acreage, or soybeans could be planted in lieu of a feed grain. These price support payments are assured no matter what disposition is made of the crop.

There should be no delay in the prompt receipt of the payment where the diverted acreage and program provisions have been met. The payment will be made after the application form is completed and signed.

Farmers are also reminded that, even though program payments are to be made in the near future, the approved conserving practices are expected to be carried out on designated diverted acreage throughout the remainder of the year.

## HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

### BUTTER UP YOUR OUTDOOR COOKING

This is the season for outdoor fun, and more and more families are taking advantage of the nation's recreation facilities these days. Join the fun, and when you plan outdoor meals, include dairy foods. When you pack up for a picnic in a nearby park or a longer camping trip, be sure to include butter in your food supplies. Pack butter in a covered jar in the ice chest, along with milk, cheese, fruits and vegetables, all the

things you want to keep cool and fresh until mealtime. Butter adds glorious flavor to all your meals and snacks.

Hamburgers are first choice for charcoal broiling, and butter helps make them even more delicious. Treat the family to grilled burgers on toasted buttered buns.

Those herbs and spices in your cupboard can be combined with butter to give a gourmet touch to hot breads. Try Brown-and-Serve French Bread with some Robust Butters, zesty with chili powder,

garlic powder, chives or Parmesan cheese. Crusty French bread is delicious heated and lavished with plain butter; it's twice as good prepared and toasted and spread with these flavored butters.

If you have a camp reflector oven use it to bake the Brown-and-Serve bread. Prepare the butter spreads at home to save time and take them to the picnic site in your ice chest. The amount is sufficient for 3 loaves of bread. Brush the top of each loaf with one of the Robust Butters. Bake and slice the bread; serve with assorted butters for spreading. For Cheese-Garlic Butter: blend 1/2 cup (1 stick) softened butter, 1/4 teaspoon powder, 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese. For Chili-Olive Butter: blend 1/2 cup

(1 stick) softened butter, 1/4 teaspoon chili powder, 2 tablespoons finely chopped ripe olives. For Chive Butter: blend 1/2 cup (1 stick) softened butter, 1 tablespoon minced chives and 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce. Each recipe makes about 1/2 cup.

Butter and corn just naturally go together. While sweet corn is available at the peak of flavor, succulent and tender, enjoy it often. Have a corn roast or cook it by your own favorite recipe; any way it's cooked, serve corn on the cob with plenty of fresh sweet creamery butter, salt and pepper.

P popcorn is a natural for family snacking at any season. These summer days, take popcorn along on family outings. Pack popcorn in airtight containers. It takes little space, but remember it doubles in size when popped. Add zest with flavored melted butter, poured hot over the popcorn for the kids or add garlic or chili flavor for more sophisticated teen-age tastes. Get out the guitar, have a sing-along, and pass the popcorn! With plenty of icy-cold milk or milk coolers to drink, it's a great vacation time snack.

For Parmesan Popcorn: In a saucepan melt 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter; add 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Pour over 1 1/2-2 quarts hot freshly popped popcorn. Toss.

For Cheddar Popcorn: In a saucepan melt 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter; add 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Pour over 1 1/2-2 quarts hot freshly popped popcorn. Toss.

For Garlic Popcorn: In a saucepan melt 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter; add 1/8 teaspoon garlic salt and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Pour over 1 1/2-2 quarts hot freshly popped popcorn. Toss.

For Chili Popcorn: In a saucepan melt 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter; add 1/2 teaspoon chili powder and 1 teaspoon salt. Pour over 1 1/2-2 quarts hot freshly popped popcorn. Toss.

Wherever you go for outdoor meals, take butter along. It will give its golden goodness to steaks, burgers, or chicken broiled on the charcoal grill... to baked potatoes cooked in foil... and to all kinds of garden vegetables. Corn on the cob is first on the list of summer vegetables that taste better with butter. Its fresh natural flavor also enhances fresh garden peas, green beans, tender young beets and other favorites.

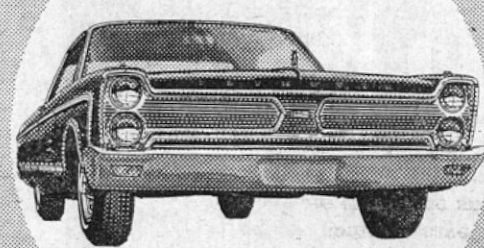
