21 Candidates Qualify

A field of 21 candidates have filed their qualifying papers to run for their respective offices in the City of Booneville.

City Clerk Ovid Robertson said Wednesday that Jack E. Arnold and Winfred B. Dawson were the last two to qualify to run for Alderman at large in the city.

City voters will go to the polls here May 8 to select a Mayor, Chief of Police, and five alderman to operate

the city government for the next four years.

For the first time after 13 terms, the Mayor's office will have a new occupant. Mayor Marion Smith is not seeking re-election. He was first elected in 1932 for his first term, serving four years and then entering the U. S. Army in 1942. Then he returned to the city to serve as a member of the Board of Aldermen.

Continuously from 1950, Mayor Smith has been the executive officer of the City of Booneville. Those candidates seeking election to the various posts in the city are listed here..

County Disaster List

City, county, state, and federal government officials met here Tuesday to discuss application for federal assistance for the flood-stricken county.

According to Bill Prather local OEP (Office of Emergency Preparedness) director for the city and county, officials met to discuss which routes to take in order to receive the disaster benefits.

It was noted that Mr. Chant, an official of the OEP in Dallas, Texas was present for the meeting as was State Civil Defense Deputy Director Prentiss Baughman.

The OEP representative gave a detailed description of actions necessary in order to receive federal assistance, Prather said.

Sixty days will be allowed to complete project applications to receive financial aid.

City and county damages have been estimated at \$40,000 during the March 14-18 rains here.

Official here said a proclamation has been requested to the Governor for financial assistance.

It was noted that the largest damage to the farmers was in the fields, with debris in the canal banks and private lakes.



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

McCoy Defends Hospital Stand

In reference to the recent court action concerning the Northeast Miss. Hospital here, Senator Charlie McCoy of Wheeler defended his legislative vote against a bill which would allow the hospital to construct doctor's offices.

The proposed bill would have allowed the Northeast Miss. Hospital to construct doctor's offices for the use of private physicians. McCoy said he opposed the bill "because if we start building doctor's offices for all physicians... then we are held liable to construct offices for any physicians who need them. This includes all phases of medicine."

The Senator said the city or county "can not momentarily afford to construct such offices. This would paralyze the city and county government."

He also noted that the bill was an "open-ended bill which places no restrictions on the area of construction. It would literally bankrupt the county and state."

The Wheeler resident spoke to the Tuesday meeting of the Booneville Rotary Club here. He said he regretted "ever being brought into the feud between the Board of Trustees and the Doctors. But I feel it my responsibility to explain the conditions under which I represented the people of this county in Jackson on this particular measure."

He further explained that "it was unconstitutional for the Hospital's Board of Trustees to allow the construction work on the Nurses Home." He also said that "if we make this a public operation rather than private one... then it leaves the whole thing open to the Washington bureaucrats. This we do not need."

The Senator related that he thought since "it is a local issue... then it should be settled locally. The original bill was introduced by Martha Carole White, Representative from Baldwin.

Dear Mr. Counce:

I appreciated very much your editorial last week on the condition of our schools. As a citizen, parent, and taxpayer, of Prentiss County, I have been concerned about problems existing in our schools for some time. I am not merely concerned about my own children, but about every child in Prentiss County who has the right to the best education our tax dollars can buy.

The curriculum in some sections of the first and second grades at Booneville Grammar School was geared to a new program for the 72-73 school year. My child was assigned to one of these. The "new" program does not assign any reading books--but leaves the children to "make-up" their own stories. The children have not been challenged at all. With 75% of this school year gone they are doing the same work they did in Kindergarten. Most of these children are eager and ready to learn. They've had enough readiness programs.

Perhaps a part of the difficulty lies in the fact that the children were not grouped this year. In one first grade class are: (1) Some who have attended private kindergarten, (2) Some who have attended Headstart, and (3) Some with no pre-school experience. It is not difficult to see how hard it is for a teacher to keep all three groups involved in learning at their particular level. I do not place blame on the teachers or principal. I have no knowledge of their ability. I do question the wisdom of "buying" a new program just because a sales representative is solid on it. I understand the Board will hire a new principal for 73-74. May I urge them to select someone with a degree in Elementary Education and some background in curriculum.

You mentioned in your article last week the other problem. The physical plant at the Grammar School is in deplorable condition. The sidewalks, halls and bathrooms are filthy beyond belief. I know one student who refrains from using the bathroom at school because it is too dirty. A full time janitor is employed there. A member of the Board of Education said, "He is poorly paid--so we can't expect him to do much!" I can't understand this reasoning. If the person agreed to do the job for the salary, then we have a right to expect him to do it. A man with a broom could accomplish a lot over there. I'm convinced that we have a right to expect our schools to be the cleanest places in the community. Educators will tell you it is difficult for learning to take place under such conditions.

Why should we wait until accreditation time and let someone else tell us what we have to do. Don't we have enough pride in our community and enough sense of responsibility to our children to initiate some action on our own?

Only one of the candidates for the coming city election has mentioned being concerned about our schools. Before we vote, let's find out where the candidates stand on this very important issue. Schools are for children--not to provide jobs for friends and political allies.

PAUSE FOR POWER

The Day God Buried Your Sins

The Gospel of Jesus Christ is based squarely on four impeccably documented historical events: Christ died, Christ was buried, Christ was raised from the dead, and Christ was seen visibly by men after His resurrection. The Bible says, "For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures; and that He was seen of Cephas, then of the Twelve; after that, He was seen of above five hundred brethren at once" (1 Corinthians 15:1-4).

The Bible here succinctly says, "And He was buried." The burial of Jesus Christ is, of course, an indisputable proof of the reality of Christ death. Physical death is the termination of physical life by the separation of the soul from the body. Jesus Christ literally and physically died.....and His burial is the proof of the reality of His death.

But there is a supremely important doctrinal lesson that we learn from the burial of Jesus Christ. The burial of Christ signifies and symbolizes the permanent removal of sin. As the body of Jesus was buried in the ground, so our sin, the Bible tells us, has been buried in the deepest sea. The burial of Jesus Christ, therefore, symbolizes the permanent removal of sin. Wilbur Chapman captured this truth when he wrote in his hymn.

Living, He love me;
Dying, He saved me;
Buried, He carried my sins far away.

The Old Testament background to this doctrine is the annual Day of Atonement, described in Leviticus 16, and today called Yom Kippur. On that day two goats were brought to the tabernacle. The high priest took one goat, killed it, and sprinkled the blood on the mercy seat in the holy of holies. After this was finished, the high priest then returned to the second goat, the live goat; and here is how the Bible describes the action of the high priest: "And the high priest shall bring the live goat; and Aaron shall lay both his hands upon the head of the live goat, and confess over him all the iniquities of the children of Israel... and shall send him away by the hand of a fit man into the wilderness; and the goat shall bear upon him all their iniquities into a land not inhabited; and he shall let go the goat in the wilderness."

Now these two goats were types of the atoning death of Jesus Christ. The first goat was killed and the blood was sprinkled on the mercy seat. This represents the death of Jesus Christ Godward. The death of Christ

satisfied the justice of God. The Bible says, "He shall see the agony of his soul (that is, the agony of Christ's soul upon the cross) and shall be satisfied" (Isaiah 53:11). The vicarious atonement of Jesus Christ perfectly satisfied the Justice of God with respect to the guilt of

sin. Now, the second goat was taken alive into the wilderness of Judea and was released and lost, so that no one could find it. The sending of this goat into the wilderness represents what Jesus Christ has done, manward, with our sins. He has carried away our sins. The Bible says, "As far as the east is from the West, so far hath God removed our transgressions from us" (Psalm 103:12). Again the Bible says, "And thou wilt cast all their sins into the depths of the sea" (Micah 7:19).

And this is precisely the doctrinal significance of the burial of Christ. Jesus Christ not only died; He was also buried. Our sins were not only atoned for; they were also buried in the deepest sea. They will be remembered by God no more. The Bible says, "I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more" (Jeremiah 31:34). Perhaps today some past sin weighs heavy on your conscience. The memory of that sin will give you no rest. Your conscience is tormented. May I recommend that you go immediately to Jesus Christ and trust Him as your savior. He will cast your sins into the deepest sea. He will remember your sins no more.

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

FERTILIZER SITUATION
Mixed fertilizer and nitrogen fertilizers are going to be in short supply during the peak use season this spring. Reasons are: that there is a short supply of phosphoric acid to account for the shortage of mixed goods. Two reasons for the nitrogen shortage are: increased use of nitrogen fertilizers and the shortage of natural gas used in manufacture of ammonium nitrate. In addition to the manufacturing problems, distribution is also a problem because of rail car shortages.

Farmers who fail to get enough fertilizer at planting time for cotton, corn or soybeans can expect good results by sidedressing with mixed fertilizer as much as a month after planting. If a farmer has a limited amount of nitrogen, he can apply a small amount at planting time and sidedress the remainder.

DRAINAGE
Good drainage will help you get a stand and to keep it. Water should not be allowed to stand around seed or seedlings. Good drainage means faster growth of young plants. All early plantings should be made on soil that has good internal drainage as well as surface drainage. When soils have poor internal drainage, surface drainage becomes even more important.

Leaving the rows two to three inches above the middles at planting will give good surface drainage without leaving the seeded too high for precision cultivation and chemical application.

REPLANTING COTTON
Guard against having to replant cotton. To control seedling diseases, plant good quality seed when the soil temperatures is 68 deg. F. or above and use recommended fungicides. Since several different organisms can cause seedling diseases, no one fungicide will control all of them. Seed are going to need all the protection available to get a good stand. Demosan or Vitavax added to the seed when Captan 75, Thiram 75 or Busan are used will give the additional protection needed.

Demosan and Vitavax are systemic and move through the young cotton seedling. Research shows that adding certain systemic fungicides will act as a "safener" where systemic insecticides are used as a seed treatment.

In addition to seed treatment fungicide, a hopper box or in-the-furrow soil treatment will give additional protection to young cotton seedlings. Label instructions should be closely followed.

You boost your community too, when you make cotton your choice. Did you know that cotton is the number one crop in Prentiss County, too? And to the tune of a two and a half billion dollar (\$2,500,000,000) industry.

SEWING TIPS FOR DOLMAN SLEEVES

Dolman sleeves, one of the fashion "firsts" of this season, may look roomy, but they do have their limitations. The curved underarm seam though it is loose and flappy when the arm is down, becomes tight when the arm is extended to its full length.

These are sewing suggestions for this fashion: One important consideration is fabric. It must be

drapable and soft as it will help determine how the sleeves will fold.

To keep the stitches from popping or the underarm seam from tearing, reinforce the seam. Sew a second row of stitching close to the first one in the area of strain. If the first row breaks, these will be a second row to back up the first.

Another way to reinforce this underarm seam involves the use of bias tape. For the easiest way, stitch a piece of bias tape right over the original seam line. Clip the curve of the seam allowance to relieve the strain. The unclipped bias tape will strengthen the seamline.

A third way to solve the problem, using bias tape, is to clip the seam allowance first, then press it open. Next lay a piece of bias tape over the opened seam and stitch it to the seam allowance--about an eighth of an inch on each side of the seamline.

You Can't Keep A Good Man Down

PAUL HARVEY NEWS is credited with adding to the dictionary the now commonly used word: skyjacker.

The rest of that story:
The earliest American victim of a skyjacker was a personal friend, Capt. Cleal, pilot, Pacific Airlines.

In July, 1961, in Chico, Calif., a man named Bruce Britt stormed aboard and tried to commandeer Capt. Cleal's DC-3. The captain resisted, scuffled with the intruder, was shot--through the eye.

Previously, there'd been some of what official Washington then called "incidents" involving airliners. Castro Cubans had diverted some planes at gunpoint. Others had been bombed out of the sky. Schedules had been disrupted by "bomb scares."

Air crews, disciplined to take emergencies in stride, took what precautions they could and stayed on course. But when a bullet exploded in the brain of a 42-year-old California airliner captain, every airman felt the impact. We were sick and stunned and scared and churning with anger.

I felt that day like using words I never use. Instead, I called the sickie who'd done that terrible thing "a skyjacker."

The word used for the first time that day, August 12, 1961, is in the dictionary now.

Now the rest of the story:

You can't keep a good man down. Capt. Cleal, within three months, was out of the hospital and studying for a new career. Investments, which had been his hobby, he made his business.

Bill studied finance by correspondence and recordings and went to work for a prominent stockbrokerage firm near his Menlo Park, Calif., home.

Subsequently, he was examined and accepted by the National Association of Securities Dealers.

Today, he is a vice president and director of retirement

trusts for his company.

Every spare hour he devotes to counseling the Airline Pilots Assn., law-enforcement agencies and congressional committees seeking countermeasures against skyjacker.

He's urging international quarantine for any nation which helps them hide. If that elusive objective is not yet realized, it is closer to realization than it has ever been because of the tireless efforts of Capt. Oscar Cleal.

His friends call him "Bill." You'll want to call him Bill.

Footnote: The bullet wound has long since healed but the brain damage affected both eyes. Captain Courageous had to pick himself up and keep on keeping on though totally blind.

Bill Cleal was sentenced to life in the dark. The inhuman human responsible is eligible for parole now.

UM Signs ROTC Agreement

UNIVERSITY, Miss., -- The University of Mississippi has signed an agreement with three junior colleges -- Itawamba, Northeast and Northwest making the Senior Division Army ROTC Program a part of the curriculum of the three institutions by means of a new "cross-enrollment" procedure.

The cross-enrollment plan will provide on-campus instruction at the three junior colleges at no cost to the participating institutions. In addition, all academic credit received from the ROTC courses will be transferable to Ole Miss and the four other Mississippi colleges and universities offering Army ROTC.

Signing the proposal were Ole Miss Chancellor Porter L. Fortune; Harold T. White, president of Northeast

Junior College; R. D. McLendon, president of Northwest Mississippi Junior College; and Winston O. Benjamin, president of Itawamba Junior College.

The plan stipulates that all transportation and instructor costs will be borne by the Department of the Army and the University of Mississippi.

The three junior colleges will be required only to furnish adequate classroom, storage, and drill facilities according to Col. Thomas B. Blake, USA, chairman of the Department of Military Science at Ole Miss.

"This plan will mutually benefit all parties concerned," said Colonel Blake. "From a Junior college standpoint, it offers another dimension for its students which was not possible before."

"It now permits a student to continue in the ROTC program leading to a commission in the U. S. Army, whereas before, the only way to accomplish this was to participate in the ROTC Two Year Program, thereby requiring attendance at the six week Basic Summer Camp."

Colonel Blake predicted that the cross-enrollment plan would benefit senior institutions from an enrollment standpoint, by encouraging more junior college students to continue their formal education.

"Also, it is felt that through these efforts more students in Mississippi will be exposed to Army ROTC, and that the ROTC enrollment at the five universities and colleges will be increased."


