## Motion Filed For New Trial

A motion has been filed in federal court in Aberdeen for a new trial in a \$1.5 million damage suit by the attorneys for the survivors of a 15-year old youth who hanged himself in the Booneville City Jail.

The motion was filed for a new trial and for a judgement notwithstanding the jury verdict.

The damage suit, resulting from the death of Carey Clayton Yates of Prentiss County, was tried in federal

court in Aberdeen two weeks ago. The all-woman jury found for the defendant City of Booneville and six local men.

Attorneys Robert W. Elliott of Ripley and John B. Farese of Ashland, representing Charline Hamilton, administratrix of the Yates estate, asked for a judgement notwithstanding the jury verdict on grounds "the evidence was insufficient to sustain a verdict for the defendants."

They also asked for a new trial, contending the court erred in admitting, despite plaintiff's objections, the testimony of Dr. H. P. Boswell and Ernest E. Bailey regarding the results of an autopsy performed by Boswell on the body of the youth.

The motion requesting the new trial objects to the admission of evidence as to the alcoholic content in the blood, alleging this was contrary to provisions of law and constituted "highly prejudicial" error.

Plaintiff's attorneys alleged, "The verdict in the light of the evidence is so unreasonable that it would be unconscionable to permit it to stand."

The Cunningham & Cunningham law firm of Booneville are handling the city's case.

## BHS Band In Ala. Contest

The Marching Blue Devil Band will represent Booneville High School in competition with bands from the tri-state area at the 2nd annual American Legion Alabama State Contest of Champions for marching Bands at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 13, at the Sheffield High School Stadium in Sheffield, Alabama.

The competing bands will be judged in categories which include inspection, general band discipline, musical and marching performance, routine design, and general effect. The contest will be highlighted by a guest appearance of the Florence State University Band.

## Agnew Resigns BULLETIN

WASHINGTON - Vice President Spiro T. Agnew resigned Wednesday.

He pleaded no contest to a charge of evading federal income taxes in 1967 in an appearance before U.S. District Judge Walter E. Hoffman in Baltimore. Hoffman placed him on probation for three years and fined him \$10,000.

President Nixon is empowered by the 25th Amendment to the Constitution to nominate a successor. If both houses of Congress confirm him by majority vote, the nominee will fill out the rest of Agnew's term, to Jan. 20, 1977.

In a statement to Hoffman, Agnew admitted "that I did receive payments during the year 1967 which were not expended for political purposes and that, thereafter, these payments were income taxable to me in that year and that I so knew."

He also said:

"I am advised that a full legal defense of the probable charge against me could consume several years. I am concerned that intense media interest in the case would distract public attention from important national problems - to the country's detriment."

Agnew sent Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield his letter of resignation: "Today I have resigned as vice president of the United States. Thank you for the many kindnesses you have extended to me. I will always treasure my days of service with you and with the U.S. Senate."

A vice president's only constitutional responsibility is to preside over the Senate.

Reports had circulated that the White House had drawn up a contingency list of possible successors. One published report listed some of the possibilities as Richardson, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, former Gov. John B. Connally of Texas, assistant Attorney General William D. Ruckelshaus and Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz.

## Editorial and Comment

### Because We Believe

Newspapermen have been up to a lot lately. They have been digging busily into the Watergate affair and probing police performance in New York City, looking into the financial details of Boys Town out in Nebraska and checking the purity of the municipal water supply down in Miami. And a number of them have been going to jail.

Oh, you know about that? About Watergate and The Washington Post's Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein?

Sure, a notable piece of reportage they did, and the Pulitzer Prize board agreed.

Journalism is proud of them, as it is always proud of hard-working, unafraid reporters and editors who dare to peel the wraps off a difficult story.

But the "big story" is just part of the story of America's newspapers and the people who devote their lives to the public interest these days.

Prizes and honors please newspaper people as much as anyone else. They highlight the journalistic homerun, reward extra effort and recognize exceptional performance and professional competence.

But, as we said, they only tell part of the whole story. While Bernstein and Woodward of the Big Washington Post were winning a Pulitzer for reporting, did you notice that the Pulitzer for editorial writing went to the tiny Berkshire Eagle in Pittsfield, Mass., or that the prize for feature photography went to Brian Lanker out in Topeka, Kans.?

The point is that in almost every corner of America dedicated men and women, working on papers ranging in size from the Nashville, Indiana, Brown County Democrat to the

powerful Chicago Tribune, labor earnestly for their communities and in a variety of ways.

From the printer who volunteers his time to coach a Little League team to the advertising solicitor who gives one evening a week to advising a Junior Achievement company, from the publisher who rejects the ease of the popular view to back a controversial editorial stand to the reporter who puts his personal freedom on the line to protect his sources, newspaper people participate personally as well as professionally in the community life that is the bedrock of America's strength.

And very few of them do it for the occasional prizes; indeed, we're more accustomed to brickbats.

We do it because we believe. We believe in the Constitution and the First Amendment and "freedom of the press." We believe that freedom of the press is not our freedom but your freedom, and if we lose it none of us will be free for long.

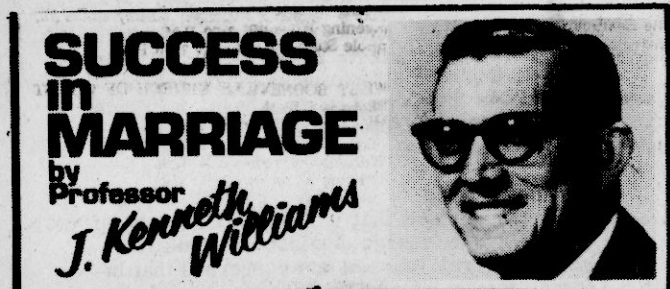
But we do it also because we believe that professional commitment alone is not enough. For America's newspapers, large and small, and for America's thousands of newspaper people, ours is a personal commitment of both work and service.

### Let Feelings Guide Your Actions

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: I am 18 and have been dating this guy for six months. We have had sex relations regularly and I've just found that I'm pregnant. Some of our friends tell us we should get married. However, my boy friend and I have talked about it and we're not sure what to do. - L.H., New Orleans

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: I don't suggest pushing yourself into marriage thinking you have to now that you're pregnant. This could bring up more problems than it would solve. On the other hand, I don't condone or approve of such behavior, but since you are pregnant, there's no point in thinking about what might have been.

If you and your boyfriend are in love with each other and planning marriage anyway, then, certainly you could get married a little sooner. However, if you feel that you should wait, or are not sure, or there are no deep feelings involved, I question the wisdom of such a marriage at this time.

You may feel that you should get married anyway and things will "just" work out, eventually; however, the reverse is often true. You could have a very miserable life along with your husband and future child. Such a situation usually leads to divorce with mental scars which may last for a lifetime.

When one gets married, one should enter the relationship with an attitude based on love and rational planning, not being forced into a situation because of feelings of guilt or what someone else thinks he or she should do. Talk it over with someone in whom you have confidence and who is qualified to advise. Also, tell your boyfriend to do the same. Forethought now may prevent a lot of wishful hindsight later on.

WIFE SWAPPING

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: I read in a leading magazine recently about a number of married people who are engaging in "wife-swapping." The article said this was becoming more and more in evidence. Would you comment. - L.B., Chicago

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: In our permissive society, this type of behavior seems to be gaining ground. Wife-swapping, generally, means two or more married couples who meet for an evening or weekend and swap mates for sexual purposes. It's just another way for both to get sexual gratification other than within marriage.

This kind of behavior often results in marital breakup and, in some cases, severe psychological repercussions later on. Although some couples say this behavior has brought them closer together and has made each appreciate the other more, I question the quality of such a relationship.

Marriage is much more than just sex. If a couple has to have sex with others than their spouse, then sex is emphasized completely out of context in which God had originally intended it, and that being within marriage and confined to one's mate.

For heaven's sake, what are we coming to when we will share our spouse, someone whom we are to love, cherish, and desire, with someone else, sexually. I am suspicious of that person who says he dearly loves his spouse and is still willing to share him or her with someone else. That just doesn't come under my understanding of love and marriage.

Ben G. Around your homes, your places of employment, in your daily lives, be fire conscious, be alert to fire causes and if fire does start, know what to do. Contact and visit your local fire department, learn all you can about how you may help in preventing fires.

### Pause For Power

Immanuel - God with us! This was the name given to Jesus Christ at the announcement of his birth: "Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us" (Matthew 1:23). Jesus Christ is God.

The question, however, naturally arises, Why do we believe that Jesus Christ is God. Someone might well object by saying, "You are asking me to believe that a certain man who lived and died in Palestine in the first century was really God incarnate in human flesh? That is a tremendous demand upon my faith; I want some solid evidence that Jesus is indeed what the Bible claims Him to be, God incarnate."

How, that is a fair and reasonable request. Faith in Jesus Christ is action based on the sufficiency of the evidence. What, then, is the evidence that Jesus Christ is God? To be quite frank, there is an immense body of evidence, both inside and outside the Bible, that supports the truth of the full deity of Jesus Christ, and this evidence can be conveniently divided into five groups.

We will look today only at one, probably the most significant - the internal evidence of the Bible itself. The Bible itself, in literally dozens and dozens of passages, attributes to Jesus Christ titles and offices and attributes that belong only to God himself.

All divine names and titles, for example, are given to Jesus Christ. In the Bible, Jesus is called God, the mighty God, the great God, God over all, Lord, the Lord of Lords, the King of Kings. To give one illustration, the Bible says, "Looking for that blessed hope and the glorious appearance of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ" (Titus 2:13). Jesus is here called "our Great God."

Furthermore, all divine attributes are ascribed to Jesus Christ. The attributes of omnipresence, and omniscience, and immutability are ascribed to Christ. The Bible says, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). Immutability, changelessness, belongs only to God, and yet Hebrews 13:8 attributes immutability to Jesus Christ. This simply means that Jesus is God.

Furthermore, the Bible distinctly calls Jesus, God. For example, the Bible says, "Who are Israelites; . . . whose are the fathers, and of whom is concerning the flesh Christ came, who is over all, God blessed forever" (Romans 9:4,5). The Bible here says, "Christ came, who is over all, God blessed forever." The Bible does not simply call Jesus, the Son of God, though that would teach the deity of Christ. The Bible in Romans 9:5 calls Jesus, "God blessed forever." Once again, the Bible provides us another remarkable testimony to the full deity of Jesus Christ, and it does so in Hebrews 1:8: "And of the angels He saith, Who maketh his angels spirit, and his ministers a flame of fire. But unto the Son he saith, Thy throne, O God, is forever and ever." The speaker is God the Father, and the person whom He is addressing is Jesus Christ. Here is an astonishing statement. Here we have God the Father calling His own Son by the title, "O, God" - "Thy Throne, O God, is forever and ever." Here is an unequalled testimony of God the Father to the full deity of His beloved Son, Jesus Christ.

Furthermore, Jesus Christ is the Object of worship to all intelligent creatures. But in the Bible worship is reserved

for God alone. Even Jesus Himself said, "Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and Him only shalt thou serve." And yet Jesus Christ unhesitatingly accepted worship from men. When certain men tried to worship Barnabas and Paul, these two men cried out, "Stop!" But when men sought to worship Jesus Christ, Jesus unhesitatingly accepted their worship. Thomas, for example, cried out to Jesus, "My Lord and my God," and Jesus did nothing to stop Thomas from addressing Him by these titles. This homage to Jesus Christ would be idolatry if Jesus is not God. And yet there was no reluctance on the part of Jesus Christ to accept such worship from men. Jesus, therefore, is either God or He is an impostor, for Jesus Christ unhesitatingly accepted the worship of man, and worship belongs to God alone.

Here then is a sample, and really only a small portion, of the internal evidence of the Bible that demonstrates that Jesus Christ is God. And because Jesus Christ is God, then his death is of infinite atoning value, for it is the infinite dignity of his person that gives infinite atoning value, for it is the infinite dignity of his person that gives infinite value to his death. The Bible therefore says, "For there is one God, and one mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus; who gave himself, a ransom for all" (1 Timothy 2:5,6).

## Prentiss County ASCS News

### LIST OF FARMER-COMMITTEE VOTERS ON FILE AT ASCS COUNTY OFFICE.

Voter lists for ASC farmer committee elections have been prepared and are now available for inspection at the Prentiss County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office.

Every effort has been made to include all persons believed eligible to vote in the ASC farmer committee elections which will be held on December 3, 1973.

Any producer eligible to participate in an ASCS program may have his name added to the list up until the election date of December 3, 1973.

This list records all voters in each ASCS community, with no discrimination due to race, color, creed, sex, or national origin. In preparing the ASC voter list, the local office checked previous election lists, farm record cards, records of other agencies and program participation records.

NOMINATIONS OPEN FOR ASC ELECTIONS

Prentiss County farmers are encouraged to nominate candidates for Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) community committees. Petitions, to be signed by a minimum of three qualified voters, must be filed by October 29, 1973, at the Prentiss County ASCS Office, P. O. Box 305, Booneville, Mississippi.

It is hopeful a slate of at least six candidates will be nominated by farmer petitions, including representatives of the minority groups in Prentiss County. ASCS programs are nondiscriminatory and administered without regard to race, color, creed, sex, or national origin.

Eligible farmers may sign as many nominating petitions as they wish. No special petition form is required, but the petition must include a

statement that the nominee is willing to serve if elected. Most persons eligible to participate in ASCS programs are eligible to serve as ASC committee members. This includes producers, sharecroppers, and tenants, as well as minors who supervise an entire farm operation.

Nominees must have farming interests within the ASC community, be qualified ASC voters and not have reached their 70th birthday by the date they take office on January 1, 1974. Further details on nominations for ASC community committees may be obtained from the ASCS county office, P. O. Box 305, Booneville, Mississippi, telephone number 728-5442.

ASC community committees elected by mail ballots December 3 will assist the ASC county committee with ASCS programs, conduct farm community meetings and serve as delegates to the Prentiss County Convention to elect the ASC county committee.

PROVEN WHEAT YIELDS

Legislation requires that farm proven wheat yields be based on the same five year base period used in determining county projected yields with the proviso that the yield for one of the five years may be eliminated if it is abnormally low because of drought, flood, or other natural disaster. Producers who desire to have their 1974 wheat program yield based on actual yields will be required to submit production data for the 1968-72 base period.

GRAZING SET-ASIDE

Farmers are reminded that effective October 1, 1973 set-aside may be grazed, however, no hay may be harvested from the set-aside without a reduction in payment. Any farming activities necessary for the production of a 1974 crop may be undertaken without a loss of payment.

### WHY LIME?

Soil test summary data shows that seven out of every ten acres in Mississippi need lime for top yields of legumes such as soybeans and clovers. Four out of ten need lime for non-legume crops like cotton and feed grains.

Application of lime to strongly acid soils raising the pH to 6.0 or above will increase cotton yields by one fourth to one half bale per acre and increase soybean yields six to ten bushels per acre.

Lime also increases the effectiveness of herbicides and makes for more efficient use of fertilizer, which in view of the fertilizer shortage and high prices makes liming even more desirable.

The time to get lime on the land is right now, or as soon as crop harvest has been completed. By getting it out now, you can get it mixed with the soil and it can go to work immediately.

WEED CONTROL

Each year many folks complain that their herbicides did not give good control of weeds. Our weed control specialists tell us that there could be several reasons for this. Here are some they mentioned: Failure to adjust herbicide rates according to the

type of soil; mismatching herbicides to the type of weed; poor calibration; improper incorporation; and unfavorable weather.

For a better weed control job next year, here are some suggestions:

Go out now and prepare a soil map listing soil texture, soil pH, organic matter content and the weeds that are now present.

Decide where herbicide rate changes should be made and plant to apply the proper rate. Select the best herbicide for the weed and soil conditions. Check out equipment. You may need a new pump, hose, valves or nozzles. Study calibration procedures. Plan on doing a superb job of seedbed preparation.

LAND FORMING

Nothing will pay bigger returns on pothole bottom land than land forming. It helps insure earlier planting and more precise application of chemicals and use of cultivation equipment. Another plus for land forming is better water management without erosion. It is a must for anyone planning to irrigate. If you are considering land forming, check with a professional engineer before starting.

#### NATIONAL 4-H CITIZENSHIP SHORT COURSE

Since the National 4-H Citizenship Short Course started 14 years ago, nearly 50,000 young people have attended.

Youth from Prentiss County have an opportunity to qualify for this trip along with other Mississippi youth.

National 4-H Citizenship Short Course held at National 4-H Center in Washington, D. C. is a fast-paced, exciting and highly varied program designed to develop participants' greater understanding of their individual responsibilities as citizens. The one-week session is filled with listening, discussing, learning, sharing, touring.

The first major session, "This is Citizenship," lasts two and a half hours and helps participants explore their definitions of citizenship and what impact it has on their lives. Participants are challenged by the varied definitions they hear, and begin realizing that citizenship begins with self, then reaches out for others, finally bringing on commitment and involvement.

This year's program features small group discussions on nine contemporary topics: Economic Choice and the Citizen focuses on choices involved with each individual's economic activity.

To Be or Not To Be Married looks at current trends in family living and today's options.

Communications: Fact, Fiction and Freedom examines historic conflict between newsmakers and mass media. Dive into Values and Human Relations helps participants improve their own interpersonal relations and understand their values.

Conservation and Environment -- Who Cares About Ecology scans various kinds of pollution and their relation to overpopulation. Community Development

-- Tinkering with Your Community involves participants in a learn-by-doing process on how they can become involved in their communities' long-range plans as well as everyday functions.

Man's Freedom and Dignity probes questions like what is freedom . . . do all men have it . . . is freedom free?

So Who Cares What's Happening Somewhere Else? focuses on What American youth should know and be doing about world problems.

No Man Is an Island; Neither Is His Government explores young people's involvement in the nation's government, concentrating on policy issues.

Delegates also witness federal government in action through a session on the executive branch and a day on Capitol Hill, where they meet their congressmen and senators, sit in on committee hearings and attend various sessions of the House. They also have a chance to tour the Supreme Court, where nine justices interpret laws of the United States Constitution. Historical tours that complete the week include visits to Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, Arlington National Cemetery, Marine Memorial, Mount Vernon and Washington Monument.

GI Bill Training Still Available

G. I. Bill training is still available for some veterans who were discharged from military service as much as 12 years ago, but not for long.

Merlyn J. Cook, Assistant Director for Regional Office at the VA Center in Jackson, pointed out that Post-Korean veterans -- those who were discharged between January 31, 1955, and June 1, 1966 -- have two more years to take flight training, farm or on-the-job training under the G. I. Bill. But their eligibility for other types of schools and colleges expires May 31, 1974.

In spite of the array of dates, the formula for computing an individual's eligibility is fairly simple, Cook said. The law gives each veteran eight years to use his G. I. Bill eligibility, and for most, this means until eight years after discharge. But the Post-Korean group had no G. I. Bill eligibility until June 1, 1966, when the current G. I. Bill became effective. Thus, they have until eight years after the date of the law. The following year (1967), other forms of training were added to the G. I. Bill, so the eight years of eligibility for these benefits starts from the date of the amendment -- August 31, 1967.

Post-Korean veterans have been slower in taking advantage of their G. I. education benefits -- a 34 percent rate compared to 42 percent for veterans discharged after enactment of the current G. I. Bill.

The 34 percent rate is considered reasonably good, because as Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson pointed out, "Some of these veterans had been out of service for as long as 11 years before the current G. I. Bill gave them entitlement. By that time, many had found other means of financing their education, or found it impossible to take advantage of the G. I. Bill because of family or other responsibilities."

Age and education level also played roles in preventing many Post-Korean veterans from returning to classrooms. Average age for the Post-Korean group is six years older than Vietnam Era veterans and only two of three had finished high school.

Scouring tinware removes coating

MISSISSIPPI STATE -- When using tinware, extremely high temperatures which may cause discoloration, warping and melting of the tin coating should be avoided.

This is the advice of Frances Fortenberry, housing and equipment specialist for the Cooperative Extension Service. Miss Fortenberry said lightweight tin ovenware is shiny when new and reflects heat easily. However, as the thin tin coating ages, it darkens and permits more absorption of heat and darker browning of foods.

I am still having a few customers who do not have a clear understanding of the meaning of color in a diamond, and how the color affects the value of the stone.

Nearly all diamonds have a yellowish body color. The degree of this color affects the price you pay. Starting with colorless, the value of the diamond decreases as the more common yellow-tinge deepens. However many people find these yellow-tinted stones very attractive.

The yellow color of a diamond does not affect the brilliance and transparency of the stone. This is proven by the very popular deep yellow "fancy" colored diamond called the Canary Color. The canary colored diamond is as valuable and sometimes more valuable than the blue diamond. So the yellowish tinge in a diamond does not lessen the beauty of the diamond provided you do not dislike the particular color.

The body color in the diamond can be compared to looking at a beautiful view on a clear day without sunglasses; put the sunglasses on and you will see the same clear view but with a different hue.

Except in rare, instances, color in a diamond lessens the cost but can also be very beautiful.

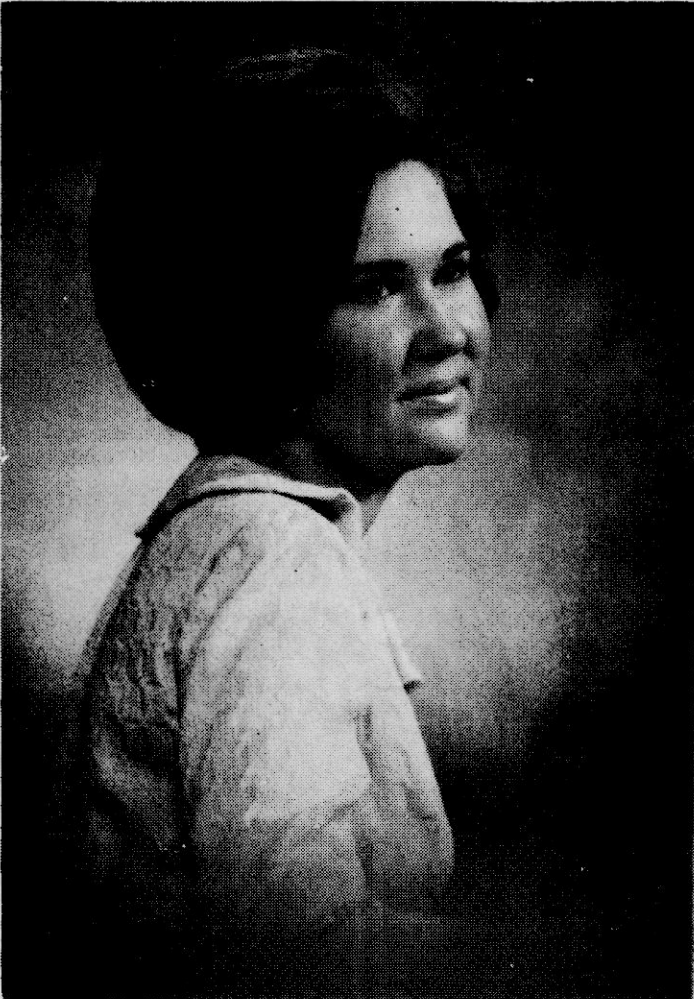

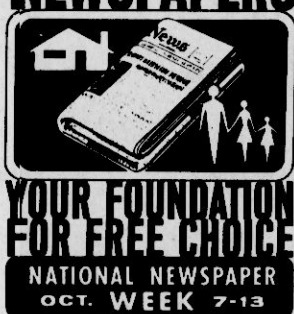

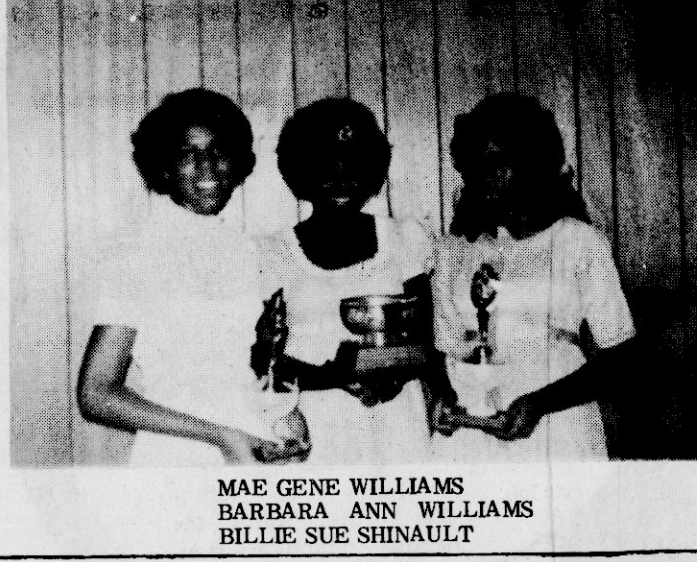

# Check For Identification Of Repairmen Doing Work

Recent reports indicate that there are men traveling the rural area of Northeast Mississippi and gaining entrance into rural homes under the pretense of inspecting wiring or installing electrical devices.

Pretending to be representatives from electric power associations, gas, or telephone companies, these men enter your home, perform an imaginary inspection or unnecessary repair job and then ask you for payment of some nature. Or they may just look over your home for location of valuables, return later when you are away or asleep and rob your home.

Representatives of your Prentiss County Electric Power Association wear uniforms with the associations

name on the back and travel in the familiar dark green trucks with the associations name on the side. Never hesitate to ask an EPA employee for identification.

Your EPA line crews are not authorized to collect money from you for any work that they perform. Their work consists of outside lines leading up to your meter. Rarely, if ever, would they be called on to enter your home

to correct wiring.

If someone should come to your home to check wiring, gas, or telephone, and you are in doubt about their identity, do not pay them any money but notify your utility supplier as soon as possible. If possible get the tag number of any suspicious vehicle around your home and report this to your electric power association or law enforcement officers.

## Harvest Time Approaches

"The Mississippi cotton harvest is just around the bend," according to M. P. Talbot, Jr., Officer in Charge of the USDA's cotton classing office in Memphis. "In fact," says Talbot, "we classed the first sample of the 1973 season from Prentiss County on October 1." The bale belonged to George Lauderdale and was ginned on September 27 by Jumpertown Gin Co., Boone-

ville, MS. This is about ten days later than last year when the first bale was classed on September 19. Last year Prentiss County farmers submitted 9,461 samples for classification under provisions of the Smith-Doxey Act. The familiar "green-card" class when used in conjunction with market news aids cotton farmers in an orderly marketing of their product.

## HOW TO SAVE MONEY AND RETAIN PROTEIN

Main-dish menu planning takes a large portion of each food dollar. The following protein buying tips can revitalize your ailing meat budget.

- Buy meat according to the number of servings per pound rather than cost per pound.

- Use less tender cuts of beef for cooked meat dishes. - Select frozen, canned or fresh fish, poultry or pork according to price advantages.

- Substitute 3 ounces of cooked lean meat from the following sources:

2 eggs  
1 cup cooked dry beans  
1 oz. natural cheese  
2/3 cup cottage cheese  
4 tbsp. peanut butter  
2 1/4 cups fluid milk  
1 cup fluid milk plus  
5 Tbsp. dry milk powder

Buying advantageously is one step toward economizing on the escalating food dollar, but managing food investments in your kitchen will extend your savings.

- Stretch meat, poultry and fish with pasta products; fresh, frozen or dried vegetables; breads and cereals.

- Use herbs, sauces and seasonings to perk up flavors.

- Freeze extra servings of combination dishes.

- Cook large quantities of rice, dry beans or dry peas and freeze remaining amounts in quantities suitable for future recipes.

- Plan menus around seasonal foods and specials.

- Supply your own labor for shredding, slicing and grating.

- Substitute homemade white sauce for canned soups.

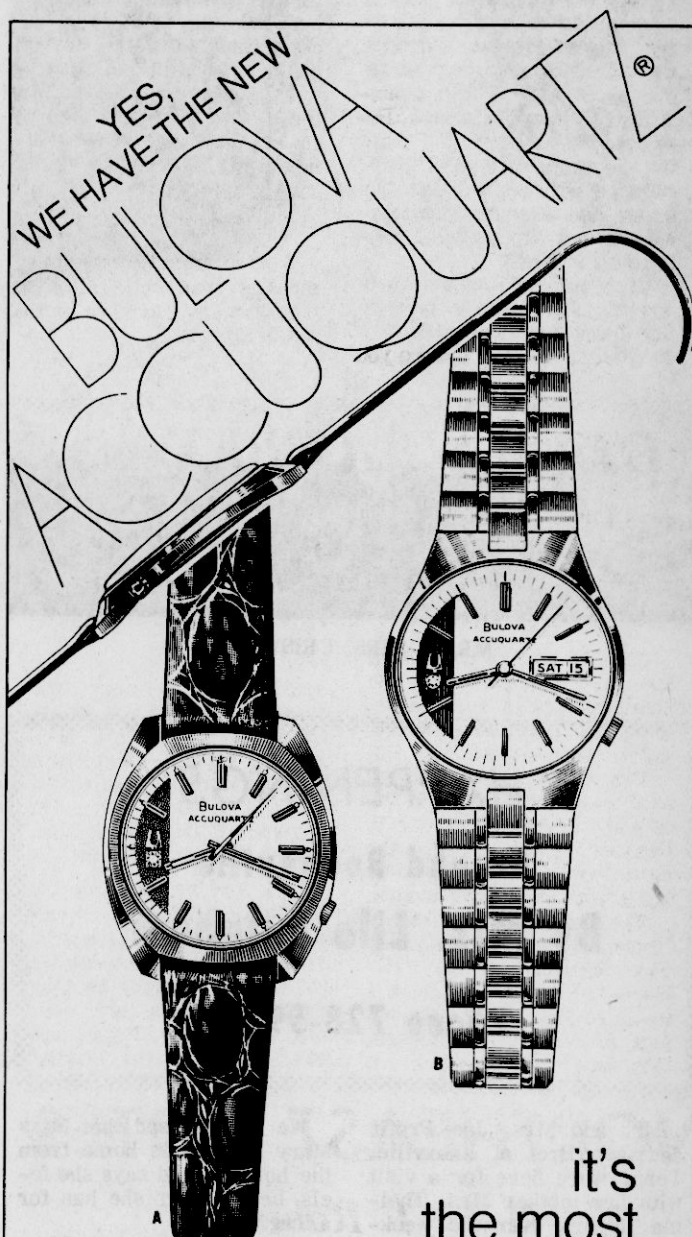

## DRYING GOURDS

Gourds may be decorative as well as useful around the house. Decorative gourds can be interesting, pretty, and used as accessories.

Select mature gourds for drying purposes. Wash in light suds and water. Dry

carefully. The outer skin takes about a week to dry. Discard gourds that don't dry well. Wipe gourds with a household disinfectant to prevent mildew and mold. Spread on newspaper in a warm, dry, dark place for three or four weeks to finish drying. You may then wax, shellac, paint, or gild.



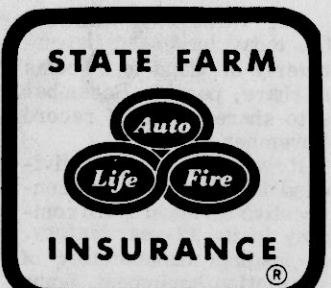

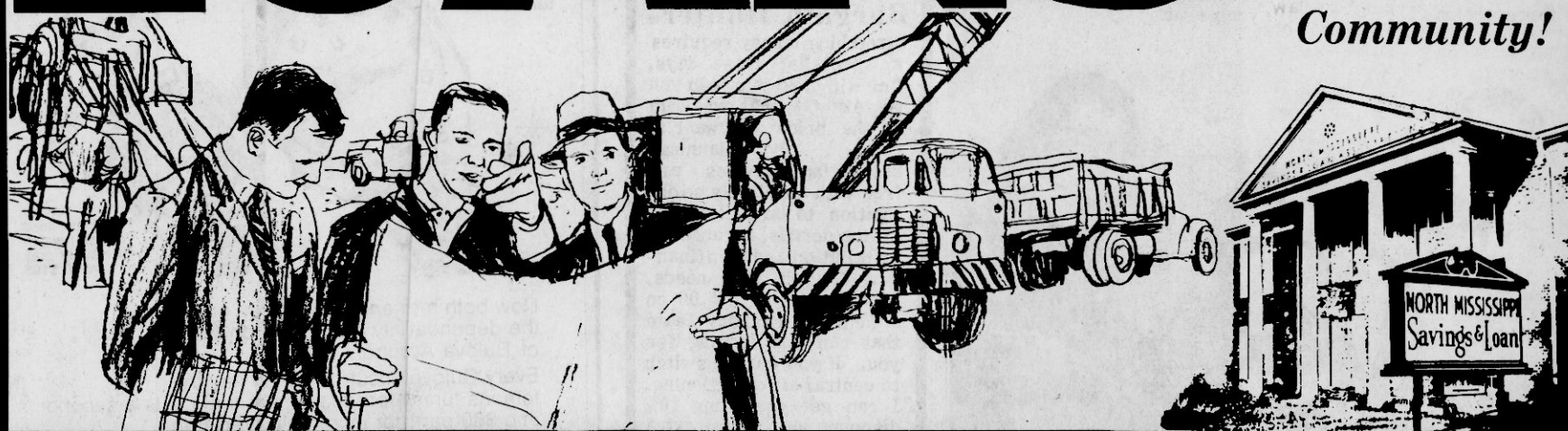

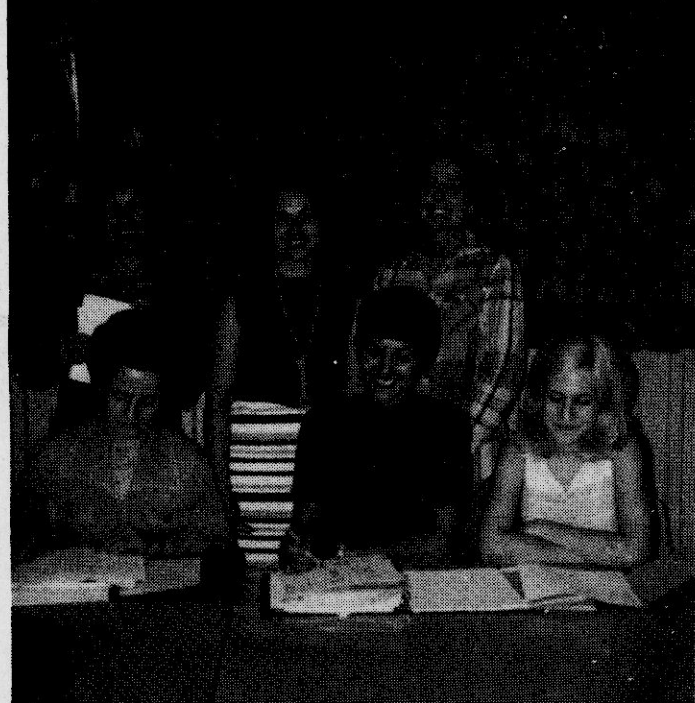
## Big Tomatoes

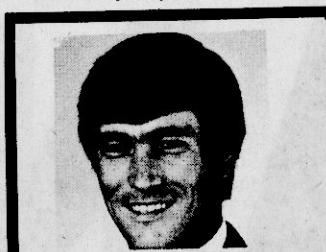

## Mental Health Folks To Meet In Biloxi

### VA Questions And Answers

**EDIOT'S NOTE:** Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

**Q --** Six months ago, Veterans Administration compensation for malaria contracted during military service in Vietnam was discontinued. Since I now have recurring attacks, how can I go about getting it reinstated?

**A --** A physician's evidence of your disablement must be provided VA so the agency can determine whether to resume compensation payments.

**Q --** I was a medical corpsman before discharge from military service. How can I find a job with the federal government or a private hospital which can utilize my experience?

**A --** Ask the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare office in your federal district for the address of the MEDHIC (Military Experience Directed to Health Careers) office in your state. This office can counsel you on job prospects, as well as training and education opportunities in your field.

**Q --** Since some national cemeteries have been closed because of lack of space, will the Veterans Administration pay an additional allowance for veterans buried in private cemeteries?

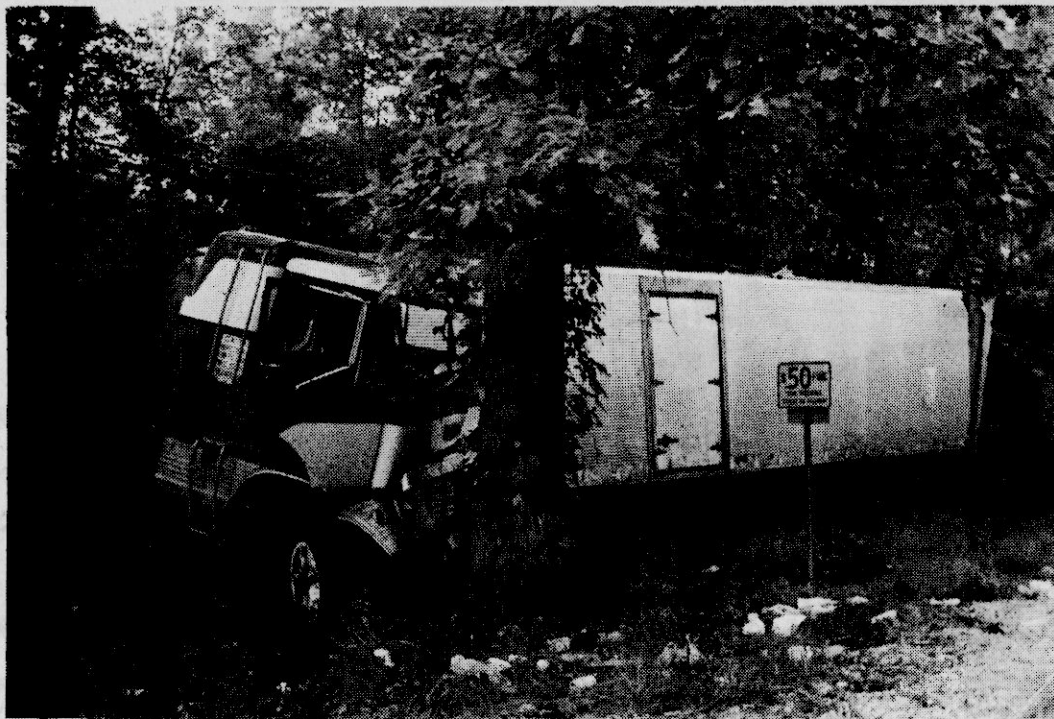
**A --** Yes. A recent law (PL 93-43) permits VA to provide a \$150 plot allowance in addition to the maximum \$250 burial benefit, when a veteran is buried outside a national cemetery.

## October : Immunization Month

October is "Immunization Action Month" in Mississippi, and the State Board of Health is actively supporting this nationwide effort.

According to Dr. Alton B. Cobb, State Health Officer, October will serve as the kickoff for an intensive, on-going campaign aimed at finding unvaccinated preschool children and motivating their parents to seek immediate medical attention.

In addition to the State Board of Health, other public and private agencies are co-operating on a statewide basis. Included are such organizations as the Governor's Council for Child Care, the Mississippi Academy of Pediatrics, Mississippi Medical Association and the March of Dimes.

Both Governor and Mrs. William Waller have expressed a strong personal interest and have joined in the promotion activities scheduled throughout October.

State health officials noted that during the month a variety of materials will be presented to the public explaining the purpose and importance of vaccination, especially among the target group.

In commenting on the program, Dr. John J. Witte, Chief of the Public Health Service, Center for Disease Control, Immunization Branch, explained that immediate and continuing immunization programs are needed to reverse the alarming trend of declining immunization levels among preschool-age youngsters.

"Polio, measles, rubella (German measles), pertussis (whooping cough), diphtheria tetanus may again become serious problems," emphasized Dr. Cobb.

The State Board of Health urges parents to make sure that their children have been adequately vaccinated.

"If you're not sure, check with your doctor or local health department," Dr. Cobb added. "The protection is available; it's just a matter of seeing that these children get it."

# Eastland, Stennis Want \$18 Million For Parkway

JACKSON — A request that \$18 million be included in the 1975 Federal budget for the Natchez Trace Parkway has been made to the Interior Department by Mississippi Senators John Stennis and James O. Eastland.

President Ralph Landrum of the Natchez Trace Parkway Association said Senator Stennis had informed him that the two Tennessee senators, Howard H. Baker, Jr., and William E. Brock, III, and the Alabama senators, John J. Sparkman and James B. Allen, joined the two Mississippians in the written request to Interior Department Secretary Rogers C. B. Morton, in early September.

Funding at the requested rate on a continuing annual basis would make possible completion of the Parkway in about five years.

Senator Stennis informed President Landrum he had presented the same joint request by the six senators to Roy L. Ash, Director of the Federal Office of Management

and Budget.

The four Mississippi congressmen through whose districts the Parkway passes, Thad Cochran, G. V. Montgomery, David Bowen and Jamie Whitten, were informed of the senatorial request in

The University, Mississippi's oldest public supported institution of higher learning, launched a new educational era in the state Nov. 6, 1848, when classes began for 80 young men under supervision of four professors. The

1973-74 academic year has been designated as the Anniversary year for Ole Miss. Chairman of the committee planning the special Nov. 6 observance is Dr. Joseph C. Kiger, chairman of the Department of History and professor of History at Ole Miss.

Dr. Kiger said the nine Convocation participants will briefly discuss the importance of the University from personal and professional points of view.

Among the speakers are Gov. William L. Waller, chief executive of the State of Mississippi and a Law School graduate; Mayor John O. Leslie, Oxford pharmacist; Mrs. John J. Shea Jr. of Memphis, who, as Lynda Lee Mead of Natchez, was Miss America of 1960.

Dr. Arthur C. Guyton, chairman of the Department of Physiology and Biophysics, University Medical Center, Jackson; Robert M. Walker, assistant professor of History, Jackson State College; George A. McLean, publisher of the Tupelo Daily Journal;

Archie Manning, quarterback of the New Orleans Saints; Dr. Jerry McCall, executive vice chancellor of the University and a former high-ranking official of NASA and IBM; and Larry Black of Gulfport, current president of the Associated Student Body.

University Chancellor Porter L. Fortune will preside at the 11 a.m. Convocation in Fulton Chapel.

## Navy Looking For Volunteers

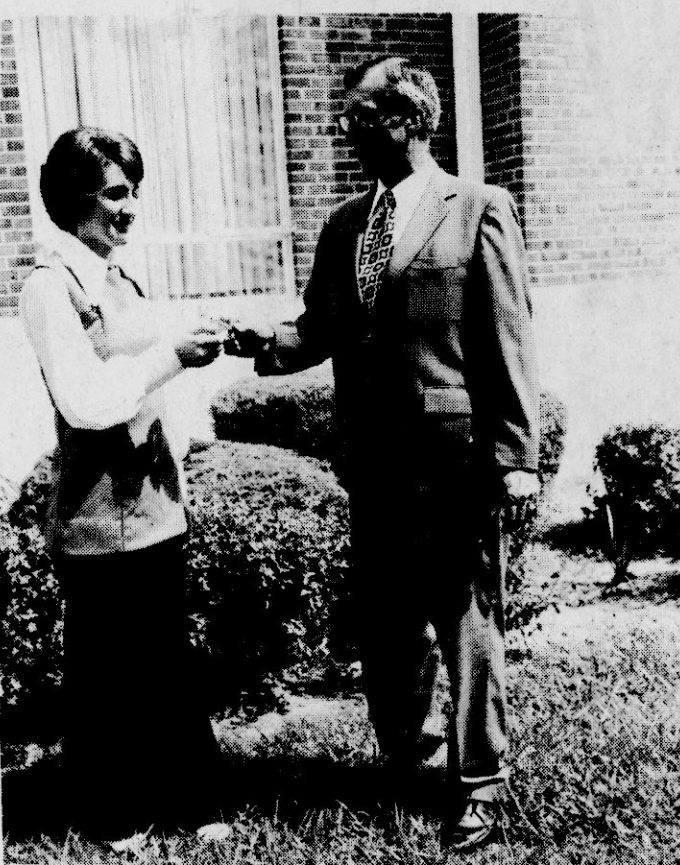

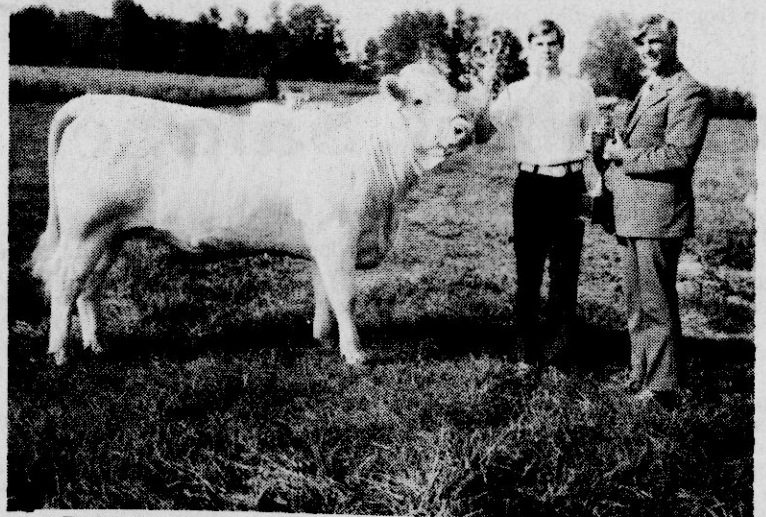

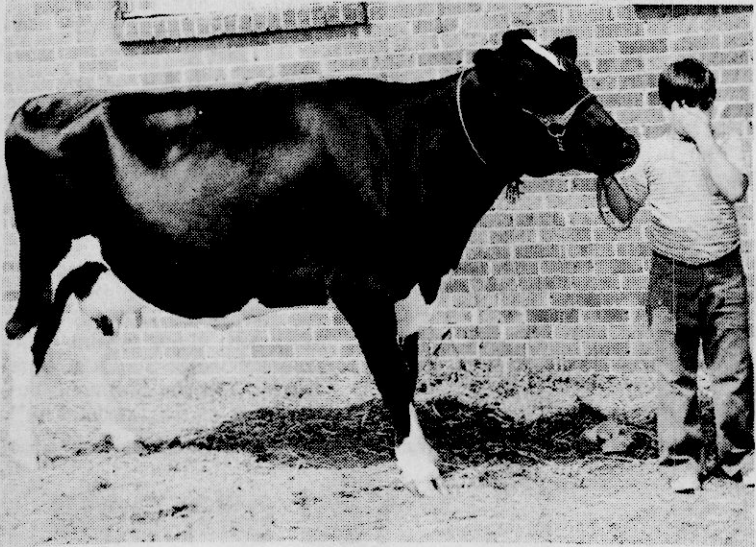

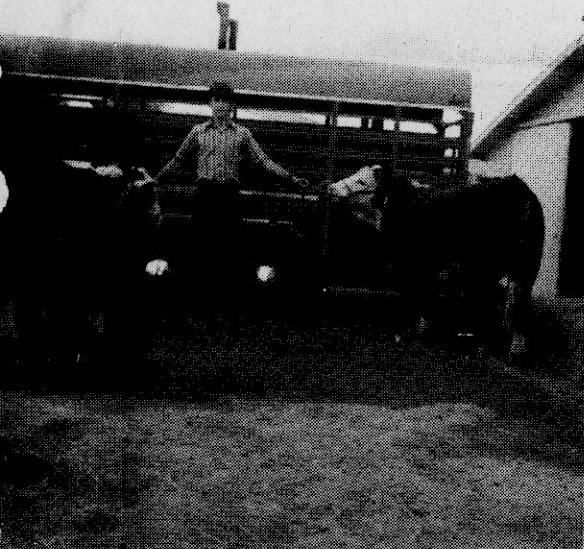

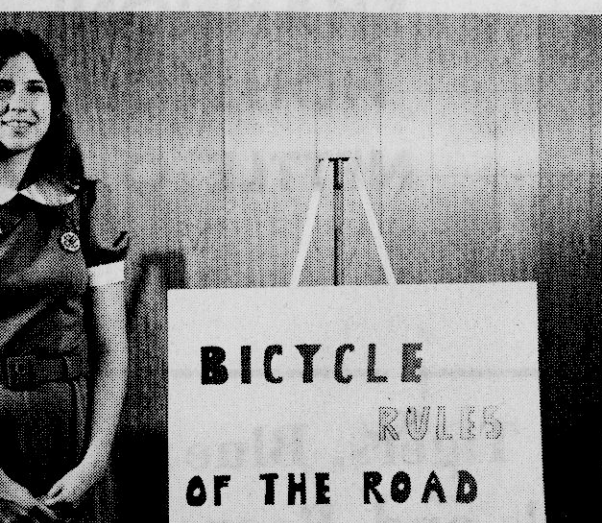

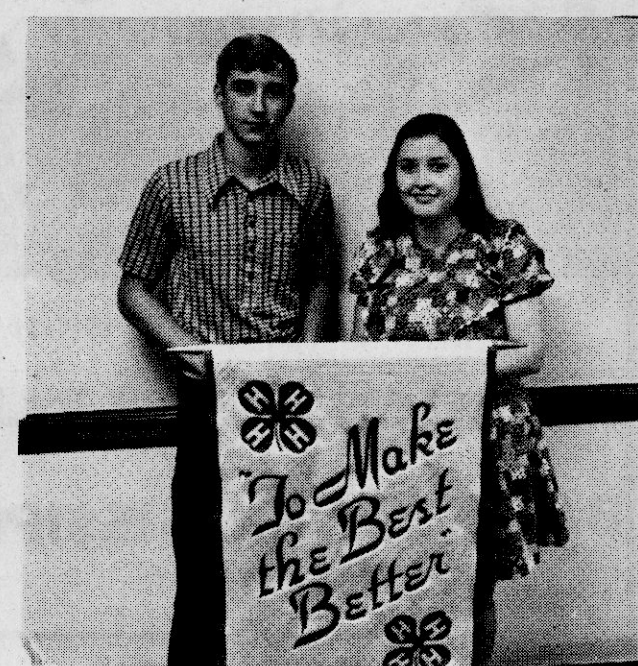

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**4 1/2 %** **REGULAR PASSBOOK SAVINGS.** Ten Dollars or more will earn you 4 1/2 % interest compounded June 30 and December 31. Save by the 10th and earn from the first of the month. This account is specially designed for regular, systematic savers and offers immediate access to your money. No maximum.

Under Federal banking regulations, a depositor may not withdraw all, or any part of his time deposit with this bank prior to maturity, except with the consent of the bank which may be given only at the time such request for withdrawal is made. With such consent, a penalty will be assessed as follows: (a) A reduction of the rate of interest on the funds withdrawn so that such rate is no more than the maximum rate paid by this bank on passbook savings on the date of withdrawal, and (b) forfeiture of 90 days interest if the amount withdrawn has been on deposit 90 days or more. If the funds have been on deposit less than 90 days, all interest is forfeited. In addition, when this time deposit is used as security for a loan, the rate of interest paid by the bank on such deposit for the period of time it secures the loan shall not be in excess of 2% per annum less than the rate of interest charged on the loan.

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
