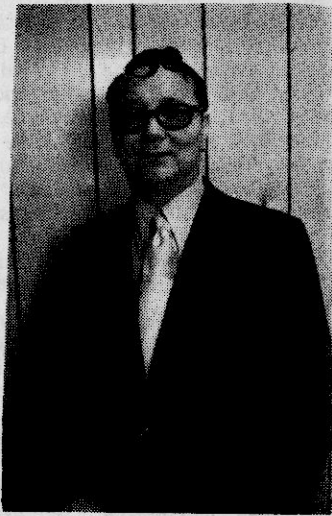

# Atty. Gen. Says 'No'

The Mississippi Attorney General has denied the City of Booneville the right to change from a Mayor-Alderman to a City-Manager type of government without a special election.

Officials of the city said this week that the Attorney General's office gave the negative decision upon a request by the board's attorney, Gene Gifford. Gifford has been requested by the Mayor and Board to seek the decision.

Mayor Charles Steen indicated that a special election would be necessary in order

to make the governmental change. It was also reported that no special time is allotted for such an election.  
Steen said the current aldermen would "probably remain in their respective commissioner posts." This was, of course, pending any change wanted by any of the aldermen.

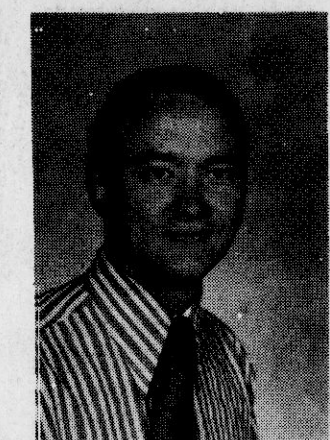

## Solons Will Support County Unit Legislation

Seventy-five percent of the Mississippi legislators responding to a survey on county government have stated they will support county unit legislation in the 1974 legislative session. The survey was conducted over the past several days by the Mississippi Economic Council, which has sponsored for several sessions legislation requiring the unit system for county administration. MEC President J. C. Redd of Jackson said the survey results indicate the Mississippi Legislature "is ready to come to grips with the

soaring costs of local government." Redd said legislators were asked to respond as to whether they would or would not support legislation in 1974 providing for central purchasing, budgeting, planning, and road operations for counties. MEC has recommended the unit system, he emphasized, because it believes the unit system is more efficient than the present beat system under which most of the state's counties are operating. The Council President added that he believes the

survey reflects "the mood of the people who are demanding more economic and efficient use of tax dollars." In the survey, Redd said, only eight percent of the legislators reported they would not support county unit legislation, with the remaining 17 percent adopting a "wait and see" attitude. Approximately 30 percent of the members of the Legislature took part in the survey. Noting that unit legislation has already been prefiled for the 1974 session, the Jackson businessman said the

MEC "hopes county officials will adopt reform measures voluntarily." The state chamber of commerce leader said the poll indicates the state Legislature is ready to initiate county reform in order to "assure good, solid management on the basis of financially sound principles." ## SAE Sets Quality Mark

Have you ever looked at a can of motor oil or brake fluid and wondered what the initials SAE mean? They stand for Society of Automotive Engineers, a technical society formed in 1905 and now consisting of over 30,000 professional engineers from all branches of the industry. They work independently, not representing their companies or affiliations to develop standards and specifications for automobile components and products like headlights, brake fluid, motor oil and brake linings. These standards are voluntary, many of them goals for a manufacturer to work toward when making a particular component. The standards are reviewed each year and updated where the technology in a given area has advanced. The SAE also assists the government, primarily the Department of Transportation, by providing technical expertise and advice.

ings, publications and committees, the SAE and its members are concerned today with problems of energy shortage, vehicle emissions, highway safety, noise, conservation of natural resources and mass transportation, as well as the

bread and butter problems of designing more efficient and more effective motor vehicle parts and components. The consumer derives the ultimate benefit from this scientific research, because these efforts are aimed at providing a safer, more efficiently operating automobile.

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A new activity undertaken by SAE within the past year is its Vehicle Research Institute. Under the Society's management, fundamental research projects are being conducted at universities and research centers. At present, the emphasis is on highway safety, although research centers. The Vehicle Research Institute provides a unique opportunity for industry and government to work together in funding basic studies. ## Last Parcel Of Land Obtained For Natchez Trace Completion

JACKSON, Miss., From path to parkway, the Natchez Trace has become a scenic marker in history winding through hills and valleys capturing along its way visible traces of frontier life that have been carefully preserved by the hand of man. Last month was significant in Natchez Trace history in Mississippi. The Mississippi State Highway Department acquired the last two miles of right of way to be turned over to the Federal Government for completion of this famous parkway in this State.

The estimated length of the completed Trace is 444 miles with 300 of those miles stretching across Mississippi, 33 reaching into Alabama and 101 in Tennessee. Parkway construction and development is undertaken by the Federal Government while land acquisition for right of way designated to

the states. All but three segments of the Trace have been completed in Mississippi. Robert Bell, Right of Way Acquisition Agent for the Natchez Trace Parkway and the Mississippi State Highway Department, said that 11.5 miles between Port Gibson and Mount Locust are still incomplete in addition to 25 miles between Tupelo and the Mississippi-Alabama state line. Thirteen miles around North Jackson from Ridge-land to Clinton is also incomplete.

The Highway Department began acquiring land for the Trace in 1938. Bell who has been the principle acquisition agent for the Trace says that since he began acquiring land 37 years ago, he has dealt with 10,000 property owners in Mississippi and has helped acquire 30,000 acres of right of way

for the Parkway. In 1970, Bell received the Post Rider Award from the National Park Service an award given to an individual who has made an outstanding contribution in the Natchez Trace's development.

Although the idea of restoration of the Natchez Trace Parkway was originated by the Daughters of the American Revolution and the United Daughters of the War of 1812, it was first motivated by an unusual man who called himself Colonel Jim Walton. It is reported that one day Walton walked into the Houston office of Congressman Jeff Busby, then representing the second Mississippi District in the United States House of Representatives and asked him to introduce a bill that would provide for paving of the Natchez Trace. "Of course," added Walton, "it won't pass, but we owe this

compliment to the ladies." Busby introduced two bills Old Natchez Trace in his childhood returned to Washington and went straight to the Library of Congress for information on the old Indian trail. After extensive research, Busby who had lived on the in Congress on February 15, 1934; one to appropriate \$50,000 for a survey of the famous old road; and the other to authorize the appropriation of \$25,000 to 'construct a national highway on the route of the old Natchez Trace leading from Nashville, Tennessee to Natchez, Mississippi-to be known as the Natchez Trace Parkway.'

His enthusiasm spread to Senator Hubert D. Stevens of Mississippi who introduced an identical bill into the United States Senate.

Also with the influence of Senator Harrison, who was a friend of Franklin D. Roosevelt, then President of the United States, passage of the bill was secured. The bill became law on May 21, 1934 which made the Natchez Trace Parkway one of the eight units of the National Park System.

Today a two-lane blacktop, free from commercial vehicles, sweeps across Mississippi, rolling with the land and curving around creeks and rivers. Despite the pavement of the Trace, there are still traces of pioneer life which have been restored by the Park Service Staff of more than a hundred. They have restored Mount Locust, an early tavern complete with its frontier furniture and utensils.

Emerald Mound, the third largest Indian Mound in the United States is a major attraction on the Trace. Other bits of Indian life can be seen in markers, trails and exhibits located at the Chickasaw Village near Tupelo and Byrum Mounds near Houston. The Natchez Trace Parkway is a memorable route to take across Mississippi-a route which links yesterday with today.

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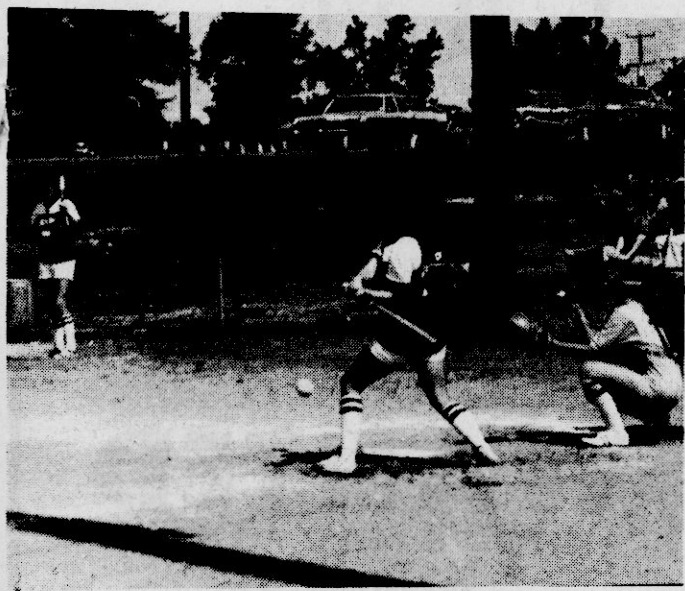

DIAMOND BITS  
AND PIECES

As a jeweler, I try to keep up with gemological news. The popular press reports to you on such things as the price of gold, but my more specialized reading material has some items not generally released. 1973 is an interesting year, gemologically speaking. Here are some items I would like to share with you.

A new diamond shape has appeared in South Africa. It is so unique that its inventor has patented his cutting process. The resultant stone -- called the Barion Cut -- has a square top with a round, brilliant pavilion. I've yet to see this unique shape, but will carry news of it when I do.

The world's diamond supply comes mainly from South Africa. However, Russia has always claimed great, untapped diamond mines in Siberia. Now China is getting into the act. An international publication on diamonds quoted radio Peking as saying the People's Republic is producing diamonds in good quantity. There was a reported increase of 70% in 1972. An added -- and unlikely -- note was that the Chinese are not impressed by diamonds -- even gem quality diamonds are being used for industrial purposes.

We all know about Chinese austerity. It doesn't extend to jewelry prices, however. A jewelry shop in a new, tourist-oriented Friendship Store was showing a jade-set ring for \$95,000.

India was the site of the world's first diamond mines. Mining began here in the sixteenth century and continued until huge strikes were found in Brazil in 1795. Recently, a geological study was made of India's ancient diamond mines and they show great promise. The recently reopened mines could produce \$15 million a year in diamonds. The supply could last half a century -- maybe more -- if modern mining methods are employed.

Any news about increasing the world's diamond supply is good news to me.

# Mississippians Have Voice In Battle

Mississippians have a voice in the battle against drugs through the state's Drug Affairs Advisory Council, according to council chairman Dr. Milton Baxter.

Dr. Baxter, who is also the executive director of the Governor's Office of Education and Training, said the council seeks input from citizens at the grassroots level.

Formerly known as the Governor's Drug Study Council, the group originally was an interagency study group. Now, under its new title--the Drug Affairs Advisory Council--its membership has been expanded to include, in addition to agency people, young people, members of the general public, non-agency people, and people who are interested in and involved in on-agency drug programs.

Dr. Baxter said he has assigned a member of the staff of the Governor's Office of Education and Training--David Speights--as coordinator and director of the council's programs.

"This council," said Dr. Baxter, "is the state's advisory body to the Division of Drug Affairs. The Di-

vision is the state's planning agency for drug programs. As such, it is responsible for coordination of planning activities, and it serves as the clearinghouse for all drug abuse prevention functions in the state, except for law enforcement programs, and we cooperate fully with those."

In recent action, the council approved a curriculum for a two-week instruction course at the University of Mississippi Medical Center July 23 through August 3 for persons designated by their respective school boards to serve as drug education specialists in each of Mississippi's 150 public school districts, as authorized by the state legislature earlier this year.

The 1973 law gives the State Department of Education and the Governor's Office of Education and Training the joint responsibility for developing the curriculum, which includes lectures on drug use and abuse, understanding human behavior, methods of determining priority for programming to meet school and community needs, techniques of communicating and counseling on drug problems, management of drug and alcohol prevention programs within the school system, and many other related subjects.

"No one expects a two-week course to turn out experts who know everything there is to know about a subject as complex as drug abuse," said Dr. Baxter.

"But we do expect these specialists to be able to establish meaningful communication with the students in their respective schools--and with parents and with other members of the community."

Dr. Baxter said the school based drug education specialists are just one part

of a total statewide picture insofar as the battle against drug abuse is concerned.

He invited Mississippians to call upon the Drug Affairs Advisory Council for information on drug abuse, for literature on the subject, and for any other related service.

## Paint May Be Shinier Due To New Process

The shiny coat of paint on new cars in the near future may be just a little shinier as well as offer better resistance to salt spray and weathering because of a technological breakthrough in the manufacturing process.

Several car and truck manufacturers are testing a process whereby paint is applied in powder form rather than the conventional liquid. The powder paint is made by reducing liquid paint to either a talcum powder or watery "slurry" form.

The powder is then applied with a spray gun which puts a positive charge on each particle. Compressed air shoots the charged powder onto the metal which has a negative ground causing it to adhere evenly. The thickness of the coating is controlled by the amount of electricity. Any overspray of the substance can be simply scraped off since it is in powder form. After the powder is applied, the car goes through a bake oven to fuse the coating. The powder process is said to produce a higher gloss paint film with better adhesion.

There are other benefits. Little or no air pollution results from the powder method as compared to liquid paints which produce emissions as they dry. The in-

flammable liquid solvents also present a fire hazard which the powder paints do not.

Powder paints help to conserve natural gas. According to one car manufacturer, approximately half the winter gas consumption by assembly plants in the Northern states is used to heat the fresh air supply needed for the paint spray booths.

Powder painting significantly reduces gas requirements because it requires considerably less fresh air during application.

The process is already being used by one auto manufacturer as the topcoat finish on the wheels of some of its 1973 light trucks. Other applications are expected to follow.

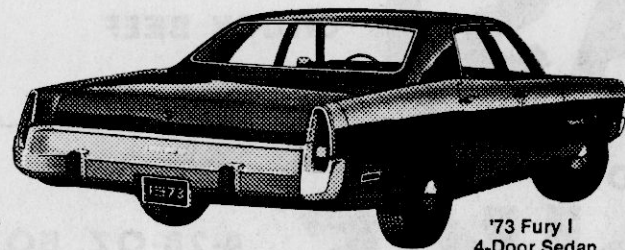

## Price Freeze Covers Businesses

JACKSON, Miss - Internal Revenue officials have begun new efforts to dispell any false impression held by the small business community that small

business community that small businesses are not required to follow regulations governing the current Price Freeze.

Richard J. Stakem, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Mississippi, today reminded small businesses that their prices must conform to freeze requirements.

"While we have indications that the majority of busines-

ses are complying with the freeze, some reports indicate there may be some misunderstanding about small business being covered."

"President Nixon's order establishing the freeze stated that 'each seller' is required to maintain a list of freeze prices. That means small businesses as well as the large ones. Under the current freeze, there is no small business exemption."

Mr. Stakem also commented on the state cigarette and gasoline taxes which went into effect July 1. "While it is true that merchants can increase their prices to cover the tax, merchants

The Internal Revenue Service is anxious that the small business community comply with regulations rather than run the risk of penalties for non-compliance. Violators are subject to a civil penalty of not more than \$2,500 for each violation.

-- no matter what their size -- may not increase prices more than the tax."

This means that merchants may raise the price of gasoline one cent per gallon over the amount charged during June 1 through June 8. Likewise, the price of cigarettes may be increased two cents per pack over the June 1 through June 8 price.

#### A LOOK AT DESIGN

What is design? It is the selection and arrangement of colors, textures, shapes and lines. Its purpose is to create order and beauty in an article like a chair or a vase, or it can be a grouping of objects used together such as furnishings in a room.

There are two types of design -- structural and decorative. Structural designs should be suitable and appropriate for use and care, in good proportion and accurately made of suitable materials. If decorative design is added it should be simple, enhancing the object, related to its background in color, texture, line and shape and used at the structural points of an article or be used to relieve a sense of bareness on a

surface.

Remember that some objects are beautiful in themselves and need no decorative design to enhance their beauty. There should be honesty in design, but it should be honesty in design, but it should not imitate another object, a well designed object does what it is supposed to do. Take a look at some cups for instance. Look at the handles. Which one is the easiest to pick up, etc.?

Most of us like to have some of our possessions enriched with decorations or trimming. For a pleasing effect plan or choose decorations that follows the shape of an article or its basic construction lines.

## Bank Of Miss., Olive Branch Stockholders Approve Merge

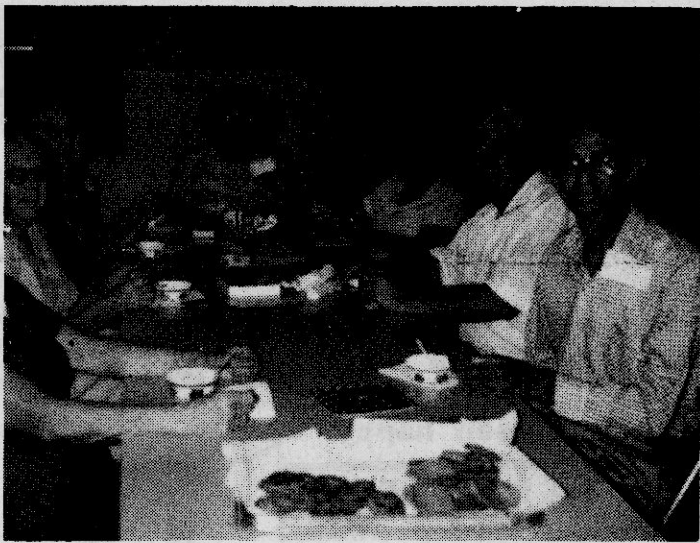

## Teachers Return To Classrooms For Study

Forty-five school teachers from all sections of Mississippi returned to the classroom July 16-20 for a week of conservation study at the University of Mississippi Forest Lands near Perkins. They found that class often met in the middle of a Mississippi pine forest.

The teachers were attending the tenth annual Teachers Conservation Workshop. The workshop is sponsored by the Mississippi Forestry Association, an organization of some 1400 timberland owners, forest product manufacturers and suppliers. It is designed to strengthen conservation education in Mississippi schools.

During the week the teachers divided their time between classroom instruction and enlightening field trips. They studied such subjects as soils, water, recreation, fish and wildlife, forest management, timber products, and the environment, among many others.

A total of twenty authorities from private industry, agencies and the field of education served as instructors for the workshop.

For attending the workshop the teachers were given the opportunity to earn three hours of graduate credit through Mississippi State University.

The teachers will take the information gained on wise natural resource use and return it to their classroom prepared to teach an organized lesson on conservation, according to Walter Dennis, International Paper Company, Natchez, Workshop Chairman. "Ideally, this will enhance the learning opportunities for Mississippi students in the varied fields of conservation education," Dennis said.

During the week teachers were housed in air conditioned cabins in a woodland setting, attended classes in air-conditioned classrooms, and ate in airconditioned dining

room at the Forest Lands. But they also spent some sixteen hours out-of-doors on field trips.

Cooperating with the Mississippi Forestry Association in staging the workshop are Mississippi State University, University of Mississippi and State Department of Education.

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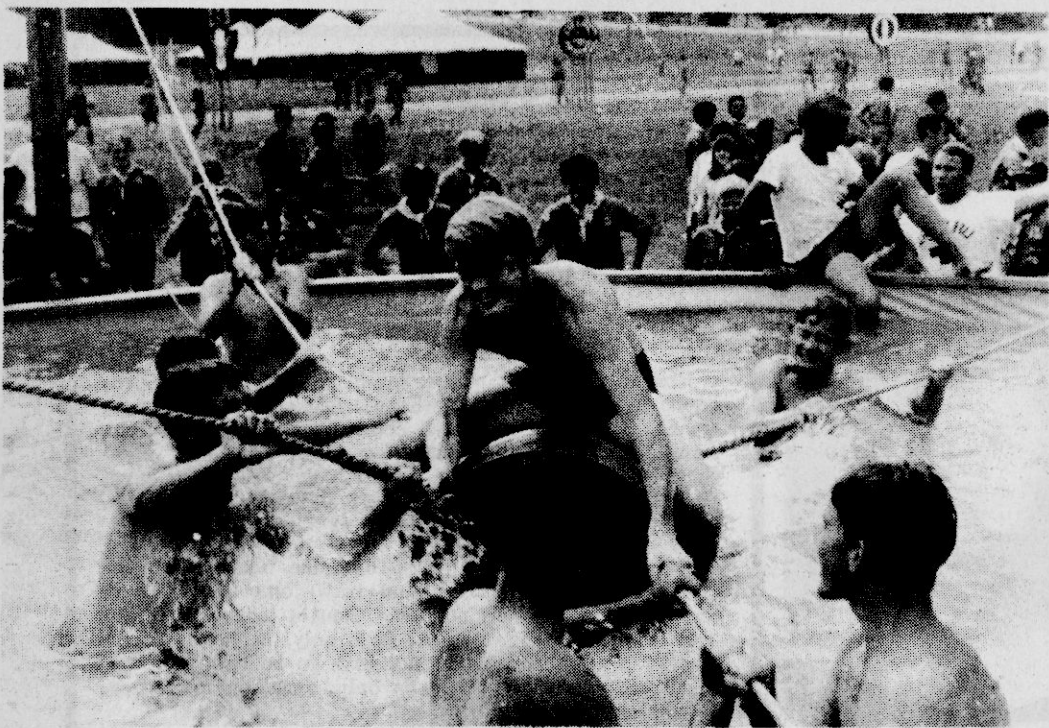
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Jamboree Fun

Agriculture Department Begins New food Program

WASHINGTON, D.C.--The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced the start of a new pilot Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC).

The WIC Program, authorized by Public Law 92-433, will be administered by USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

FNS will provide cash grants to Health Departments or comparable State agencies to make supplemental foods available to pregnant and lactating women, infants, and children up to 4 years. The system of delivery may include the distribution of food health clinics, the issuance of food vouchers redeemable at retail stores, or any other method a State may select.

The pilot program will operate through June 30, 1974, in selected areas. It may be carried out in any area, without regard to whether the area is operating a Food Stamp Program or a food Distribution Program.

Project areas will be required to maintain medical records on participants, and the information will be used to evaluate the effect of the supplemental food on the women, infants and children who take part.

A local agency may apply for the program if:

- It provides health services to residents of areas in which a substantial number of persons have low incomes,
- It serves women, infants, and children,
- Its staff includes competent medical personnel to examine persons receiving health services, and
- Its facilities include equipment for conducting evaluation tests.

Participants are eligible for the pilot program if:

- They live in an approved project area,
- They are eligible for medical treatment at reduced cost from a local agency serving the project area in which they live, and
- They are determined by competent medical personnel of the local agency to be in need of supplemental food.

The following foods will be authorized for distribution:

- To infants - Iron-fortified infant formula, infant cereal, whole milk, and fruit juice.
- To children - Milk, cheese, cereal, fruit or vegetable juice and eggs.
- To pregnant or lactating women - Milk, cheese, cereal, fruit or vegetable juice, and eggs.

Final regulations for the operation of the program are scheduled to be published in the Federal Register on Friday, July 13. To expedite the introduction of the program, comments and suggestions will not be sought on these regulations.

The five Regional Offices of the Food and Nutrition Service will immediately start to contact State Health Departments, to advise them of operating details of the new program, and to determine their interest in participating in it.

The Southeast Regional Office at Atlanta, Ga., supervises FNS programs in eight states--Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, South Carolina, North Carolina, Mississippi and Tennessee.

WHY BE BAPTIZED?

There is modern concept of the reason for being baptized and in plain language this reason is stated that baptism is "an outward sign of inward works." Many ministers preach this is the reason for being baptized. "It is an answer of good conscience toward God." I have no idea where these ideas are obtained from nor where they originated, I would suppose where a lot of ideas concerning religion come from, but certainly not from the Bible. Let us look at what the Bible says about this subject.

In Acts 2:38 it says "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins." Now this in plain simple language tells that a person is to be baptized and then states the reason for being baptized. Notice it says "for the remission of sins." Therefore when a person is baptized his sins that he has committed are then remitted or done away with. Now notice please in Acts 22:16 where Paul is telling about his conversion he says "And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." Here again is given the reason for being baptized which is to wash away thy sins.

Now anything so important as this must be done the Bible way or the effect of what you are doing it for cannot be obtained. Passage Of Bill Important Step

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Senator John C. Stennis, D. Miss., urged passage of a bill he co-authored that is designed to define the powers of Congress and the President in declaring war.

Senator Stennis, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, described passage of the bill as "an important step by the Congress to assume its duty in representing the people of this nation" on the question of going to war.

"We have learned in very recent history that a war, if not supported by a majority of the people, can lead to damage of the national spirit," Senator Stennis said. "It is of the utmost importance to the future of this nation that we not gradually slip into a war that does not have the moral support and sanction of the American people."

The senator's statement was issued during debate on a "War Powers" bill limiting conditions under which United States armed forces may be committed to hostilities with and without prior Congressional approval and how long hostilities may continue without Congressional approval.

Unless the bill is passed, Stennis warned "the precise scope of responsibility will remain unclear, and Congress will again someday fail to live up to its responsibilities."

Passage of the bill "will reduce the chance that this nation will again go to war without unity, without an expression of national will through Congressional authorization," he argued.

Senator Stennis said a weaker version of the legislation now under consideration in the House of Representatives "would move in some measure" to balance the powers of the legislative and executive branches, but added, "It is my hope that the House and Senate will be able to agree on a strong bill that will clearly define the powers" of the two branches.

"We are just emerging from a long war that has been

expensive in every major way, loss of life, physical injuries and staggering money costs.

"The results have been far from satisfactory, and worse still, our people have been divided. It was an undeclared war.

"Even though the war was undeclared and the people were divided, we had such a strong reservoir of patriotism in the minds and hearts of our people, we were able to hold together and endure.

"We will not be able to do this again.

"The people will not again support a war that Congress is unwilling to declare," Senator Stennis predicted.
