James E. Rambo Seeks Police Chief Office

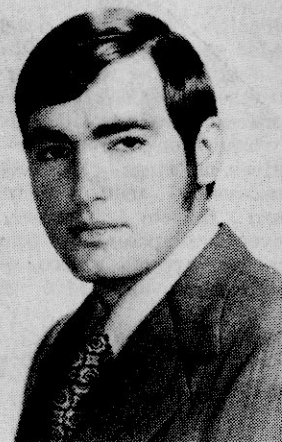

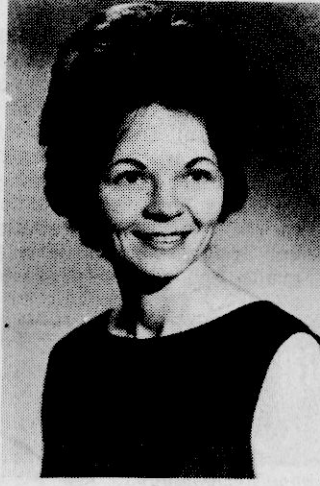
nights are: Marion Corley Foreign Missionary; J. C. Wells, Home Missionary; and Therman Bryant state missionary; respectively.

A recent best seller tells the story of a seagull who learned the secret of perfect flight. Unlike his brothers who were content to spend their lives in the dreary search for food, Jonathan Livingston Seagull learned to soar and to ride the wind waves from one continent to another.

And as he widened his horizons, Jonathan grieved for his brothers who had never lifted their minds above the daily endless quest to fill their stomachs.

Education is much like Jonathan's ability to fly. Knowledge gives us wings-- it deepens our appreciation, enables us to understand and to see truth more clearly, to look at the past and thereby be able to evaluate the present and perhaps even anticipate the future. Knowledge in many fields -- music, art, literature, even the technologies -- allows us to "soar". Knowledge gives us pleasure. It transports us

out of our own tight little worlds much in the same manner that the winds carried Jonathan to new lands.

The people, interested in the fullest development of the human resources of our state, notes with alarm the report issued by the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics that Mississippi will see increased drug traffic in the next decade.

Kenneth Fairly, director of the Narcotics Bureau, reported the Bureau has found drug abuse in all walks of life in the state--among all age groups, all socio-economic groups, in the smallest village to the largest city.

There is a possibility the concern for the drug problem may fall victim to the sometimes "ho-hum" attitude about the number of traffic deaths on state highways. We express sorrow and surprise about a traffic mishap; yet too many of us continue to drive as though we want to keep the high highway loss costs spiraling.

We can ill afford not to fight a disease that prompted 329 drug violations arrests in 1972 and 89 arrests in the first three months of 1973. The disease cannot be cured with a shot, with a pill, or a vaccination.

The Bureau of Narcotics has been corralling drug violators at a rate of nearly 1.9 arrests per day in 1972. But the Bureau cannot do it all.

We need to educate ourselves -- not necessarily to capture the offenders, that's the Bureau's job -- but to the dangers involved in taking drugs, the punishment for selling and possessing drugs, and, most important, the very real cost in terms of human life.

The drug problem means nothing until it strikes home... until your son or daughter or neighbor is helplessly hooked, or until he or she is arrested, charged with drug violation, and imprisoned.

There is a point at which the problem stops and the epidemic begins. A "ho-hum" attitude toward the problem only feeds the epidemic.

So let's wake up folks, don't let this happen to Booneville.

Every time some researcher comes up with a newsworthy theory, public mention is inevitable; but also, inevitably, public mention enhances its validity. Thus, theories become accepted as facts.

This week one researcher reaffirms the benefits of massive doses of certain vitamins for treating a common mental illness. And another researcher says, on the contrary, megavitamin therapy may be harmful.

Eventually, Americans will have heard such a cacophony of contradictions that they'll learn the difference between a new

idea and a new discovery. Until then, though, many will continue to quote the most recent utterance as the most authoritative--and it's not always.

If doctors don't start considering human variables when they presume to tell you what's good for you, they're going to discredit their science.

Last week a Boston doctor said coffee is what causes heart attacks.

This week a London doctor says milk does.

Some of these public statements are easier to evaluate when you realize that much research these days is funded by public money or private grants.

The researcher figures he has to justify the cost of his project--or its renewal--by some announced accomplishment.

Also, the diverse affirmations concerning human sleeping habits bring into sharp focus the failure of statistics to reflect differences in our tolerances, our susceptibilities and our requirements.

You'll remember Dr. Willis Hurst as President Lyndon Johnson's heart specialist. He has offered some profound

advice to his own colleagues in a textbook about the heart.

He says each heart doctor must consider first that wavy line on the EKG. But before prescribing he must consider the patient's personality and lifestyle.

Consider the patient's work and his attitude toward it; his family and his feelings toward it; his eating habits and his feelings about food, and his personal body chemistry.

Or else, says Dr. Hurst, your physiological remedy might be a psychological depressant.

Until more medical men acknowledge human variables and until research learns to reflect those variables, you'll continue to hear that some things are good for you or bad for you when the opposite is true--for you.

PAUSE FOR POWER

Recognize Own Nothingness

John Nelson Darby once wrote a cryptic statement, "When a man gets out of his own nothingness he gets into it."

It is supremely important that we recognize our own nothingness, our impotence, for that recognition is the doorway to accomplishment, even as Paul confessed, "When I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:10).

And it is precisely because we are impotent that God has given to us the Holy Spirit. The Bible says, "The Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought; but the Spirit Himself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered" (Romans 8:26, 27).

The question now arises, How does the Holy Spirit help our infirmities? What does the Holy Spirit do for me when He prays with me?

First, the Holy Spirit gives us a burden to pray. The Bible says, "And I will pour upon the house of David, and upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the spirit of grace and of supplication" (Zechariah 12:10). The spirit of grace and of supplication is the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit grants to the believer, in prayer, grace and supplication. That is to say, the Holy Spirit burdens hearts to pray.

Second, the Holy Spirit teaches us precisely what we should pray for. The Bible says, "We know not what we should pray for as we ought; but the Spirit Himself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered."

Now there are two very obvious reasons why we cannot pray as we ought. First, we cannot pray aright because we cannot foresee the future. We cannot see a year or even an hour ahead; and we may well pray to be saved from things which are for our good, and we may well pray for things which would be to our ultimate harm, simply because we cannot see ahead and know what is to happen. Second, we cannot pray aright because even in any given situation we do not know what is best for us. We are often in the position of a child who wants something which would be bound only to hurt him; and God is often in a position of a parent who has to refuse his child's request, because he knows that what is to the child's good far better than the child does himself. The apostle Paul knew that by no possible human effort can a man justify himself; and Paul also knew that by no possible effort of human intelligence can a man know for what to pray.

Our Heavenly Father, therefore, knowing our weaknesses, our ignorance, our impotence, has given to us the Holy Spirit to help us pray aright.

And then in the third place, the Holy Spirit helps us in prayer by helping us to accept God's "no." We ask God for something that we think is proper and right. Sometimes God says, "yes." But sometimes God says, "no." Now,

when God says "no" to something we earnestly desire and for which we have earnestly prayed, it is difficult to accept God's "no" and to submit to His will. For example, God gave to Paul a thorn in the flesh. We do not know what that thorn in the flesh was, but it was something that was excruciatingly painful. On three different occasions Paul asked God to heal him of this thorn in the flesh. And on three occasions God said, "no," to Paul's prayer. Paul submitted to God's will, and accepted God's "no," but it took the help of the Holy Spirit to enable Paul to submit to God's "no."

This is the normal experience in prayer. We desire something very earnestly; as far as we can see, it is a proper and good thing. We believe it will be helpful to our spiritual lives. Therefore, we ask God for this thing. Sometimes God says, "yes," but many times God says, "no." How exceedingly hard, in fact, impossible, to submit to God's "no" patiently and thankfully, were it not for the help of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit helps us to submit to God's "no." He moves on our hearts, gives us confidence in God, impresses upon us that God lives us and is infinitely wise, and helps us to graciously and joyfully submit to God's "no" in prayer.

The Christian, therefore, like his Savior, humbly prays, "Not my will, but Thine be done."

ORGANO - PHOSPHATE POISONING

The usual symptoms of organo-phosphate poisoning are nausea, weakness, sweaty condition, numbness, vomiting, cramps, dizziness and pinpointed pupils.

Most pesticide exposure cases come from spillage off the chemical, spray particles from ruptured hoses or from fumes inhaled while mixing the ingredients. Work gloves soaked with pesticide are also a frequent problem source.

If you spill any organo-phosphate pesticide upon yourself, wash it off immediately. Within five to 15 minutes most of the absorption will already have taken place.

COTTON NOTES

As far behind as we are with cotton land preparation we are going to have to take advantage of every opportunity to get the crop planted as nearly on time as possible.

Sandier soils will present few problems, if we get normal weather. Subsoiling will have to be postponed until spring and a good deep chisel plowing will have to do the job. Chiseling should be done after disking to destroy the hardpans formed by the disking.

The heavier soils may have to be disked lightly,

hipped up on old beds, hipped up again just before planting and then knocked off. If a preplant herbicide (Treflan, Planavin or Cobex) is used, incorporate on a 20-inch band and plant.

Most growers should consider using a pre-emergence chemical at planting or just before emergence of cotton. If you add a surfactant, you should get a knockdown of emerged weeds in the drill area.

PECAN PHYLLXERA

To control pecan phyllxera mix one tablespoon of 57 percent malathion emulsifiable concentrate to one gallon of water. Spray with this mixture when the pecan leaves just begin to show and again 14 days later.

Use caution when applying any pesticide and follow all label directions to the letter.

SOYBEANS

Before you expand your soybean acreage, consider how you will manage the extra acreage for profitable yields. The temptation to substitute acreage for yield could be costly.

Good weed control can make increased acreages of soybeans highly profitable since weeds are probably the number one yield limiting factor in Mississippi soybean production.

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

If the recipe says "caramelize" -- that means you heat the sugar or food containing sugar until a brown color and characteristic flavor of caramel develops. Use low heat and watch it happen -- too much of a "caramelize" flavor is not good. It just burns.

Using fresh brussels sprouts or broccoli? Soak them first in cold salt water (two teaspoons salt for each quart of water.)

Yes, the transparent wrap on prepackaged meat, poultry, or fish is designed for refrigerator storage at home for one or two days, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

An unopened can of citrus juice may be kept on a shelf until used -- but once it is opened it should be kept in the refrigerator. Your fresh citrus fruit will keep longer if placed in the refrigerator.

Making cheese waffles? Just add one cup shredded, sharp cheese into the dry ingredients before adding the liquid -- but slightly reduce the amount of fat in your basic recipe.

No, you do not need to wash potatoes before you store them. Dampness increases the likelihood of decay.

Cooked dry beans freeze especially well, because freezing, like cooking,

softens beans, somewhat. Cook them until barely tender for the best quality frozen product.

Trim those leafy vegetables like lettuce and cabbage sparingly. Use the dark outer leaves -- they are especially rich in nutrients. However, you can remove the woody midribs from kale leaves; there is little nutritive loss and the kale cooks more uniformly without them.

Yes -- ham, frankfurters, bacon and sausage can be stored in their original containers in the refrigerator. Use within a week for best flavor.

Who killed George Stilwell? George, a 47-year-old dairy-firm executive who worked to win, played for keeps, and never had a moment to waste, dropped dead last July while running on the cinder track near his San Francisco home. George died of ventricular fibrillation -- a form of heart attack -- but there is mounting evidence to indicate that the real killer might have been his personality.

According to Meyer Friedman, M.D., of Mount Zion Hospital, San Francisco, California, a nationally-known authority on heart disease who has spent 15 years tracing the medical histories of 3,000 San Francisco men, the majority of heart victims show the same common traits of excessive ambition, overwhelming aggression, impatience, and slavishness to the clock -- and "George was no exception. These 'Type A' personal-

ities, as Dr. Friedman labels them, suffer two-and-a-half times as many heart attacks as their more relaxed and easygoing companions. Among men under 50, the figure is three to one.

While cardiologists agree that the full explanation of America's epidemic of heart disease has yet to be disclosed, certain causative factors have been isolated and identified. Just being male greatly increases the risk of heart attack; a family history of heart attacks is another factor; overweight is a

third; and heavy cigarette smoking definitely adds to the risk. (George qualified on all four counts.) High blood pressure is also implicated, along with heart-beat irregularities, which may be a cause, and blood cholesterol, although no one has established its role with absolute certainty.

supervisor of home economics.

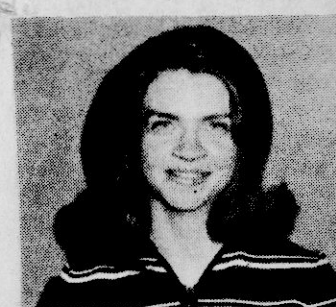

Costly Federal Programs Plaguing State Hospitals

"Costly federal programs continue to plague Mississippi hospitals, seriously hindering their efforts to control escalation of costs,"

This statement was made by Thomas L. Askew in a report to the Board of Governors, Mississippi Hospital Association. Askew, executive director of Greenwood Leflore Hospital is the current MHA president. Purpose of the Board meeting, one of a series

held recently, was to evaluate the impact of federal programs on the cost of providing health services to Mississippians. "To put it mildly, the effect is staggering," reported Askew.

The MHA prexy cited every federal program as being well intentioned and, without a doubt, beneficial to many. "The point, though is that congress and the public are prone to overlook the net effect of such on the cost of operating

hospitals."

Askew listed the following federal programs as major problem areas to Mississippi hospitals:

Economic Stabilization Program, better known as the "Wage-Price Freeze."

He indicated that despite the freeze, hospital costs continue to increase and "hospitals are locked into a position of not being able to adjust charges to compensate for increased operating costs." If some relief is not granted,

Askew stated that "several hospitals in this state conceivably could be facing eventual bankruptcy." Air and Water Pollution Control is necessitating unexpected repairs to and construction of new incinerators, some units

costing up to \$18,000. In addition, Askew pointed out that hospitals must also employ the services of professional engineers to check incinerators to determine compliance with minimum standards - "a costly process," he stated.

Life Safety code, dealing with fire safety, is resulting in major expenses through the installation of fire protective measures and devices. "We welcome this program because it improves patient safety but, at the same time, find it difficult to explain to the public how this program reflects in the cost of their care," commented Askew.

Askew cited other programs needed to be

complied with include the Occupational Safety and Health Act, Fair Labor Standards Act, Equal Employment Opportunity Act, and others, all of which he stressed are complicated and expensive.

In addition to federal programs creating various financial crisis, the intention of President Richard Nixon to curtail funding of the Hill-Burton Hospital Construction Program is "a real catastrophe," according to

Askew. The fact that federal assistance grants to expand and improve existing hospitals, plus construction of new ones,

will no longer be available will drive hospitals into the money market to borrow funds at a high rate of interest, "stated Askew: "This cost of borrowing money to insure opportunities for improved patient care will, of necessity be reflected in the cost of care rendered."

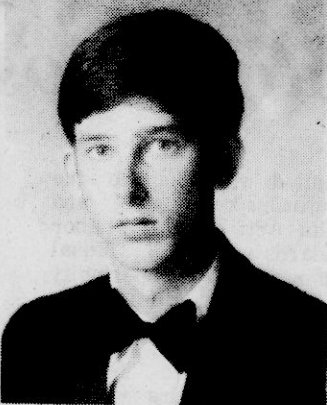

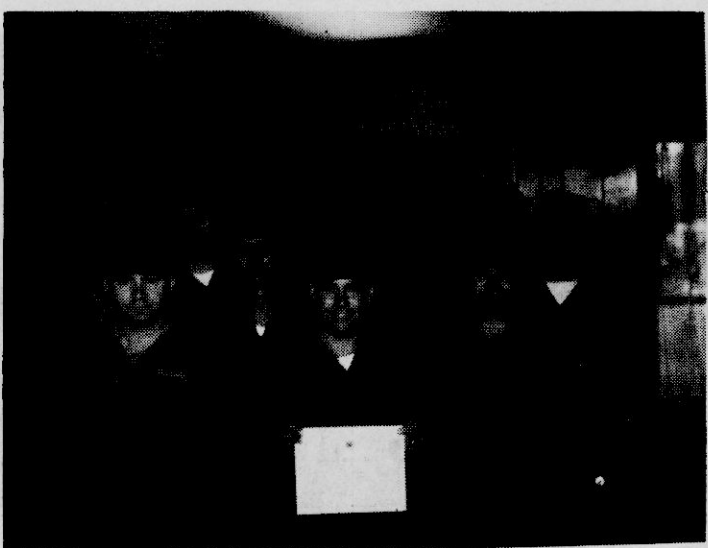
Farmers Get Protection

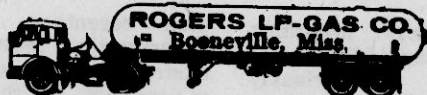

Conference reports, which could be called "Compromise" reports, occupied most of our business calendar. When Senate and House differ on a similar piece of legislation, a 6 member conference committee works out the differences and brings it back before the entire body for final passage. On a bill, or conference report, as it may be, there are only two voting choices - "Yes and 'no.'" It becomes necessary then to weigh the desirable parts of a total bill against the undesirable parts of a total bill and vote accordingly.

One conference report receiving approval last week was the education teacher pay raise bill. The average salary increase per teacher is \$667. with built in raises for the next two years. In addition, the measure provides a \$700 supportive services grant for each teacher unit, which is designed for services which add to the school curriculum, such as libraries, lunchroom workers, bus drivers, guidance programs and other school programs which are not covered by the minimum foundation funds.

Under this bill, 72 school districts which previously received no administrative expense will receive administrative money. The county systems have been receiving the funds, and now the separate school districts of Iuka and Baldwin will be eligible. Not forgetting our fine junior college teachers, who are not included in this education bill, the House amended an appropriation to provide an additional \$800,000 to the junior college funds for pay raise assistance.

The conference report on the bill to provide that veterans' organization not pay rent for use of the War Veterans' Memorial Building in Jackson has been adopted. This is the position which was supported by local veterans' organizations.

Emergency bills designed to provide aid for flood-stricken North Mississippi counties gained easy passage last week. Five million dollars in state funds will be matched with Federal funds for this purpose.

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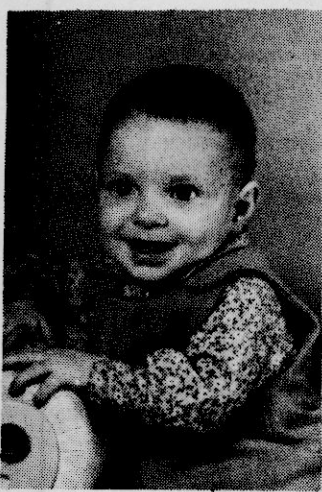

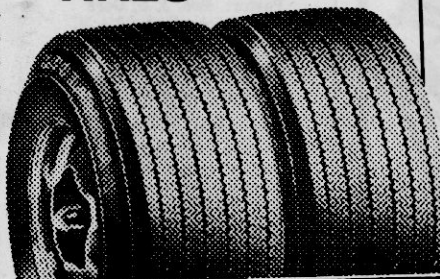

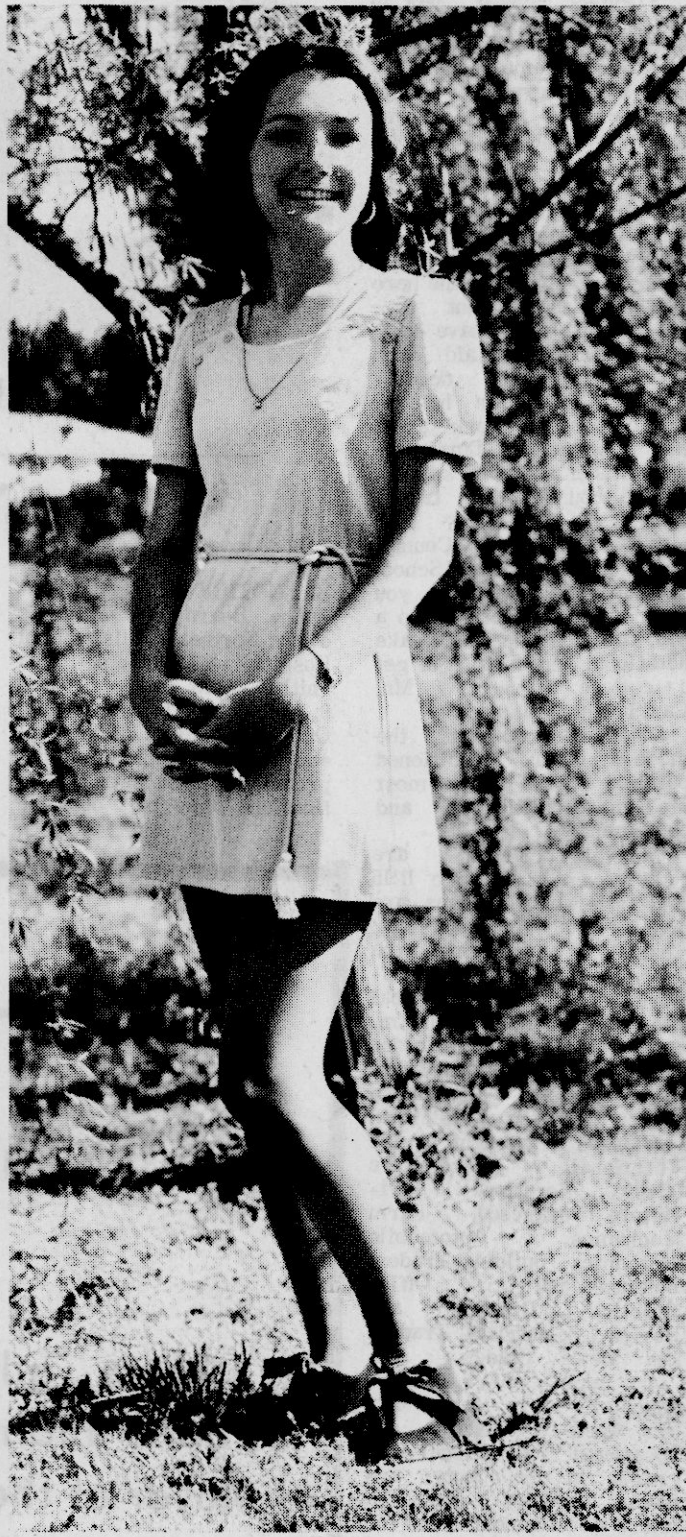

River Development Seen Water Damage Estimated

COLUMBUS, -- Deep concern was expressed today by officials of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority for the wide-spread devastation caused by recent flooding in the Tombigbee Valley.

Pointing to the human suffering and the multi-million dollar cost of the flooding, officials hastened to remind decision-makers that undeveloped rivers cost not only in dollars but also in wide-spread suffering by occupants of the Valley.

Glover Wilkins, administrator of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority in a formal statement Monday said that this flood was a crystal clear

example of how the building of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway could have prevented the extensive devastation and damage.

Although the project is not designed for flood control, Wilkins explained, "The proposed improvements would have reduced the flood crest by from 3 to 5 feet. This is the level where the severe damage occurred."

The Waterway provides a clear and unhindered channel 300 feet wide and 9 feet deep, which will unquestionably allow an earlier and speedier runoff of the flood water. Additionally, twenty-two cutoffs, such as Hairston Bend in Lowndes County, Mississippi and Rattlesnake Bend

in Alabama, will improve stream flow characteristics. Both of these factors serve to prevent water back-up, snags and clogs pointed to as a major contributor to flooding in this instance.

'They Come Because They Want To...'

For many areas of our country, bussing has become a problem....one that has not been readily solved.

And, in our own Prentiss County, we also have bussing. But, when the ultimate growth of our children is concerned, our people tend to disregard the dark shadows thrown on this word.

Such is the case of the Prentiss County Vocational

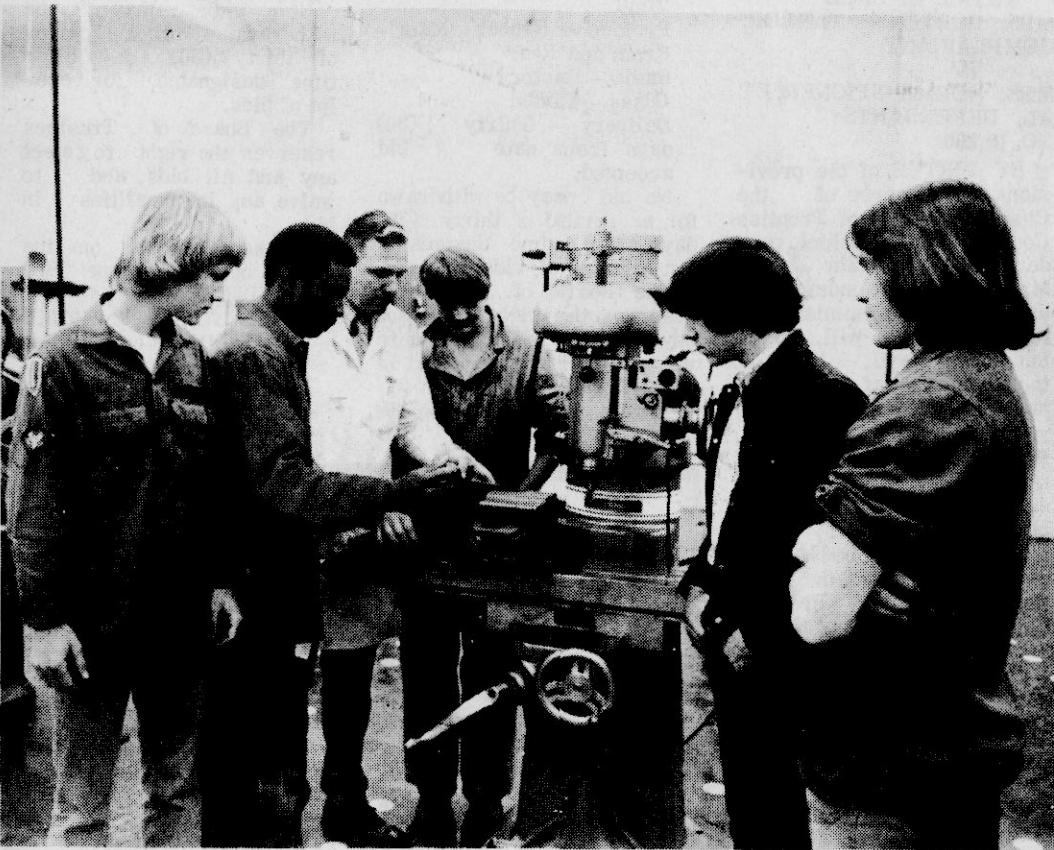
Technical Center in Booneville.

Just opened in the 1971-72 school year, the school has grown from 175 day students to 207 present day students. The adult night program in the vast facility has more than doubled since its inception from 75 to 175 students.

The school presently offers some 13 adult classes with the salaries of the teachers being 100 percent reimbursable with state vocational funds. The teachers give service to Prentiss Countians, at absolutely no cost to the county.

The huge facility, located just off Highway 45 North in Booneville, has a \$533,000 physical plant. This plant was funded by 50 percent state vocational funds, 30 percent Appalachian funds and 20 percent local funds.

It was noted that at the beginning of the school's opening, \$172,000 has been spent to equip the building--strictly from state vocational funds. Several thousand dollars have been secured from state vocational funds for additional equipment

since the school's opening. Prentiss County had in the school year 1970-71 vocational agriculture and vocational home economics--only two programs. Eight more areas have been gained, making the total ten in all.

In commenting about the school's astounding success, Director Merrill T. Cartwright commented that "our students come here because they want to...not because they have to."

The director said each of the separate departments in the center has its own classroom, work area, and break area. During the day, students from schools in the county are trans-

by bus.

"The Prentiss County Vocational Technical School is for you... whether you plan to go directly into a job after graduation, take additional training, or get a college degree," Mr. Cartwright explained.

Classes are held in the modern air - conditioned building with the most modern facilities and equipment.

Morning classes are held from 8:15 to 11:15 and afternoon classes are from 12:00 to 2:45 p.m. Students attending the morning sessions are transported back to their local attendance center by 11 a.m. Students attending afternoon sessions will not have to leave the local attendance center before 12 o'clock.

Classes taught are Vocational Agriculture (Basic), Vocational Agriculture (Advanced), Farm Mechanics, Automobile Mechanics, Building Trades, Business and Office Practice, Drafting and Design, Electrical Trades, and Metal Trades.

A team of state educators are in the city this week evaluating the vocational educational programs in the county, and how it relates to the future development of the student.

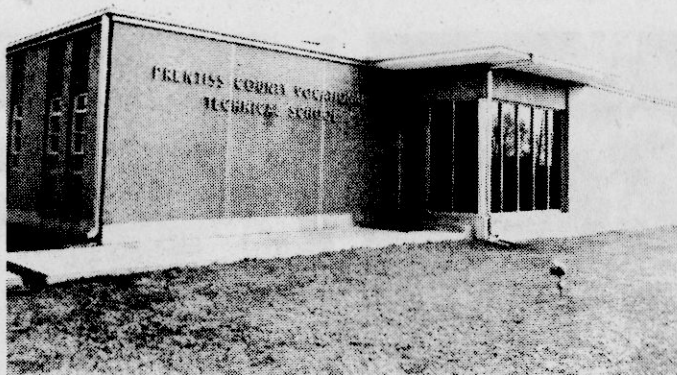



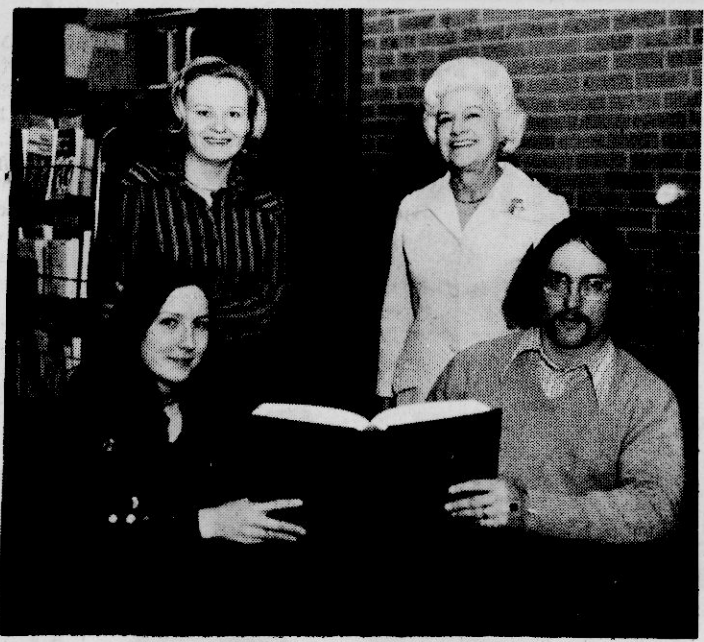

IRS SAYS

Flood Damage Can Be Deducted...

JACKSON, Miss. --

Damage to property resulting from the recent flooding may qualify as a deduction on Federal income tax returns, a spokesman from the Internal Revenue Service said today.

Persons who have suffered losses should begin to secure records as soon as possible to establish deductions to be claimed on their income tax returns. Records should include a list of property damaged or destroyed and show the value of the property before and after the flood.

Photographs of the damaged property before and after the flood would also help to establish taxpayers' deductions. Where substantial real property losses are involved, the services of an experienced and reliable appraiser would be advisable. The cost of appraisals and photographs is deductible as an itemized deduction.

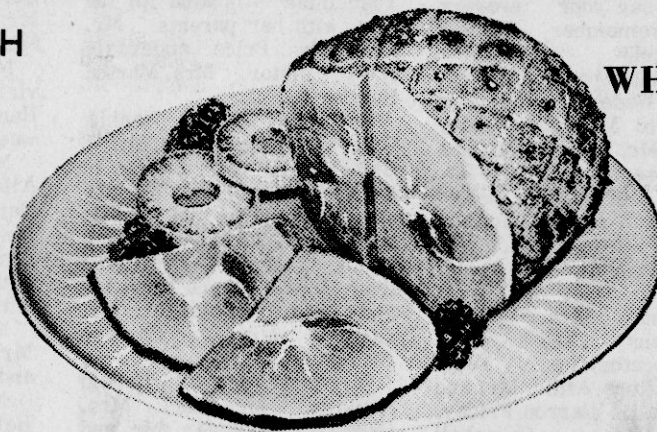

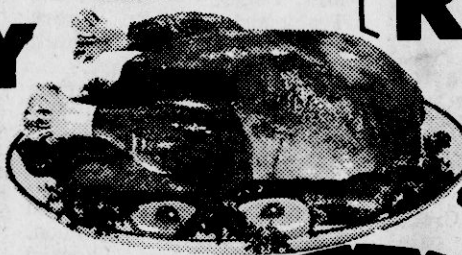

They're Making Cowbell-Shaped Candles At MSU

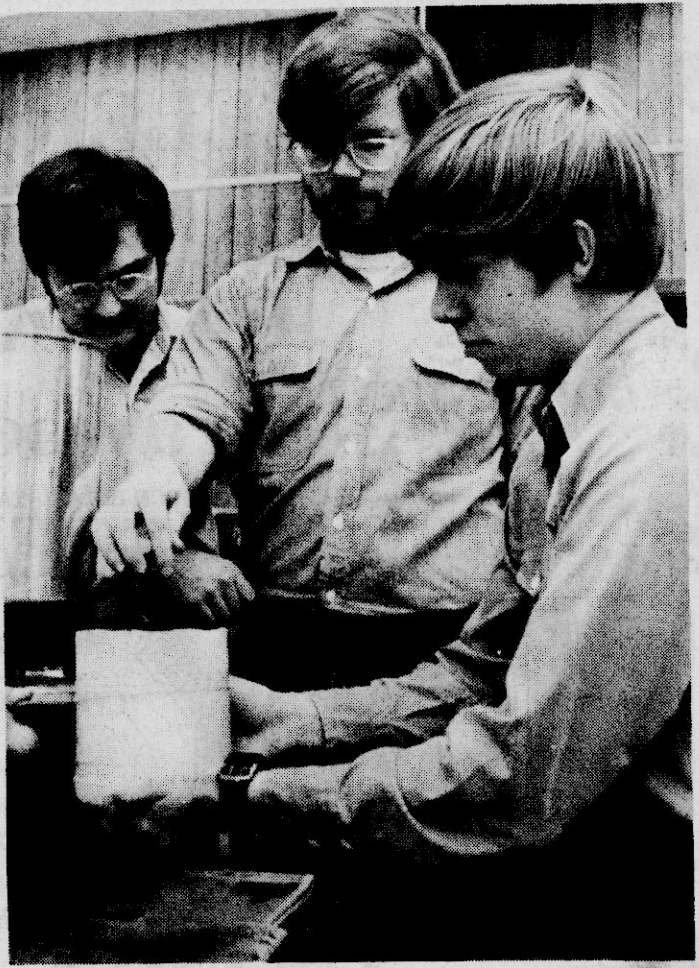
MISSISSIPPI STATE, Miss. -- Strawberry scented wax, copper bathroom tiles, and a good deal of time and enthusiasm are a few of the raw materials which go into the products of two student-run corporations at Mississippi State University.

The students who own and operate the mock corporations are all members of the "Interpretation of Modern Industry" class taught by Dr. Edwin Groves, an assistant professor of industrial and occupational education at MSU.

"This is a fun course to teach and according to the students a fun one to take," he says. "We first study the techniques of problem solving and I give them one problem to solve: Make a profit. Then I bow out as teacher and let the boys run the class."

With Dr. Groves acting in the manner of consultant only, the students set up a corporation form of management for the class--an elected board of directors who in turn interview the other students and assign them positions. The Board and other members of the corporation then select a product to make and market. They even decide when to meet class!

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Senator John C. Stennis today issued his first public statement since he was wounded in a robbery shooting near his Washington, D. C. home the night of January 30th.

The statement was tape recorded by Senator Stennis in his hospital room at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington Thursday afternoon. It is a "personal message" to the people of Mississippi, thanking them for their prayers and messages of concern. Here is a transcript of what Senator Stennis said:

"I want to personally express my gratitude to every person--whether child, adult or group - who prayed a prayer, or sent a message, or expressed an interest in my recovery after I was shot. Each of these expressions helped and I am warmly grateful. As the Bible says, "effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much," and I truly believe this is true.

My doctor tells me now that I am well on the road to full recovery. Of course, I am looking forward strongly to getting back to my work in the Senate, especially programs and m

grams and policies that concern our state and our people. I'm already actively keeping up with events and problems, and have already been conferring with fellow Senators and fellow officials and conducting some business. I look forward to being able to take my usual active role in the conduct of Senate business and will be back there as soon as possible. Again, thank you very much."

Flood Waters Hazard

Germs of all types are present in flood waters, and if your well or spring has been flooded, it is almost certain that some of the flood water has seeped into the system making the water unsafe to use.

The State Board of Health's Sanitary Engineering Division has some suggestions for dealing with this situation. Joe D. Brown, Division Director, says that these treatment methods are strongly advised "if you are forced to use water that has been contaminated."

Boiling the water vigorously for one full minute to kill the germs is the best solution. However, if boiling is inconvenient or impossible

disinfect the water with chlorine (bleach). The label on the bleach will give the percentage of chlorine and the following quantities are advised for the procedure.

CHLORINE	DROPS PER Q.T. WATER
1%	10
4% - 6%	2
7% - 10%	1

Let the water stand for 30 minutes.

The Health Department offers additional instructions in disinfecting all wells and springs that have been flooded.

"This treatment is rather detailed," said Brown, "and we suggest that you notify your local health department for this information and other assistance. Local sani-

tarians will be glad to collect water samples for lab analysis if anyone so desires," he added.

"With the enormous amount of rain the state has experienced during the past several days, this well and spring treatment advice may be badly needed in some areas," said State Health Officer, Dr. Hugh B. Cottrell, "and the public is urged to take advantage of it."

THIS THE BIBLE TEACHES

A reply to "This I Believe", Banner-Independent, Thursday March 22nd, 1973, Page 13.

The author of "This I Believe" fails to adequately deal with proof for which he offered \$1,000.00. Then, not being as sure of himself as he was at first, he offers a compromise in which he wants to issue a check without even signing his name to it.

For proof we offered Matt. 28:19 and quoted what Jesus said. We then asked, did these men of Matt. 28:19 do what Jesus told them to do? His reply: ".....they certainly did as we do today." Who are the "We"? Evidently, the United Pentecostal Church. But this is not what we asked him. We asked, "Did these men do what Jesus told them to do?" Now, we are asking it again. If you do not answer, you'll face it again and again.

There were two other questions asked in our March 15th response. He did not want us to go to the Gospels and we asked (1) Would he tell us if he ever goes to the Gospels to substantiate anything he teaches? We also asked (2) Do you teach the Golden Rule, Matt. 7:12? And that men are to live by it? Did those of you who read his reply to our response notice how he treated these questions with complete silence? Now, he faces them all over again. He did not want us to go to the Epistles, yet he quoted from Col. 3:17. Does this man practice what he preaches?

On the matter under discussion the writer of "This I Believe" is guilty of two basic errors. One concerns the nature of Baptism with regards to what "In the name of" means, and the other has to do with the nature of the Godhead. In this discussion, however, we're concerned primarily with the first. In Matt. 28:19 Jesus was telling his Disciples what they were to do with reference to the taught, and not what they were to say. The Bible nowhere contains a formula that must be said. Matt. 28:19 simply shows by whose authority the act is to be performed.

Now the question has been asked, "Who was Baptized and who did the Baptizing?" Then the writer of "This I Believe" gives his own answer to his question. He says, "No one because no one was Baptized in Matt. 28:19." This is so elementary! In Matt. 28:19 the Disciples were told what to do. When those instructions were carried out (and we have yet to see whether Mr. Odie believes they were) the ones who were Baptized were the ones Baptized in accordance with the orders given in Matt. 28:19-- The ones who wanted to be. The ones who did the Baptizing were the ones told to do it. If our disputant insists on a name like "John Doe" then let him produce the name of one who was Baptized in the name of "Jesus only".

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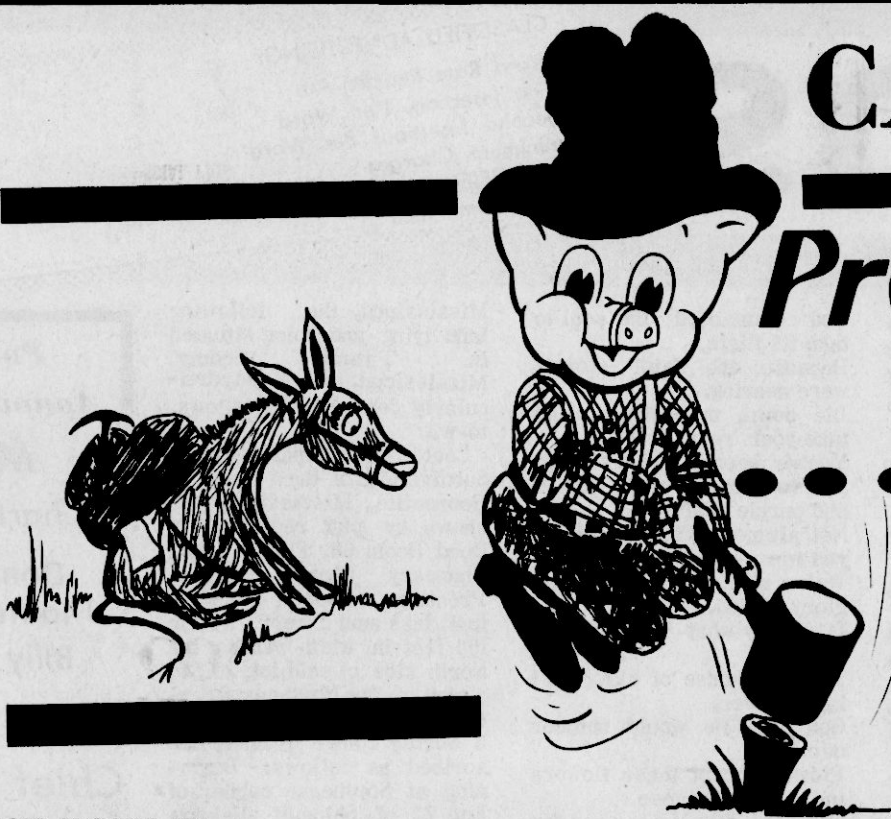
