

-McCoy Explains Position On Hospital

By this writing I wish to respond to coverage given by this paper of remarks made by me to the Booneville Rotary Club on April 10, 1973 with regard to the local Hospitall Doctors controversy. Remarks made to the Rotary members on the above date in the main constituted my position om measures introduced during this past session of the legislatture which, if passed, would have furnished at taxpayers expense, officers to all Doctors serving the N. E. Miss. lHospital or who practice in the area serviced by it who practice in the area serviced by it.

First, this paper was in error in reporting my use of the name of the Hon. Mrs. Martha Carole White in relation to the above mentioned legislation. Our Hon. Representative's name was used only in reference to a local education bill dealing with the transfer of funds in Prentiss County which she and I introduced in both the house and the senate at the same time. At no time was her name used in relation to the Hospital - Doctors controversy or any legislation relating to it.

Second, I feel that all of my remarks, and consequently my stated position on the above issue, was not adequately and conclusively presented to the readers of this paper. have been factiously advised by those who favor legislation on this issue that public opinion is so strongly biased on the one hand that it would be impossible for me to communicate my position to the people of Prentiss County, I do not believe. I'm confident that the people of Prentiss County need only to know the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth in order to make the right decision and support my position in this controversy.

My position is briefly this: (1) This controversy as I see it, is one that could and should be settled by the parties involved, that is, our local Doctors and our local Hospital Board. (2) Legislation which would have allowed the Hospital Board to renovate or to purchase offices for local Doctors would have been unconstitutional when our Courts have already ruled that such action was and shall be unlawful.

Federal laws clearly state that Hill-Burton property shall not be used for private use or by private practitioners. Other laws clearly state that medical facilities, other than Hill-Burton, when provided for the use by private practitioners must be made available to all who request it. This would mean that if a lawful way could be found to construct offices for Doctors at the expense of Prentiss County taxpayers, then, we would have to furnish such facilities to all. We simply could not pay the tax bill. Also, this would mean that medical care at this level in our

county would move from the status of free and private enterprise to public enterprise paid for by private citizens and regulated by the Federal Government under the Civil Act and numerous regulatory acts which already govern our schools, state owned mental and charity hospitals, recreational facilities, institutions of higher learning, our state prison, etc. This would seem to be a gross injustice to the Doctors, to the medical profession, to the patient and, also, an unbearable expense to the taxpayers. We have seen what a law suit under provisions of the Civil Rights Act by an attorney who was paid a \$52,000.00 fee of taxpayers money can force in the way of upgrading and change when brought against our state in our courts. This suit forced a ten and a half million dollar expenditure by the taxpayers of Mississippi to bring our Parchman Government. This same law would apply to facilities furnished by Prentiss County to private doctors enabeling Federal Government to regulate, dictate standards, at an untold expense. Further it could demand of those who practice in such facilities that they serve all who ask their services regardless of their ability to pay, with Prentiss County taxpayers again picking up the bill just as we pick up the bill in the payment of attorney's fees for those who break our laws, then, simply plead that they do not have the money to hire a lawyer. The dangers of such ventures are limitless and I could spend pages pointing them up, however, this should serve to clarify my position.

Now with respect to the specific legislation which I have refused to support for the reasons given above and more, it had other numerous weaknesses and dangers built into it. It did not limit expenditures. It would have simply handed to the Board of Trustees of the N. E. Miss. Hospital a blank check signed by the taxpayers of Prentiss County the sum of \$20,000.00, \$100,000.00 or \$1,000,000.00 to construct one doctors office or many times amillion dollars to construct many offices for the doctors of our county, possible even our chiropractors and veterinarians, plus any other expenses which the Federal Courts might see fit to impose upon us in the regulation of such

I cannot support such a proposition or such legislation which I believe exploits and would bankrupt the taxpayers of Prentiss County which I, to the best of my ability, represent. I believe this is the position of the vast majority of my constituents and that they believe, as I do, that a better solution can and should be arrived at by the parties involved at the county level.

"The resurrection of Jesus Christ," said the noted English historian, Thomas Arnold of Rugby, "is the best attested fact in human history." Faith is action based on the sufficiency of the evidence, and the evidence for the resurrection of Jessus Christ is more than sufficient. That evidence

includes at least six factors. We mention three.

First, there is the evidence of the empty tomb. Both friend and foe admit that the tomb of Jesus was empty.

Even the agnostic author of the recent book, the Passover Plot, admits that the tomb of Jesus was empty. How, then, do we account for that empty tomb? For nineteen hundred years unbelieving skeptics have tried to solve that problem, but they have never found a satisfactory solution. There

is only one real solution to the empty tomb, and that is,
Jesus Christ arose bodily from the grave.

The second evidence for the resurrection of Jesus is the
evidence of credible eye-witnesses. The Bible says that over five hundred men saw Jesus Christ alive after His ressurrection. Now, we want to arise. They were not psyched up to believe in the resurrection.

Second, these men were hard-headed realists. They were the: kind of men that would not believe unless someone really proved it to them. Third, some of them demanded the: evidence of touch as well as the evidence of sight. Sometimes the eyes can play tricks. So Thomas said, "I wom't believe until Iput my hands on His wounds." Fourth, these men had nothing to gain by lying about the resurrection of Jesus Christ, and as a matter of fact, they had everything to lose. Telling the truth cost these men their lives.

Now, over five hundred hard-headed, credible eye-witnesses voiced their unanimous conviction, "We saw Jesus Christ aliwe, in His own body, after His crucifixion." Here is the testimony of credible eye-witnesses.

Third, the radical transformation in the lives of the Apostles can only be realistically accounted for by the resurrection. There Peter is - fearful, cowardly, compromising. When asked by a little girl if he were a disciple of Jesus, Peter lied three times, "No I am not!" and he swore to back it up. At the cross, Peter melted into the crowd. Peter stands up before thousands of his own countrymen. declares to them that Jesus Christ was all that He claimed to be, asserted that Jesus Christ had actually been raised from the dead, and challenged them to prove otherwise. And then Peter lowered the boom by declaring them guilty of murder. "You lowered the boom by declaring them guilty of killed," said Peter, "the prince of life." Later on, when the Jerusalem authorities commanded Peter to stop precaching or else they would physically punish him, Petter replied, "Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard,"

County Radar Use Vetoed

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)-Gov. Billi Waller announced Tuesday he has vetoed a measure that would have allowed the use of radar by county patrolmen for speed detection in five counties.


Waller said the use of radar speed detection equipment has been restricted to the highway patrol and municipal officers. He said there was no "reasonable justification" for allowing selected county officers to use it.

"Wither all of our 82 counties need the right to use radar equipment or none of them do," the veto message said. Waller said it would only "confuse and irritate the general public" to allow a few counties to use radar.

"The problems that have arisen in the past with regard to radar can only be prevented by uniform, statewide speed detection equipment and rules of use and interpretation," Waller said.

The governor also announced he had vetoed a \$2 million appropriation for a proposed new state manpower training program for unemployed adults. The appropriation bill was a companion to an earlier measure which Waller vetoed last month that authorized the program.

The governor approved a general fund allocation of \$13.8 million for support of existing vocational and technical education programs in the state for the coming fiscal year.





SEED TREATMENT

Help insure a good stand of cotton with seed treatment. Planting high quality seed treated with a protectant fungicide and a systemic fungicide is essential in getting a good stand of cotton. Protectant fungicides include Captan, Thiram and Busan. The systemic are Demosan and Vitavax.

Further protection of young cotton plants can be obtained by using a supplemental fungicide applied in the hopper box or as an in-the-furrow treatment. Use of this supplemental fungicide will depend on the planting date, the type of equipment available and whether or not seedling disease has been a problem in the past.

ANHYDROUS AMMONIA
Wait until soils are
drained of excess moisture
before applying anhydrous
ammonia as this material
is hard to seal in wet soil.
Due to the shortage
of solid granular nitrogen
fertilizer materials, many
farmers may want to wait
until after the crop is
planted to apply
anhydrous ammonia. In

seed drill to prevent injury

to seed or seedlings.

Here are some suggestions that should help in keeping milk free from pesticide residues:

Locate your cotton fields as far away as possible from pastures, hay and silage fields.

If you suspect that you may get a drift from the cotton field to the feed growing area, use only methyl paramuon, sevin or malathion as cotton insecticides.

On your dairy animals and around dairy barns be sure to use only approved and recommended materials. Do not store pesticides in feed rooms or near where you milk.

Measure pesticides accurately, mix thoroughly and apply carefully. Be sure to observe waiting periods before grazing or harvesting freed crops. Make sure that all bought feed is free from pesticide residues.

When using any pesticide read the label and follow all directions to the letter!

WEED CONTROL

It is hard to predict the effect that flooding will have on weed control, but is extremely doubtful that it will reduce weed problems.

who had clean Farmers fields in the past will find many new likely weed problems this year. Keep a carefull on your fields to help locate the new weed problems early so the weeds can be controlled before they produce a seed crop and create future headlaches.




