## Expansion Planned For Booneville Telephone Service

South Central Bell said it will invest \$51,000 in the northeastern service area of the Booneville exchange to provide telephone service to new customers and to meet requests from present customers for individual telephone lines or lines with fewer parties on them.

The program is part of the record-breaking 91 million dollars South Central Bell plans to spend in Mississippi during 1973 for new and improved services.

According to D. W. Snyder Chairman of the Mississippi Public Service Commission, total employment

in Booneville and Prentiss County is trending upward with manufacturing providing for most of the gains.

"And, as economic conditions continue to improve, more people will want telephone service. This project will provide the

facilities to serve these requests."

"Telephone crews will place about 41,000 feet of buried cable to complete this expansion program and the job is located in the Thrasher community increasing residential construction is taking place

in this are of the county and a subdivision is now being developed which will bring more people into the

community. This program will provide the facilities to serve 29 requests for either initial or more individual telephone service

## Editorial and Comment

### Debugging Mosquito Control

Warm weather and rains mean the bugging season is near or here. Entomologists (bug specialists) tell us that last year's bumper crop of mosquitoes spells trouble. Crews have been working through the winter to destroy the dormant pests, through draining and other methods, called "source control." Now the control efforts move on to larviciding, or killing the developing mosquito larvae, and adulticiding, aimed at the female adult biting mosquitoes.

The newest technique for control of adult mosquitoes is ultra-low volume application of chemicals, which eliminates clouds of smelly smoke. By breaking up the droplets of the insecticide, usually malathion, into a nearly invisible mist, the ultra-low volume application minimizes the amount of insecticide discharged. This method of applying malathion has been used by the U.S. Public Health Service and the

U. S. Department of Agriculture, and is being used by growing numbers of local mosquito control districts. Dr. Robert W. Altman, State Entomologist in Maryland, has announced that the State's 1973 mosquito adulticiding program will use the ultra-low volume method exclusively.

A National Wildlife Society research project has also showed that malathion had no effect on wildlife when applied at nearly ten times the ultra-low volume rate used in mosquito control. The possibility of hazards to people is sometimes raised, but the U. S. Public Health Service has monitored people in several areas where malathion has been used and has found no evidence of adverse effects.

Wherever a question in this matter may arise, local mosquito control officials, the county agent, or the public health officer can find the answer or tell where to get it.

### New Drug Threatens Youth

A new drug, a sedative-hypnotic pill, has made its appearance among young people of the nation, all the way from Berkeley, California to the campuses of the East. It is called methaqualone. It is a dreadful thing that causes users to believe they have control over their bodies when in fact they have lost control. It is addictive and progressively dangerous. A single overdose can be fatal.

The Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs warns, "methaqualone produces a severe physical dependence characteristic of the barbiturate-alcohol type." The withdrawal symptoms can be rigorous, causing the user to increase the dosage. Some students take up to twelve 300-milligram pills a day,

### Marriage: Individuality, Not Age!

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: What is the best age for marriage?

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: There is no "best age" for marriage as far as all males and females are concerned. However, there is an age for each individual whereby he may be more ready for marriage than at any other time. For example, Bill and Jim are twins. They are twenty years of age; both have steady girl friends. Bill has shown by his behavior and attitude toward certain areas of life that he's ready for marriage. So, for him, twenty years of age may be the "best" time to get married. Jim, on the other hand, although dating steadily, is still showing signs of immaturity and lack of responsibility. For him, then, twenty is not the "best" age to get married.

Usually, a fairly high level of maturity in attitudes toward spending money, the proper place of sex in life, having and rearing children, and married life in general are not reached until the person is in his late teens or early twenties. Statistics show that the present average age at marriage is around twenty-two for the male and twenty for the female. Some persons at sixteen, however, are more mature and ready for marriage than others at thirty, so we can't say that age is the sole criterion for marriage. There are just too many other factors involved.

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: How do you feel about a married person who is unfaithful to his spouse because he

can't be sexually satisfied at home? In order to satisfy this desire, he or she seeks satisfaction outside of marriage. Is this behavior ever justified?

It started out as a sleeping pill, and has now become a wacky input that produces an addictive euphoria that robs the user of his or her senses and will. The production of the pill has grown from 8 million in 1968 to 147 million in 1972, in spite of its evil nature. A number of States have now moved to put the drug under stricter control.

Hazardous and often deadly drugs are among nature's barbs - a peril thrown into the paths of youths, who would be well advised to sidestep it.

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: When one is married, there is no justification, spiritually, morally, or socially for one to seek sexual satisfaction outside of marriage. However, let's

go deeper into the situation and ask the question, "Why isn't one satisfied, sexually, at home?" There can be a number of reasons. Maybe, the wife, due to early home conditioning, has certain fears of pregnancy, pain, or aversions against sex. The husband, due to a dating background of sexual pri-

miscuity, may be more demanding, sexually. Sometimes, a very confining religious background can retard freedom of sexual expression. The fact of just living together for a number of years with resulting boredom, at least for some, sets the stage for extra-marital sexual behavior.

Whatever the excuse or reason may be, there is no justification for sexual unfaithfulness on the part of either spouse. Our religious, moral, and social codes for living prohibits this type of behavior. When one gets to this stage in marriage a re-evaluation of the situation including the possibility of professional counseling is in order if the marriage is to continue with any degree of happiness and stability.

Don't kill yourself when you're tired. In three cities now "hot line" telephone numbers provide for potential suicides counseling by psychologists who listen with patience and respond with caution. All agree on one prescription: "Sleep on it."

Americans are a paradox when it comes to playing the odds. As horse bettors we study the racing form record of every horse in the race--when all we have to lose is \$2.

In industry we predicate our advertising on cost per thousand, having learned from experience the response percentages. Carefully we calculate and contemplate the odds before we put money in the stock market. We want to know the precise point spread before we'll bet on a football game where we have nothing to lose but money.

Yet we ignore the odds on lung cancer and go right on smoking.

So we may ignore what the numbers are trying to tell us about suicide, also. But here they are anyway.

### PAUSE FOR POWER

### Sin . . . Vertical And Horizontal

Sin is one of the saddest but also one of the most common phenomena of human life. No culture has ever been without the nemesis of sin.

Moreover, sin has both a vertical and a horizontal dimension. Vertically, sin renders a man guilty before God. Horizontally, sin pollutes every area of the sinners life. Sin is therefore both guilt and pollution.

But it is supremely important to observe that sin is first and primarily guilt, and then it is pollution. In direct contrast to those who tell us today that sin, for example, homosexuality, is only a disease, the Bible teaches us that sin is first and primarily guilt. Sin is first a crime and then a disease.

Sin, is, first guilt -- a crime against heaven. Sin is a violation of God's law and therefore renders the sinner guilty. The Bible says, "Sin is the transgression of the law" (1 John 3:4). Just as driving over the speed limit in the city is a violation of the law and renders a man guilty before the court, so sin is a violation of God's law and renders the sinner guilty before the Judge of the universe. The Bible says, "We know that what things soever the law says, it speaks to them that are under the law; that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may stand guilty before God" (Romans 3:19).

And to "stand guilty before God" means two things. It means, first, that I am blameworthy, I am responsible for my sin. No one compelled me to sin. As a free moral agent, I sinned willfully. Second, however, I am also liable to the punishment for my sin, and the punishment for sin is death. The Bible says "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." Sin has rendered me guilty before God, and the guilt of my sin includes liability to punishment, and the punishment of sin is death -- spiritual, physical and eternal. The Bible says, "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23).

In addition, however, to the vertical aspect of sin there is also a horizontal aspect. Sin is not only guilt, but also pollution. Sin has not only rendered me guilty before God; it has also corrupted and polluted my life. It has gripped me with terrible and fearful sinful habits. It exercises a tyrannical power over my life.

Paul describes in graphic personal language the terrible polluting effects of sin in his own life; "For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do... For I delight in the law of God after the inward man: But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members. O wretched man that I am! Who shall deliver me from the body of this death?" (Romans 7:19-24).

In this confession Paul bares his very soul. Paul knew what was right; and yet somehow he could never do it. Paul knew what was wrong. The last thing he wanted to do was to do wrong, and yet somehow he did it. It was as if two men were inside the one skin. And like Paul, modern man knows he is a walking civil war, because sin has corrupted the whole of his life.

Here then are the two dimensions of sin -- vertical and horizontal, guilt and pollution.

And since sin is both guilt and pollution, God has given us two gifts to meet precisely outworn-fold need. God gave His Son for me, that is, God gave His Son to die for me. He bore the penalty of sin in my place. Second, God gave His Spirit to me. At conversion, the Holy Spirit takes up His residence in a believer's life. The Bible says, "What? Know ye not that

your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit which is in you." And the Holy Spirit indwells every believer to save him from the pollution of sin, to give him victory in the "civil war," and to sanctify him.

God gave his Son for me. That answers the guilt of sin. And God gave his Spirit to me. That answers the pollution of sin.

Augustus Toplady had therefore a real grip on the truth when he wrote:

"Rock of Ages cleft for me  
Let me hide myself in thee,  
Let the water and the blood  
From thy wounded side which flowed  
Be of sin the double cure,  
Save from wrath and make me pure."

### EXTENSION HOME ECONOMIST

#### KEEP YOUR BLENDER HANDY - AND USE IT

How many speeds do you need on your blender? Only enough to meet your cooking needs. Sixteen speeds would be fine, but only if you use them. Homemakers, at least some, find they use a few of the speeds frequently and others seldom or never.

The blender can do lots of things for you if you keep it handy and take advantage of its capabilities. Here is a list of the sort of things it can help you do, starting with the slowest speed:

\* Reconstitute dry milk solids, dry fruit solids and frozen concentrates; stir instant puddings.

\* Coarse-chop semi-soft foods, cooked meats, bread crumbs, and hard-boiled eggs.

\* Blend cheeses and dips.

\* Crumb crackers, bread, cookies and cereals.

\* Grate fruit peels and hard cheeses.

\* Chop nuts, fish, cooked meats.

\* Mash fruits or soft vegetables to a fine texture.

\* Mix milk shakes and light batters.

\* Blend thick dips, salad dressings, malted milks.

\* Grind spices, coffee beans, cheeses, bread or cracker crumbs.

\* Mince herbs, onions, celery and parsley leaves.

\* Crush coconut, hard candies and sugar chunks.

\* Shred cooked meats and vegetable for pate or spreads.

\* Liquefy vegetables or fruits in water or some other liquid. There are some things a blender does not do. It does not beat egg whites, make juice from oranges, make fluffy mashed potatoes, chop or grind raw meat or crush ice cubes.

It will mince an onion but not chop it the way a French chef chops onion.

#### WHIPPING CREAM

Whipping cream is easiest to whip when it is chilled to between 35 and 40 degrees. For best results

chill bowl and beater as well as cream. With a rotary beater or electric mixer, whip the cream rapidly -- just until it mounds and holds its shape. Be careful not to overwhip.

#### PLAY IT SAFE INDOORS

outdoors, say 4-H'ERS

With the advent of warmer weather Americans are moving out-of-doors to participate in all forms of recreational activities. Boating, camping, hiking, cycling, sports and other outdoor activities and just plain driving for enjoyment bring families into the recreation mainstream.

But with the fun comes the added danger of accidents and increased need for safety precautions, warns some 360,000 safety minded 4-H'ers.

Participating in the 4-H safety program, sponsored nationally by General Motors these young people are learning and practicing safety habits where ever they are. They also are taking what they've learned and are sharing it with their families and other youth and adults in their communities.

Working individually and through their clubs, 4-H'ers use all kinds of activities and methods to spread their safety messages. And they enlist the help of community leaders, businessmen, law enforcement personnel and others to make their communities a safer place to enjoy.

Over 3,700 young people participated in a 4-H fire safety program in Oswego County, NY, which emphasized how to prevent home fires, and what to do in the event of a fire in the home. One 4-H'er who participated in the course was able to save his brothers and sisters from his burning home, because of the techniques he learned through the program.

Some 4-H groups have emphasized safety in water

sports. Others have stressed bicycle and motorcycle safety, proper use of chemicals at home and on the farm, and proper use of eaul and proper use of equipment such as power lawn mowers.

One group of 4-H'ers in Anne Arundel County, Md., participated in a program of roller skating safety. Safety practices, sportsmanship, skate maintenance and first aid were stressed.

Safety education is for all seasons, the 4-H'ers claim. A Payne County, Okla., 4-H group conducted a Community Halloween Safety Program, where reflective triangles were distributed to young "trick or Treaters" to wear on their after dark rounds.

These and other efforts by safety minded 4-H'ers and 4-H groups are eligible for recognition provided by General Motors. Outstanding youths in the program, in each county, receive medals of honor, while state winners receive an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 25-29.

At the annual 4-H event, General Motors awards \$1,000 scholarships to eight national winners.

In addition, GM awards certificates of merit to clubs with the most outstanding safety programs in each county and state.

If West really believed the defense can score a heart trick, he should underlead a small heart, put-

ting East in to make the club shift, but none of these ideas crossed his mind and he made the obvious opening lead of the king of hearts only to discover he never had a heart trick anyway!

South now had a chance but he muffed it. He ruffed the heart open and lead a small trump to dummy's queen and when West showed void of trumps the contract went on the rocks since declarer could not establish dummy's spades for club discards. Removing a valuable entry to dummy in the queen of trump was a costly mistake.

If South wanted to test trump, he should lead the king from the closed hand first, and now shift to the king and queen of spades. At this point it mattered not if East ruffed since South still retained two trump entries in dummy, which is all that was needed to establish the spade suit. Let's assume East does not ruff. South crosses to the queen of trumps and leads a small spade, not the ace. If East ruffs this time, South discards a club, wins any return in the closed hand, crosses to dummy with the trump ace which also pulls East's last trump and the established spades provide a parking place for declarer's last two clubs.

With this line of play South is in complete control once the defense failed to open the club suit. But he must not disturb dummy's entries and be willing to surrender a spade ruff to East which is his only loser on the hand.

### Most Suicides Occur In The Springtime...

Statistically, most people kill themselves in springtime--in rainy April.

Suicide takes an acknowledged 25,000 American lives each year and probably 75,000. Among young people it is a "leading cause of death."

A hundred doctors kill themselves each year, according to American Medical Assn.

And whatever the contributing causes--alcohol, drugs, mental problems--the final accessory before the fact of self-destruction is "fatigue."

Mrs. Loyola Green killed herself in Hollywood, Fla. The wife of chairman Frank Green of Blum Tool Co., she was in good health and wealthy but, her note said, she was "so very tired."

Richard Diamond of Bakes College in Lewiston, Me., author of "The American View of Death," says for the acutely weary

"death represents sleep."

That fact that depression is amplified by fatigue is evidenced by a Utah State University finding that most suicides are between 9:00 p.m. and midnight on Mondays.

Professional physicians, astronauts, generals, news commentators whose voices are potentially significant to others generally discipline themselves in times of weariness to postpone important decisions, where possible.

The study of suicide conducted by our National Institute of Mental Health has been published under the heading: "Suicide Prevention in the Seventies." It identifies the chemical effects of fatigue which can contribute to irresponsible behavior. In other words, when in despair, "sleep on it."

Don't kill yourself when you're tired and odds are you never will.





## Bank Of Miss. Merges

Officials of the Bank of Mississippi in Tupelo and Bank of West Point jointly announced today that final approval has been received from both state and federal regulatory agencies for the two banks to merge under the charter of the Bank of Mississippi.

A merger date of July 26 has been set by officials of both banks, waiting the 30 days required by the U.S. Justice Department before the merger can be consummated.

Bank of Mississippi officials said they had received a telephone call from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation late Monday telling them the merger of the two banks had received final approval.

The merger brings to 12 the number of cities served by the Bank of Mississippi and creates a regional banking center with assets in excess of \$130 million dollars for the development of North Mississippi.

A typical intermediate car, a Dodge Coronet, can handle a 4,000 lb. trailer. Some large model cars can pull trailers up to 7,000 lbs. For your requirements, check with your car dealer. All car makers offer factory installed trailer-towing packages. Components

may differ, but usually include heavy-duty springs and shock absorbers; extra capacity radiator and engine cooling fan; heavy-duty automatic transmission with larger cooler; power brakes and steering; larger tires; extra-capacity alternator and battery; and a higher ratio (lower speed) rear axle. Trailer hitch and wiring harness are usually packaged separately.

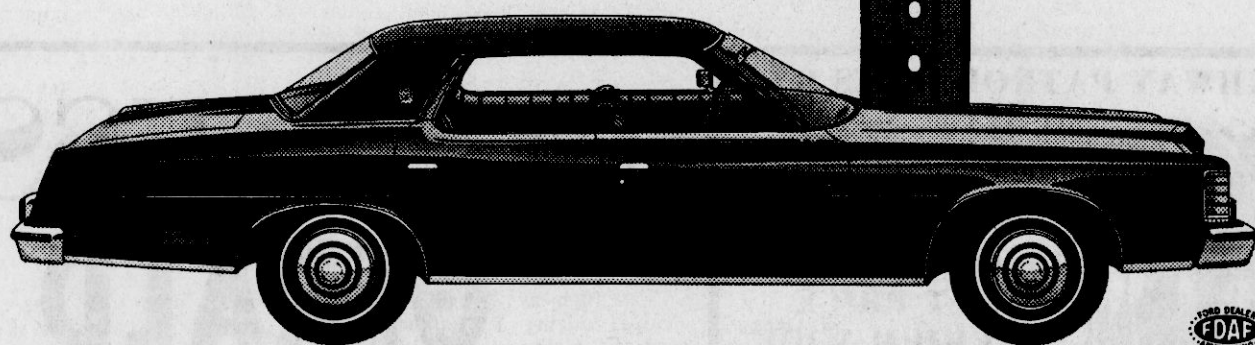





## Recruiting Campaign Draws

## Hundreds For Nat'l Guard

Several hundred young men have joined the Mississippi National Guard in the past two weeks during the Guard's first recruiting campaign since the elimination of the draft.

The new enlistees, who have joined units across the state, included young men with no prior military service, former Guardsmen and members of the active services.

All National Guard units in the state are involved in the intensive recruiting drive with Guardsmen explaining to eligible young men in their communities the advantages of being a member of the Guard.

Mississippi has traditionally been one of the leaders among the states in its strength and Major General E. A. Beby Turnage, Adjutant General of Mississippi, has urged local unit commanders to help the state retain that position under the all-volunteer Army Program.

There are currently more than 10,500 members in the Army National Guard in the state.

For the former serviceman, the National Guard has available the "Try One" program which enables a veteran to continue to use the experience gained while on active duty. The former serviceman can enlist in the Army National Guard for one year in the grade held at the time of release from Active Duty. At the end of the one-year enlistment, the term can be extended for another year or for longer.

National Guard enlistments for persons without previous military experience are for six years. Individuals without prior military experience must spend an initial four to six months, depending on the skill in which they are to be trained, in fulltime training at an active Army training facility. Upon completion of training, the new Guardsmen returns home to his job or school.

The new Guardsmen receive their basic military training and training in their prescribed military specialty during their active duty tour. Then, the trainees return to their hometown unit where they engage in the monthly training assemblies and 15 days of annual training each summer.

In addition to the pay that provides a supplemental income, a member of the National Guard receives retirement benefits, educational opportunities, a special insurance program and an opportunity for a Commission by attending either the state or U. S. Army Officers Candidate School.

Young Mississippians interested in the National Guard can find out more about the opportunities available in the oldest military force in the country by contacting their hometown National Guard unit.

## What Do Pasture Land Improvements Show?

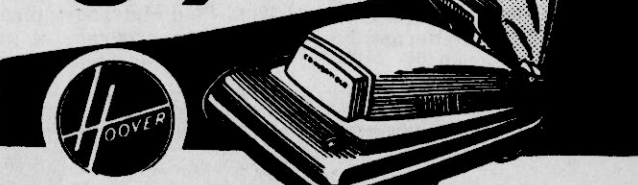

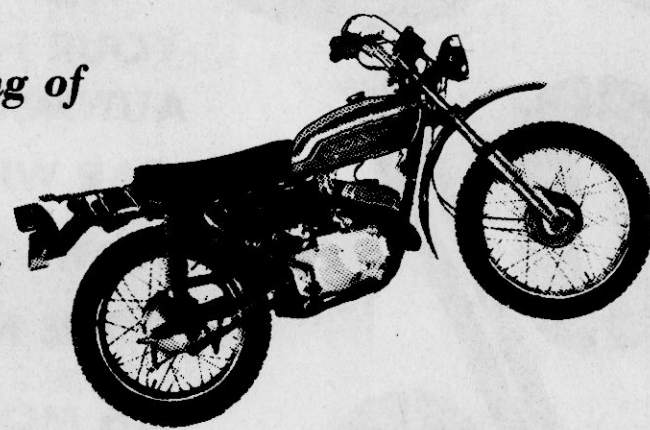

## Most Vacations Still Made In Car

Despite the lure of jet travel, eight out of ten vacation trips are still made in the family car.

Motoring is the most popular form of vacation travel because it allows you to set your own pace and the interstate highway system speeds you over long distances to your destination, after which you can stop and sightsee at your leisure.

A well maintained car is a prerequisite for a care-free motoring vacation and a pre-trip checkup is a good idea even if you've been following a recommended periodic maintenance schedule. This will give you an opportunity to correct such items as wheels that are unbalanced or out of alignment which may not be noticed when you're just

driving around town, but they can cause severe vibration at high speed or develop an uneven wear pattern in just a few hundred miles of turn-pike travel.

Tires are another item to check. Those with badly worn treads should be replaced before you depart. Be sure to inflate your tires to the recommended pressure while they are cold. If you plan to carry a heavy load or drive at high speed, increase tire pressure, but do not exceed the maximum recommended in your owner's manual.

It also pays to check the fan belt and other drive belts and replace any that are in doubtful condition. In addition, inspect the radiator

hoses and replace them if they are soft, swollen or cracked.

You should carry the necessary tools for changing tires or making minor repairs. For safety's sake, take along the basic emergency equipment recommended by auto experts—a flashlight, screw-driver, pliers, tire gauge, extra fan belt, spare sealed beam headlight, flares or reflectors, and a first-aid kit.

If you are going to carry a heavy load, your car may sag at the rear, causing it to wander on the road, or scrape on bumps and point its headlight beams into the trees. Special overload shock absorbers will solve this problem.

### Extension 4-H Youth Agent

THE CHALLENGE OF WORKING WITH YOUTH What kind of leaders do youth like? Dorothy Roberts in her excellent book, Leading Teen-age Groups, helps us summarize the characteristics.

1. Someone who really likes kids, has faith in them, understands them and will accept the noise and confusion and the inevitable mistakes, will go to bat for them, gives more praises than criticisms.

2. Someone they can be proud of -- neat, attractive and unprejudiced (remember -- kids are idealistic). Should be a person they can show off to friends -- "Gee, our leader is just great!" Helps if you have some competence that you can share with them -- good carpenter, good cook -- something they want to learn.

3. Someone who participates enthusiastically -- sings with the group, plays with them, pitches in and does grubby jobs with them. But maintains advisor role in meetings (for example, you may not make motions!)

4. Someone they can count on -- be on time, remember dates, do what you said you would do -- be dependable.

5. Be fair and flexible and admit mistakes or ignorance -- don't be afraid you'll lose face by backing down if it seems

wise and don't feel you must have all the answers.

6. Exert firmness when needed.

7. Have ideas you are willing to share with them -- be willing to be frank and to discuss anything without embarrassment -- but do not impose your ideas on them. They sometimes want advice, but they also want freedom in using it. They should be able to count on you to come up with bright suggestions when they get bogged down, and to have good resource

materials. It should become second nature as you read or listen to TV to jot down ideas that your club could use.

8. Recognize and allow youth initiative. The advisor should be a source of ideas, stimulation and encouragement. Your job is to get them to be self-directive -- to work with leaders whom the group selects (even if you disagree with their choice) and by counseling with them before and after meetings help them grow in leadership, and to get the group to learn to take responsibility. This means you don't always step in to rescue them from their goofs.

Being a good youth advisor and 4-H leader is not an easy job. It is a challenge. It requires much time and effort and is hard work. Often you can feel totally discouraged,

feel that you have made no progress with your group. But it also is one of the most rewarding of jobs. You are in a position to have great influence on your young people's lives if you can see your responsibility in its broadest terms. Teachers and guidance counselors talk about working with the whole child, but they have too many students and too little time. You are in an enviable position to do so. I hope you will feel a real obligation to be concerned about the total development of each of your young people. Check yourself -- do you know about their family situation, about their life in school, their friends, their social life?

learn? You should not be snoopy, but you can learn a lot if you're alert and interested. Never underestimate the potentiality of your influence. It has again been demonstrated the

tremendous positive influence with a single leader can have on a young person. The rewards that come to an adult willing to seek to understand youth, to treat them with respect, to trust them to make

decisions, to allow them to try out adult roles, to help them learn to make independent, wise and socially responsible choices are immeasurable.

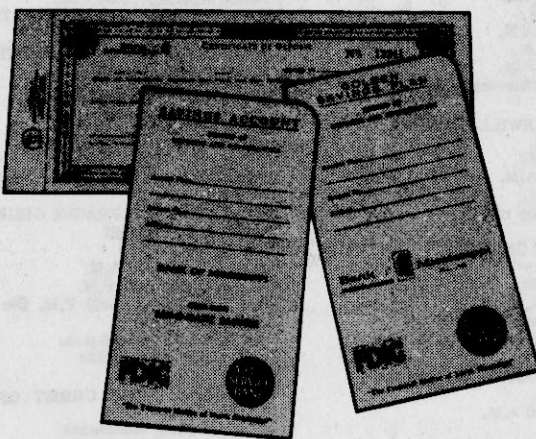

## New Symbol Combines Boll With Word

NEW YORK-- Cotton is getting a new image. A new product symbol incorporating a contemporary cotton boll with the word "cotton" is being put into widespread use by Cotton Incorporated.

The design also serves as part of a new "corporate signature" for Cotton Incorporated, the research, sales and marketing company sponsored by America's cotton growers through their dollar-per-bale program.

"The new symbol registers a powerful recognition," said J. Dukes Wooters Jr., Cotton Incorporated president. "Anyone seeing it for the first time understands immediately that it represents 'cotton.' No explanation is necessary."

The contemporary representation of the centuries old fiber, said Wooters, "creates a new awareness of the natural appeal of cotton."

He said varied applications of the new symbol will give distinctive identity to products made from 100 per cent cotton and from blends containing high percentages of cotton.

"The symbol itself does not change," Wooters explained. "But versatility of application allows its use for pure cotton products or blends. We will be spared the expense and problems that come with using more than one symbol."

The new design consists of a modern artistic rendering of the cotton boll with the word "cotton" in contemporary script. The word grows out of the figure of the boll. Figure and word are indivisible.

The cotton boll and the word "cotton" appear in clean white--the color of processed cotton--against a rectangular background of natural, warm, earth brown. Both design and color are integral to the symbol and to the new identification of the dollar-per-bale company.

Design and color were chosen, Wooters said, after extensive research and analysis, which involved consumers of all ages.

"Over 3,000 preliminary sketches were narrowed down to 12. Those were further reduced to three, which were thoroughly researched, using designs currently in use as control."

The new design was needed to help keep cotton competitive with synthetics Wooters explained.

"Synthetics are relatively new in the marketplace. From the outset, they have aggressively promoted a strong, contemporary look in their graphics."

Wooters said the new symbol will begin appearing in the near future on apparel, personal items, and products for the home.

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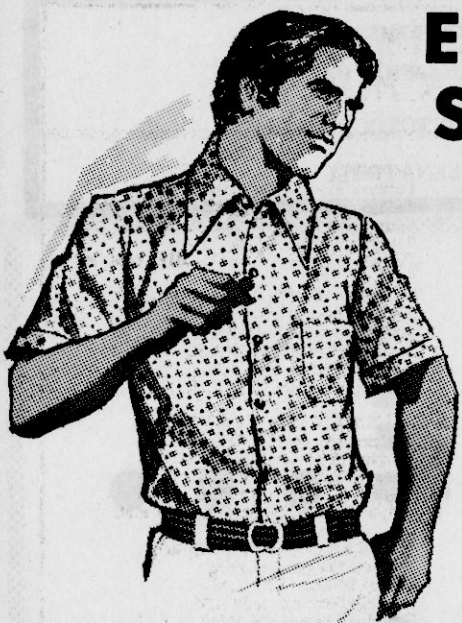

**BUTTERFAT CONTENT**

Milk is priced by its butterfat percentage. This means that every dairyman should do his best to keep his herd test as high or higher than the breed average.

Here are some things dairymen can do to help maintain a normal butterfat test:

Have the animals in good condition at freshening time.

Fast, thorough milking involving all steps of managed milking will help maintain butterfat test.

Kindness pays -- mistreatment causes excitement and lowers tests.

A strict herd health program to reduce diseases will help.

Use a good feed program that includes at least a pound and a half of hay equivalent per 100 pounds body weight of the cow each day. Avoid sudden changes in feed. Do not feed finely ground hay to milking cows.

Proper sanitation, making sure that all equipment is functioning properly, and maintaining the proper temperature of bulk milk before pickup, will help insure proper sampling and accurate testing.

**PASTURES**

Getting clover growing in your permanent grass pastures is one of the best things to improve the quality of your grazing.

A good clover like Regal in fescue, bermudagrass

dallis or bahiagrass will improve quality, increase production and supply nitrogen. White clover requires a pH of 6.0 or above and a good supply of phosphate and potash.

Use 400 to 600 pounds of a 0-20-20 or its equivalent per acre each year to help maintain the grass-clover mixture. Good grazing management keeps grass down and favors clover growth.

**JULY SOYBEANS**

The decision as to how late soybeans can be planted should be based on the individual situation. If only a small percentage of your acreage has yet been planted, there is no better alternative than to plant beans as long as prices continue in the \$5 to \$6 range.

There is less chance of making a normal crop when planting in July, but yields of 20 bushels per acre or more are possible.

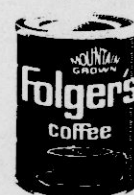

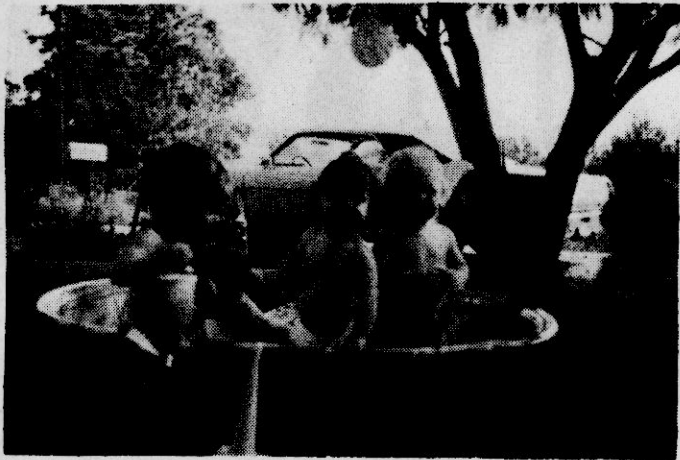

## Marietta Man Had Roll In Skylab....

MARSHALL SPACE flight center, Ala. -- A Marietta man had a role in the development of the Skylab space station, which was launched May 14 by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

He is William Castleberry 1006 N. Hine Street, Athens Ala. Castleberry is an electronics technician at the NASA-Marshall Space Flight Center, the organization responsible for the development of the Skylab.

Castleberry, who has worked at the Marshall Center since August 1963, was graduated from Marietta High School in 1949.

Castleberry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Castleberry of Phil Campbell, Ala. is married to the former Marinel Patton and they

have four children, Jackie 17, Phillip 14, Leisa 10 and William 21.

Skylab, which weighs about 100 tons, is America's first manned space station and was launched into Earth orbit by a giant Saturn V rocket on May 14 from the NASA-Kennedy Space Center, Fla.

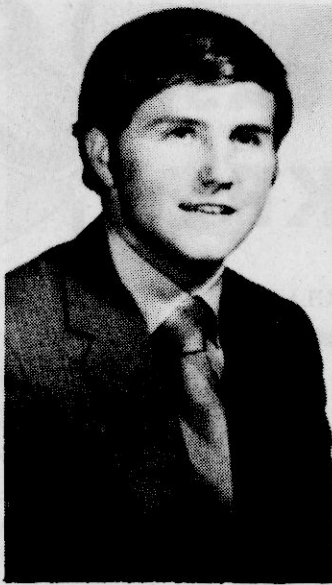
The first three-man crew in an Apollo Command and Service Module was launched May 25 by a Saturn IB, about two weeks later than originally planned.

The astronauts moved into the space station and erected an improvised solar shield, overcoming an internal heat problem that had developed, and set about performing scientific experiments. After this crew returns to Earth, two other

three-man crews will spend up to 56 days each working aboard Skylab.

Skylab, about the size of a small three bedroom house, is in orbit 270 miles up. Some 90 different experiments are being conducted in our first manned orbital research facility; the emphasis is on the practical benefits that space research can bring to man.

The Saturn family of launch vehicles was developed under direction of the Marshall Center where several other major space projects are under way, including the reusable Space Shuttle scheduled to be operational before the end of the decade.

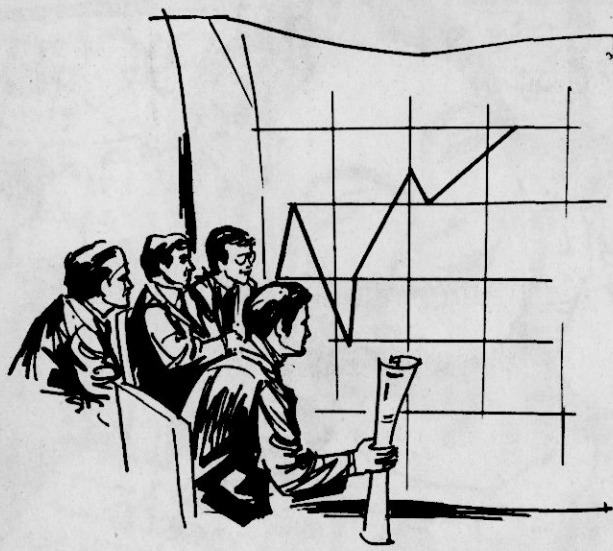

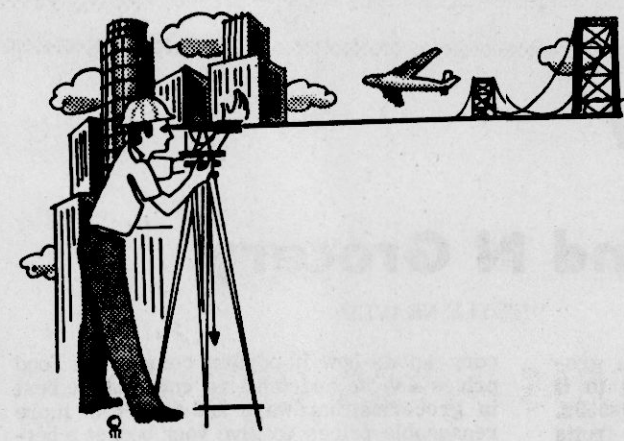
