Master Charge

Can Be Used Now

Car owners in Prentiss County this year for the first time may purchase their automobile registration tags from the tax assessor's and collector's office using Master Charge.

IN \$1.5 MILLION LAW SUIT

City Wins Case

A \$1.5 million law suit against the City of Booneville and six local men was dismissed in federal district court the past week in Aberdeen.

The judgement noted "that the plaintiff, Charline Hamilton, Administratrix of the Estate of Carey Clayton Yates, take nothing from her said action, and the complaint be and it is hereby dismissed with prejudice against defendants, Jess Chaffin, Travis McGaughy, J. D. Burns, and Clyde Edge, Jr. Judge William C. Keady presided.

The suit charged the city

of Booneville and the six men with depriving a 15-year old Rienz youth of his constitutional rights.

The suit was filed in U.S. District Court by the Ashland firm of Farese and Jones

on behalf of Mrs. Elizabeth G. Yates Morgan.

Mrs. Morgan's son, Cary Clayton Yates, 15, hung himself Christmas Eve of 1971 while an inmate at the city jail.

According to the petition filed in court, the youth was arrested on charges of public drunkenness, failure to obey an officer and shooting firecrackers within the city limits by officers Jess Chaffin and Travis McGaughy.

The petition maintained Yates asked that he be allowed to make a phone call, but he was refused.

The law firm of Cunningham and Cunningham of Booneville represented the city in the case.

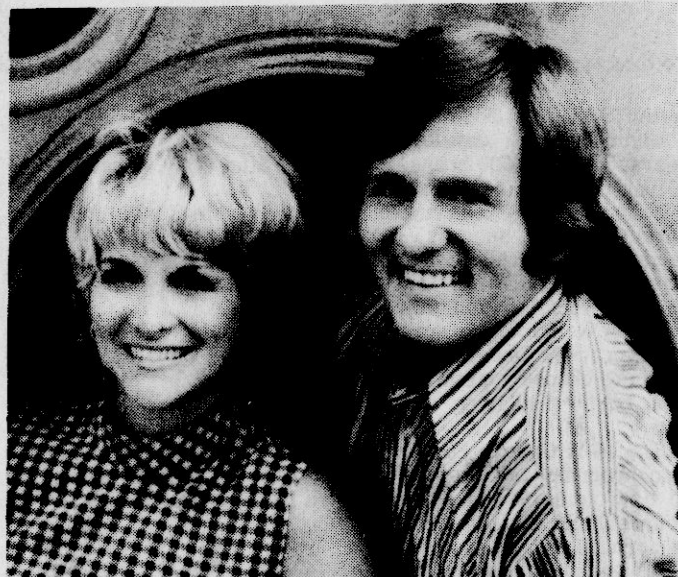
Marietta Fish Fry

Harvey Comes To Rescue

EDITOR'S NOTE-- The following article is being reprinted from the July issue of the Mississippi Economic Council's publication "Action". The article indicates columnist and commentator Paul Harvey's conception of the State of Mississippi. Recently a Chicago-based magazine, "Lifestyle," labeled Mississippi the "worst state in the union."

The article prompted the Mississippi Economic Council and other organizations and individuals to action in defense of the state.

The Council was one of several organizations providing information for nationally-known news columnist and commentator Paul Harvey. Following is Mr. Harvey's response to "Lifestyle." Mr. Harvey's remarks were broadcast June 2, 1973.

Mississippi means business.

Mississippi - underdeveloped, underpopulated, underrated Mississippi - has seen the impossible dream come true: spectacular social and economic progress on a balanced budget.

Last year and next, there is no red ink in that state's budget and - at the same time - the ugly duckling has become a swan.

Recently a yankee magazine called "Lifestyle" categorized Mississippi as "the worst state in the union."

That magazine, recognizing where it's circulation is, gave first place to "Connecticut."

The superficial "study" does not deserve repetition or contradiction.

But it's going to get both.

We cannot measure real progress in dollars and cents. In some states which have less in the bank, the best things in life are free.

But wealth, culture, health and security are measurable. Mississippi has the least per capita income of any state but...

Mississippi, for ten years, has made the greatest improvement in per capita income of any state.

While nationally the percentage increase was 76.9 percent, Mississippi's percentage increase was 118.5 percent!

Explanation is never as quotable as accusation, but before the people of Connecticut spend their higher per capita income, they should be reminded that their per capita taxes are higher, also.

\$485 per person compared to Mississippi's \$296.

This, plus Connecticut's higher cost of living, leaves its citizens poorer-not richer.

Connecticut's cost-of-living index is 22.4 percent higher than the national average; Mississippi's is 9.5 percent less than the national average.

Mississippi has proportionately more churches than any state; one for every 289 persons-where nationally we average one per 814.

Foundation For Democracy

The Mississippi Economic Council, interested in operations of government at all levels, notes there is more at stake than usual in local elections in the next years which makes the "usual good reasons" for your participation more important than ever.

The "usual reasons" are that local officials know your problems best, are in a position to spend your money more wisely, and should care about improving your community. Sending problems (and most of the money to solve them) to Washington or the state capital in many cases has proved to be an ineffective and expensive way to avoid responsibility for action on local needs.

Now we have federal revenue sharing. Local officials are responsible for the prudent spending of the dollars the federal government is returning to the community. The reasoning behind the circular route our money takes is somewhat mind-boggling, but local officials now have a responsibility they cannot slough off: using federal money to meet

FATHER-IN-LAW PROBLEMS

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: My husband's father is in his 70s and has recently moved in with us.

He doesn't bathe regularly, argues with me, and, although he loves the children, interferes with our discipline of them. Can you make any suggestions? -- L.O., St. Paul, Minn.

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: If you feel the situation is becoming intolerable, talk it over with your husband if you haven't already. He's your husband's father and it's really his place to attempt to work out a practical solution. It's not likely the situation will improve unless the air is cleared.

Tell your husband exactly what his father is doing which you object to. Make any suggestions you feel necessary, then let him handle the situation. One suggestion is to make the father-in-law's living facilities more private by giving him a private entrance if possible, a television set, radio, books, and encourage him to become active thus keeping him busy.

He shouldn't be deprived of seeing or playing with the children or even having access to the rest of your home. However, definite guidelines should be set, now, before the problem becomes unmanageable.

MARRYING TO REFORM

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: I am engaged to a man who drinks excessively. I'm from a background which doesn't tolerate any kind of alcoholic beverages. However, I feel that I can change him after we get married. What do you think? -- S.I., Chicago

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: Evidence indicates that marrying someone with the hopes of reforming whether it be drinking, promiscuity, drugs or whatever doesn't always succeed. If he doesn't stop drinking now when he knows how you feel about it, it's doubtful that he'll change too much after marriage.

When two people are in love, they tend to make every effort not to offend each other. In fact, the idea is to please each other as much as possible. However, in your case, your fiancé is making no effort to stop drinking even though he must know how you feel.

I suggest not rushing into marriage yet. If drinking is something you feel you can't tolerate, marrying someone like your fiancé can give you untold problems. Date him longer; if he changes, fine. If he doesn't, seriously reconsider the entire relationship. Maybe he isn't the right person for you.

WAYS TO USE LEFTOVERS

Don't throw good leftover food away. Use cooking skill and imagination to make leftovers tasty. Using leftovers is another way to stretch the food dollar.

Some leftovers make good meals merely by reheating. Others are better prepared in a new way -- with seasonings, sauces, crisp toppings or other variations.

Try leftover fruit in muffins or vegetables in omelets. Substitute 2 leftover egg yolks for 1 whole egg in baked custard. Make soups richer and more delicious by adding leftovers.

Try one of these suggestions for using leftovers:

* Egg yolks in baked custard, cakes, cookies, homemade noodles, and scrambled eggs.

* Egg whites in cakes, meringue and souffles.

* Hard-cooked egg or yolk in casseroles, egg sauce, garnish, salads, sandwiches and thousand island dressing.

* Cooked meats, poultry, fish in casseroles, creamed foods, curries, hash, patties, potpies, salads and sandwiches.

* Cooked or canned fruits in fruit cups, fruit sauces, gelatin desserts, prune cake, quick breads, salads, shortcake, upside-down cake and yeast breads.

* Bread in bread pudding; croutons; dry crumbs for breaded meat, poultry or fish; fondue, french toast, meat loaf, salmon loaf and stuffings.

MAINTAINING DESIRABLE

WEIGHT -- It is best to maintain desirable weight for one's height, at all ages, even during childhood. Here are two principles that you can use.

* Reduce food intake as you become less active. Exercise and activity use up energy or calories. If you cut down activity but not food, you are providing more energy than the body needs.

* Reduce food intake as you -- as an adult -- get older. As adults grow older, less energy is needed to keep the body functioning.

To reduce food intake without shortchanging the body of essential nutrients, follow the pattern of choices suggested by the Basic Four of Daily Food Guide.

The Basic Four for adults suggests two or more servings of meat or alternates, two or more servings of milk or milk products, four or more servings of bread and cereal plus four or more servings of fruit and vegetables each day.

Weight watchers need the same types of food for health as everyone else. Crash diets and food fads are not the answer and may be dangerous to health.

Snacks are counted as a part of the day's total food. Sensible snacking can help meet nutritional needs, but indiscriminate eating between meals usually leads to more calories and less nutrients than are wanted.

THREE PLANTING

It is still too early to plant trees, but here are some points to ponder when the season for planting does get here.

Dig a hole large enough for the natural spread of the roots. Loosen soil in bottom of hole and plant the tree at the same depth at which it grew in the nursery.

Do not let the roots dry out before the tree is planted. Keep them moist.

Stake to anchor the tree. You can anchor the tree with wires threaded through a section of garden hose to prevent damaging bark.

Prune off one third of the branches so the roots will be able to feed the remaining top. Cut branches next to stem or trunk. Do not destroy the natural form of the tree.

Replace the subsoil with good top soil high in humus in bottom of hole. Mulch the newly planted tree. Water often with a good soaking. Fix a dish-shaped depression around tree so that it will hold water.

WEED CONTROL

Tall grasses and weeds around fence rows, sheds, barns, and other outbuildings does not have a very pleasing effect on the landscape. The grass and weeds can be removed easily and economically with chemicals.

Paraquat, cocodylic acid and weed oils offer excellent activity killing only the weeds sprayed. Adding kar-mex, simazine or strazine

PAUSE FOR POWER

Who Is This Invader?

"Beachhead at Bethlehem." That could well have been the headline had Jerusalem published a newspaper in the days of Jesus Christ. But the news from Bethlehem was not simply that a good man was born nor that a wise teacher had arrived, but that God Himself had invaded this world. Jesus Christ is Immanuel, God with us. The Bible says, "Great is the mystery of godliness, God manifest in the flesh" (1 Timothy 3:16).

But, what do we mean by these terms, the deity of Christ, or Jesus is the Son of God? These terms are often so employed today as to mean something quite contrary to the Bible and to historic Christian faith. When a man says he believes in the deity of Christ, or when he says that he believes Jesus is God, the significance of these statements depends entirely upon what the man who made them means by the terms, deity of God. But here is where the confusion comes in, for as someone has perceptively observed, the modern religious liberal uses the same vocabulary but a different dictionary.

Now the historic Christian meaning of the term, "deity of Christ," is fairly clear. The Christian believes that there is a personal God, Creator, and Ruler of the universe, a God who is infinite, eternal, and unchangeable. So when the Christian says that Jesus Christ is God, or when he says that he believes in the deity of Christ, he means that that same person who is known to history as Jesus of Nazareth, before he became a man, existed from all eternity as the infinite, eternal, and unchangeable God, the second person of the Holy Trinity.

The church historically has used three terms to describe the relationship of Jesus Christ to God the Father. The church as declared that Jesus is co-equal, consubstantial, and co-eternal with God the Father. By the term, co-eternal, the church simply means that Jesus Christ is as eternal as

God the Father. As there was never a time when God the Father did not exist, even so there was never a time when Jesus Christ did not exist. The Bible says, "In the beginning was the Word. And the Word was with God. And the Word was God. That same One (Jesus) was in the beginning with God" (John 1:1,2). Jesus Christ is as eternal as God the Father.

By the term, consubstantial, the church means that Jesus Christ shares equally all the attributes of God the Father. Whatever we can attribute to God the Father, we can attribute to Jesus Christ. Is God omnipotent? So is Jesus. Is God eternal? So is Jesus. Is God omniscient? So is Jesus. Is God immutable, changeless? So is Jesus Christ, for the Bible says, "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today and forever."

Third, since Jesus Christ is co-eternal and consubstantial with God the Father, then it follows logically that Jesus Christ is co-equal with God the Father. Jesus is as fully God as the Father. Jesus himself said, "I and the Father are one," (John 10:30); and by that Jesus Christ meant, I and the Father possess the same nature. Furthermore, the Bible says that "all men should honor the Son even as they honor the Father. He that honoreth not the Son honoreth not the Father which hath sent Him" (John 5:23). That is to say, he that denies that Jesus is God, also denies that the Father is God. Jesus Christ is God manifest in the flesh.

Someone, however, may object, Is it really important to maintain so dogmatically the deity of Jesus Christ? Could we simply not admit that Jesus was merely a good man and still be Christians? The answer to that is, No. The death of Jesus Christ is God's only remedy for sin. Jesus came into this world to die for our sins. But the value of His death rests altogether on the dignity of His Person. It is the infinite dignity of His Person that gives infinite atoning value to his death. It is only because Jesus Christ is God that his blood can cleanse men from all their sins. It is only because Jesus Christ is God that He is adequate to meet the ultimate problems of life and to give men a reason for living. And it is only because Jesus Christ is God that he can say to men today, "Come unto me all ye that labor and that are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).

USLA RESCINDS BAGGING AND BALE TIE SPECIFICATIONS FOR 1974-CROP COTTON: Washington, Sept. 13--The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced that detailed specifications now applicable to bagging and bale ties used in packaging cotton tendered to Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) under its cotton loan program will be discontinued beginning with the 1974 crop of cotton.

Under the change bagging and bale tie specifications will be limited to more general provisions which apply currently, perhaps augmented by other provisions of a general nature as are deemed appropriate. All bagging qualifying under present regulations would, of course, continue to be eligible under the broader standards announced.

Examples of possible additions were described in the Notice of Proposed Rule Mak-

ing published in the Federal Register on May 17, 1973. As in the past, experimental materials being tested under the auspices of the Joint Industry Bale Packaging Committee will be exempt from the general provisions.

The May 17 notice stated that detailed specifications for bale packaging materials were being reviewed to determine whether they should be continued, modified, or rescinded for the 1974 crop.

Views and recommendations of interested parties were solicited. Almost all respondents recommended retention of detailed specifications now applicable. The dominant reasons expressed for doing so related to two points: (A) an interest in maintaining a uniform tare, and (B) concern that the quality of wrapping materials would deteriorate through competitive pressure in the absence of Government regulation.

BRIDGE for EVERYONE

James Kerry

Faced with a choice of establishing either minor suit, how would you proceed in the play of today's hand? To some players it may appear at first blush, expedient to cross ruff diamonds and clubs, probing for establishment of one or the other. Believe me, it won't work for twelve tricks, chiefly because one of your opponents has at least three trumps, so it is not difficult to see what devastation an over-ruff and trump return will do to this hand. Even if you succeeded in scoring all eight hearts separately the play yields only eleven tricks for down one, a most undesirable result.

Opening lead: Queen of spades.

The bidding warrants some comment in as much as South under-bid twice, his second bid of two hearts and third bid of three spades. Holding trif-

teen points in high cards plus the void, a jump was indicated, however he made up for it with the final six heart call.

Declarer took the opening spade lead with dummy's king and paused to consider the various possibilities open to him, quickly shelving the cross-ruff approach for reasons already mentioned. Hoping trumps will split three-two, South decided to pursue the club suit and accordingly at trick two lead the king of clubs. His plan was to discard a diamond if East did not cover, or ruff if he did, either play producing the same end result.

East came up with his ace of clubs, South ruffed and tested trumps with the king and queen as everyone followed suit. South's last heart to dummy's ace pulling the remaining trump. Declarer now cashed the queen and jack of clubs, discarding small diamonds as both opponents followed suit. A club trick was then surrendered to East to establish the suit. Observe, South cannot ruff as he is out of trumps.

East returned a small spade to declarer's king and South cashed his ace of diamonds for trick number nine. A small spade was ruffed in dummy and the last two tricks claimed by virtue of the established clubs.

Many players would go wrong in the play of this hand. To succeed you must recognize the clubs as being the stronger of the two minor suits with a distinct distributional advantage. Declarer chose this road without knowing how unfavorably the diamonds were stacked against him.

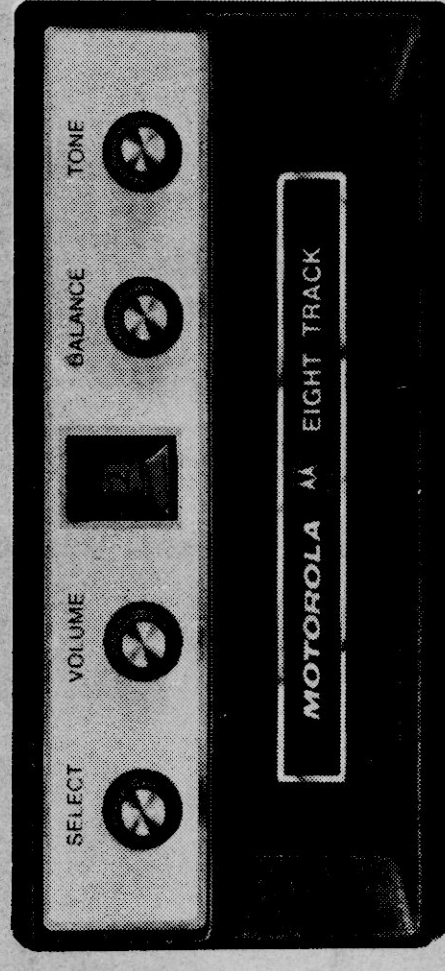

Priceless Booneville Memories

by E. Hoyle Young

As a lad in Corinth I was introduced to Booneville by my grandmother Hoyle.

She related migrating in a covered wagon from Shelby, North Carolina to Caroline Settlement west of Booneville, accompanied by her father, mother and brother and sister. He was a Methodist circuit rider preacher described beloved and had performed more marriages than any clergyman in northeast Mississippi. This pioneering experience in discovering their new home, reminiscent of Abraham, occurred prior to the civil war. All five buried in Booneville.

In our sessions, each indelibly vivid, she was fond of Osborne Creek, Pollys Creek and Jumpertown. Also, how my father, his brother and two sisters used to enjoy visiting in the summer their grandparents on the farm. They especially enjoyed cherry preserves and the beautiful view of "Tippah hills." Also, how my grandfather Young hunted wild turkeys with his friend, Cousin Bobby Smith, at Bay Springs and Newsite. I have a tax receipt over a hundred years old issued Tandy K. Young by the tax collector of Prentiss County. Also I treasure dearly a picture of my great grandfather Hoyle attired in Ministerial garment.

My next memorable love for Booneville concerns the Dalton reunion held annually. My hair will never get too grey wherein I can forget these festive gatherings. Having been privileged to partake of gourmet cooking round the world nothing excelled Dalton reunion chess pie, lemon meringue, country ham, etc. The climatic pay off was one year when Gus McClaren sent from Tupelo two five gallon ice cream freezers to Booneville on the early afternoon train!

Lacey Rees, Roy Green and myself were deputized to handle the transfer. "You better believe it we properly followed thru on the initiative!" The other outstanding event was a spontaneous political debate, participants being Terry Rees, Terry Miller, and Sam Dalton. Their combined blood pressures must have been at least 1000 over 500! Gud McClarens Mother (Aunt Sis) was a Dalton.

My next memorable Booneville event was a horse and buggy ride to Tupelo. Besides myself were Lacey Rees and Cecil Carter. This was a jubilant experience and many times we sung "The old grey mare ain't what she used to be."

My next commendation to Booneville relates to a football game against Corinth. The former put on a stellar performance, I believe victorious. I was impressed by their fine backfield consisting of Gibson, Rees, Carter and either Johnsey or Jones. Though neither of the Shenault brothers participating, I am glad to pay tribute to their skill. Also, I recollect an excellent tennis player, Jimmy Lee Hodges.

As a lad growing up in Corinth, I well remember a friend named Fred Counce. Also, I remember Councetown near Corinth and Luka.

Next while a freshman at Vanderbilt I was privileged to hear Hek Wyndam represent Ole Miss on the debating team. He was nattily dressed in a tuxedo and handled himself with much fluency.

My next reminder of Booneville was an incredible thrill. It related to a request to interview the medical director of East Texas State Hospital at Terrell, Texas. On presenting this elderly official with my identification card he scrutinized same. Then he remarked "over fifty years ago I knew a Hoyle who married a Young in Prentiss County, Mississippi! This afforded me with one of the greatest thrills of my sixty eight years by reminding him "they were my grandparents!"

Lastly, another incredible experience involving Booneville came my way. This happened in 1943 in far away North Africa, in the large city of Algiers. The occasion was my serving as a Naval Officer. Information had reached me that Floyd Cunningham, in the Army, was stationed in Algiers. Luckily after some investigation I was successful in locating him. Naturally he was surprised resulting in a most beneficial visit for both.

Summarizing, I am inexpressibly proud of my Prentiss County heritage. However "with corrupt minds, destitute of truth" running rampant through every segment of society, their moorings have been cut adrift because we their heirs "have failed to preserve the ancient landmarks set up by our forefathers!" We see before our very eyes Psalm 18 "the floods of ungodly men made me afraid. The sorrows of hell encompassed me about. In my distress I called upon the Lord and cried unto my God". Hosea 10-13 "Ye have plowed wickedness, ye have reaped iniquity.

Ye have eaten the fruit of lies," George Washington said "If we don't imitate the characteristics of our divine author, there is no hope for this nation." Thomas Jefferson warned "I tremble for my people when I reflect that

God is just and it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of God." As he told the Israelites in captivity in Egypt seventy years "If ye seek me you will find me, if you search for me with all your heart", he likewise stands ready to do for America today! Lest we be deceived

our main job this hour is on the home front, get our own house in order, as Hezekiah was admonished and not get sidetracked by Moscow, and Peking and most ever other nation we have played Santa Claus to! We only have to "contend for the faith once and for all delivered unto the saints!"

Accordingly, public health efforts follow the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices to assure routine

immunization only for personnel involved in the medical services.

* Federal Bank Regulations impose a substantial penalty if (1) a Certificate of Deposit is redeemed prior to maturity; or (2) a Certificate of Deposit is converted to one paying a higher interest rate. In either case, the holder would forfeit 90 days interest, and the rate of interest of the Certificate of Deposit would be reduced to the same rate as Regular Savings (4½% interest), retroactive to the date of issue of the Certificate of Deposit.
For example, a customer with a \$1,000 Certificate of Deposit at 5½% interest requests to redeem it prior to maturity or convert it to a 7% Savers Investment Certificate. He would, under the Federal Regulation, forfeit 90 days interest, and the rate of interest on his 5½% Certificate of Deposit would be reduced to 4½%, retroactive to the date of issue of the original 5½% Certificate of Deposit.
In addition, Federal Regulations require that when a Certificate of Deposit is used as security for a loan, the rate of interest paid by the bank on the Certificate of Deposit for the period of time it secures the loan, must be at least 2% per annum less than the rate charged on the loan.

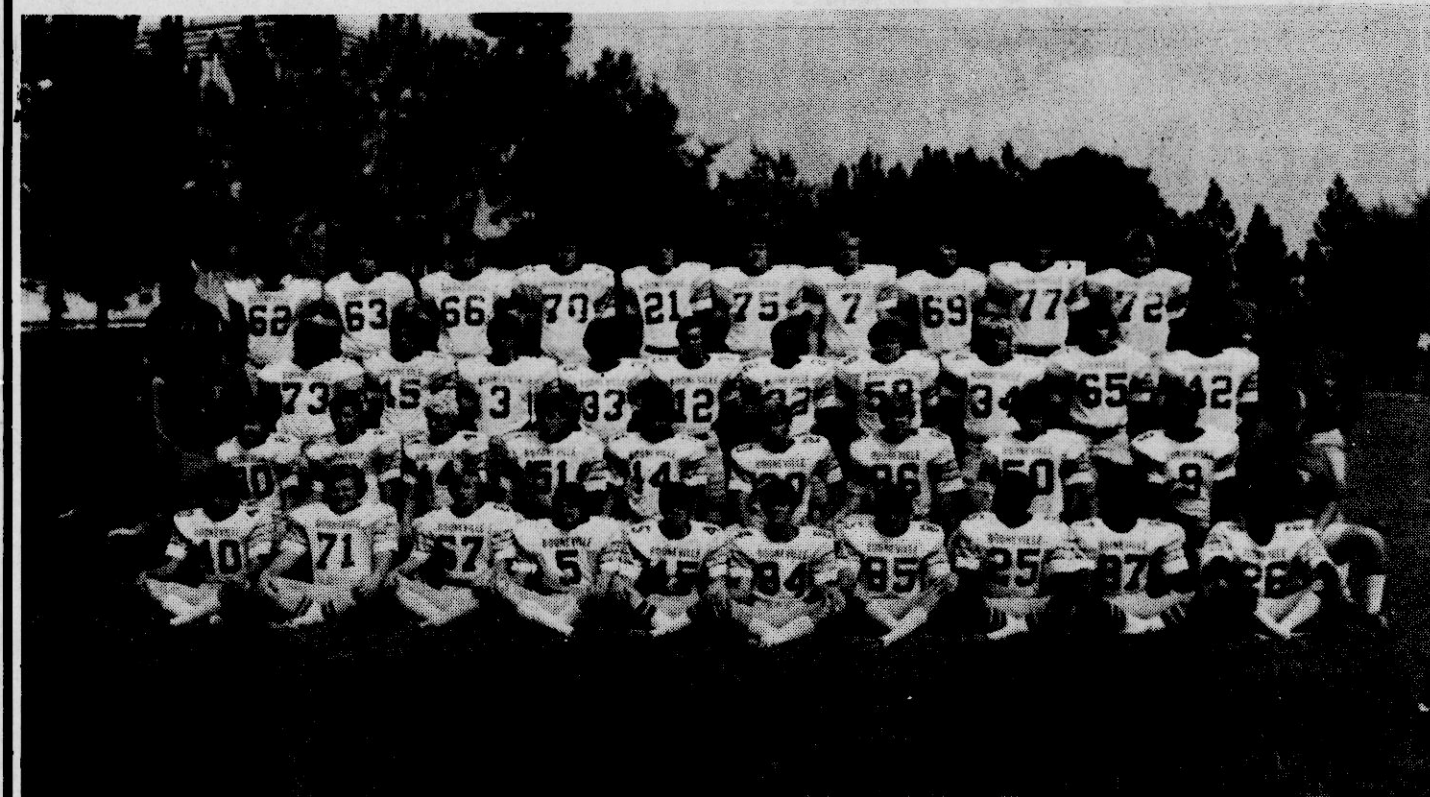
