### Who Is This Invader?

"Beachhead at Bethlehem." That could well have been the headline had Jerusalem published a newspaper in the days of Jesus Christ. But the news from Bethlehem was not simply that a good man was born nor that a wise teacher had arrived, but that God Himself had invaded this world. Jesus Christ is Immanuel, God with us. The Bible says, "Great is the mystery of godliness, God manifest in the flesh" (I Timothy 3:16).

But, what do we mean by these terms, the deity of Christ, or Jesus is the Son of God? These terms are often so employed today as to mean something quite contrary to the Bible and to historic Christian faith. When a man says he believes in the deity of Christ, or when he says that he believes Jesus is God, the significance of these statements depends entirely upon what the man who made them means by the terms, deity of God. But here is where the confusion comes in, for as someone has perceptively observed, the modern religious liberal uses the same vocabulary but a different dictionary.

Now the historic Christian meaning of the term, "deity of Christ," is fairly clear. The Christian believes that there is a personal God, Creator, and Ruler of the universe, a God who is infinite, eternal, and unchangeable. So when the Christian says that Jesus Christ is God, or when he says that he believes in the deity of Christ, he means that that same person who is known to history as Jesus of Nazareth, before he became a man, existed from all eternity as the infinite, eternal, and unchangeable God, the second person of the Holy Trinity.

The church historically has used three terms to describe the relationship of Jesus Christ to God the Father. The church as declared that Jesus is co-equal, consubstantial, and co-eternal with God the Father. By the term, co-eternal, the church simply means that Jesus Christ is as eternal as

God the Father. As there was never a time when God the Father did not exist, even so there was never a time when Jessus Christ did not exist. The Bible says, "In the beginning was the Word. And the Word was with God. And the Word was God. That same One (Jesus) was in the beginning with God" (John 1:1,2). Jesus Christ is as eternal as God the Father.

By the term, consubstantial, the church means that Jesus Christ shares equally all the attributes of God the Father. Whatever we can attribute to God the Father, we can attributte to Jesus Christ. Is God omnipotent? So is Jesus. Is Good eternal? So is Jesus. Is God omniscient? So is Jesus. Is God immutable, changeless? So is Jesus Christ, for the Bible says, "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today and forever."

'Third, since Jesus Christ is co-eternal and consubstantial with God the Father, then it follows logically that Jesus Christ is co-equal with God the Father. Jesus is as fully God as the Father. Jesus himself said, "I and the Father are one," (John 10:30); and by that Jesus Christ meant, I and the Father possess the same nature. Furthermore, the Bible says that "all men should honor the Son even as they honor the Father. He that honoreth not the Son honoreth not the Father which hath sent Him'' (John 5:23). That is to say, he that denies that Jesus is God, also denies that the Father is God. Jesus Christ is God manifest in the flesh.

Someone, however, may object, Is it really important to maintain so dogmatically the deity of Jesus Christ? Could we simply not admit that Jesus was merely a good man and still be Christians? The answer to that is, No. The death of Jesus Christ is God's only remedy for sin. Jesus came into this world to die for our sins. But the value of His death rests altogether on the dignity of His Person. It is the infinite dignity of His Person that gives infinite atoning value to his death. It is only because Jesus Christ is God that his blood can cleanse men from all their sins. It is only because Jesus Christ is God that He is adequate to meet the ultimate problems of life and to give men a reason for living. And it is only because Jesus Christ is God that he can say to men today, "Come unto me all ye that labor and that are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).

USLA RESCINDS BAGGING AND BALE TIES SPECIFICA-TIONS FOR 1974-CROP C'OTTON: Washington, Sept. 13--The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced that detailed speci-fications now applicable to bagging and bale ties used im packaging cotton tendered to Commodity Credit Corporattion (CCC) under its cotton loan program will be discomtinued beginning with the 1974 crop of cotton.

Under the change bagging and bale tie specifications will limited to more general provisions which apply currently, perhaps augmented by other provisions of a general nature as are deemed appropriate. All bagging qualifying under present regulations would, of course, continue to be eligible under the broader standards announced.

Examples of possible additions were described in the Notice of Proposed Rule Mak-

ing published in the Federal Register on May 17, 1973. As in the past, experimental materials being tested under the auspices of the Joint In-dustry Bale Packaging Committee will be exempt from the general provisions.

The May 17 notice stated that detailed specifications for bale packaging materials were being reviewed to determine whether they should be continued, modified, or rescinded for the 1974 crop. Views and recommendations of interested parties were solicited. Almost all dents recommended retention of detailed specifications now applicable. The dominant reasons expressed for doing so related to two points: (A) an interest in maintaining a uniform tare, and (b) concern that the quality of wrapping materials would deteriorate through competitive pressure in the absence of Government regulation.

WAYS TO USE LEFTOVERS Don't throw good leftover food away. Use cooking skill and imagination to make leftovers tasty. Using leftovers is another way to stretch the food dollar. Some leftovers make good

meals merely by reheating. Others are better prepared in a new way -- with seasonings, sauces, crisp toppings or other variations. Try leftover fruit in muf-

fins or vegetables in omelets. Substitute 2 leftover egg yolks for 1 whole egg in baked custard. Make soups richer and more delicious by adding left-

Try one of these suggestions for using leftovers: \* Egg yolks in baked custard, cakes, cookies, homemade noodles, and scrambled

eggs. \* Egg whites in cakes, meringue and souffles.

\* Hard-cooked egg or yolk in casseroles, egg sauce, gar-nish, salads, sandwiches and thousand island dressing. \* Cooked meats, poultry, fish

in casseroles, creamed foods, curries, hash, patties, pot-pies, salads and sandwiches. \* Cooked or canned fruits in fruit cups, fruit sauces, ge-latin desserts, prune cake, quick breads, salads, short-cake, upside-down cake and yeast breads.

\* Bread in bread pudding; croutons; dry crumbs for breading meat, poultry or fish; fondues, french toast, meat loaf, salmon loaf and MAINTAINING DESIRABLE

My next memorable love for Booneville concerns the Dalton reunion held annually. My hair will never get too grey wherein I can forget these festive gatherings. Having been privileged to partake of gourmet cooking round the world nothing excelled Dalton reunion chess ple, lemon meringue, country ham, etc. The climatic pay off was one year when Gus Mc-Claren sent from Tupelo two five gallon ice cream free-zers to Booneville on the early afternoon train!

Lacey Rees, Roy Green and myself were deputized to han-dle the transfer. "'You better believe it we properly fol-lowed thru on the imitiative!" The other outstandling event was a spontaneous political debate, participants being Terry Rees, Terry Miller, and Sam Dalton. Their combined blood pressures must have been at least 1000 over 500! Gud McClarens Mother (Aunt Sis) was a Dallton.

My next memorable Booneville event was a lhorse and buggy ride to Tupielo. Besides myself were Lacey Rees and Cecil Carter. This was a jubilant experience and many times we sung "The old grey mare ain'tt what she

My next commemdation to

Booneville relates to a football game against Corinth. The former put on a stellar performance, I believe victorious. I was impressed by their fine backfield consisting of Gibson, Rees, Carter and either Johnsey or Jones. Th-ough neither of the Shenault brothers participating, I am glad to pay tribute to their skill. Also, I recollect an excellent tennis player, Jimmy Lee Hodges.

oneville was an incredible thrill. It related to a request to interview the medical director of East Texas. State Hospital at Terrell, Texas. On presenting this elderly official with my identification card he scrutimized same. Then he remarked "over fifty years ago I knew a Hoyle who married a Young in Prentiss County, Mississ-

ippil This afforded me with

one of the greatest thrills of my sixty eight years by re-

minding him "they were my grandparents!"

Lastly, another incredible experience involving Booneville came my way. This happened in 1943 in far away North Africa, in the large city of Algiers. The occasion was my serving as a Naval Officer. Information had reached me that Floyd

Cunningham, in the Army, was stationed in Algiers. Luckily after some investigation I was successful in locating him. Naturally he was surprised resulting in a most beneficial visit for both.

Summarizing, I am inex-pressibly proud of my Pren-tiss County heritage. However "with corrup minds, de-destitute of truth" running

rampant through every segment of society, their moorings have been cut adrift be-cause we their heirs "have failed to preserve the ancient landmarks set up by our forefathers''! We see before

Federal Bank Regulations impose a substantial penalty If (1) a Certificate of Deposit is redeemed prior to maturity; or (2) a Certificate of Deposit is converted to one paying a higher interest rate. In either case, the holder would forfeit 90 days Interest, and the rate of interest of the Certificate of Deposit would be reduced to the same rate as Regular Savings (4½% interest), retroactive to the date of issue of the Certificate of Deposit.

For example, a customer with a \$1,000 Certificate of Deposit at 5½% interest requests to redeem it prior to maturity or convert it to a 7% Savers Investment Certificate. He would, under the Federal Regulation, forfeit 90 days interest, and the rate of interest oh hin 5½% Certificate of Deposit would be reduced to 4½%, retroactive to the date of issue of the original 5½% Certificate of Deposit.

In addition, Federal Regulations require that when a Certificate of Deposit is used as security for a loan, the rate of interest paid by the bank on the Certificate od Deposit for the period of time it secures the loan, must be at least 2% per annum less than the rate charged on the loan.






