Soybeans Stolen Monday

A truck load of about 200 bushels of soybeans was stolen from the W. M. Murphy Farm here Monday night, according to Prentiss County authorities.

County Sheriff Roy Elder said that the soybeans were stolen from the truck sometime during the night. It was noted that the beans were supposedly loaded on to another truck and hauled off.

The farm is located some six miles west of Booneville, on the New Bryant Road.

Officials said that some truck tracks were found at the scene, and a complete investigation is being carried on by the county Sheriff's Department.

Local farmers are being asked not to leave cotton and soybeans in the fields unattended. Officials said that "if their equipment is broken down or they have to leave these products in the fields, they should notify the Sheriff's Department so we can keep surveillance."

Local people are also asked to report any suspicious looking vehicles traveling the roads, and if seen, try to obtain the tag number and the description of the vehicles. These reports should be made directly to the Sheriff's Department.

Officials said this is the first incident of this type this year.

Mr. Murphy commented that a reward is being offered to anyone who provides information which leads to the arrest and conviction of the suspects.

The soybeans are reported to be "somewhere in the neighborhood of 5¢ per bushel."

City Tax Collections Show Rise

Sales Tax Collections here rose slightly during the month of September.

Officials said the actual figure for the City of Booneville is \$21,411.31, as compared to \$19,802.92 for August. This figure is also an increase of almost \$5,000 from the past year.

Decision Left To People

Making a strong appeal, but leaving the decision in the hands of the local people, Dean Cotton of Corinth spoke at the 'Ladies Appreciation' night dinner of the Booneville Jaycees.

Cotton, the Executive-Secretary of the Corinth-Alcorn Area Chamber of Commerce, told the group here Monday night that a group will only "gain as much as they desire" in a Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber leader was invited to speak to the local club and explain the methods of organization for a Chamber of Commerce.

While issuing a strong appeal in favor of a chamber, Cotton also reminded the local leaders here that the Chamber will only succeed if the people here are adequately interested.

He commented that there

"are several different kinds of Chambers of Commerce, different methods of organization, and different methods of operation. These all, most of them being successful, are operating in their respective communities."

In referring to his hometown Chamber in Corinth, Cotton said that the Chamber had several committees set up . . . one to deal with each of the facets of the community. "It is essential to keep abreast of the world happenings," Cotton said.

He also pointed to the recently-held "Crossroads Jubilee" in Corinth and Alcorn County of which was a big success. The civic leader said that we had "over 3,000 persons actively working on this adventure . . . and in all our activities, we have help from the community."

Pointing to the recent slogan of the City . . . "What A Place To Live, Corinth", He said that "later on, you'll see a change in this wording so as to accommodate a different parcel of the community."

Cotton pointed to the State agencies who have "helped us tremendously. Large companies also have personnel who are willing to help local Chambers of Commerce when trying to locate their plants in your community."

Members of the Booneville Jaycees commented that

Cities Ask \$8 Million For Streets

A far-reaching seven-point program was presented at a meeting of the Miss. Municipalities Association here Tuesday night.

At the top of the priority list was a Street Aid Program.

It was noted that Miss. cities will ask for \$8 million in state aid for construction, maintenance and repair of city streets from the 1974 Mississippi Legislature.

W. J. Caraway, executive director of the association, said that Mississippi cities would not be allowed to properly maintain business streets and build new streets if the program were not passed.

Caraway said that the eight million would come from the state's general fund as part of a \$25 million sales tax paid on gasoline paid by Mississippi motorists. \$17 million of the \$25 million goes to counties for road programs.

Caraway said that the Mississippi cities currently

receive only one per cent of the Mississippi road use and privilege tax while 25 per cent of the fuel consumed is on city streets.

He said that if Mississippi cities were put in a financial bind when Internal Revenue Service ruled that the sales tax was a state revenue and could not be used as a tabulation for city revenue funds. Mississippi municipalities have an annual sales tax collection of over \$36 million.

Caraway said the MMA will also push for six additional legislative changes.

Elimination of a three per cent charge by the state tax commission for collection of city sales tax.

Re-enactment of a law allowing cities to withhold 10 per cent of a contract price as security on a contract.

Forgive disaster loans made to cities on the Gulf Coast during Hurricane Camille, flood-stricken cities in the Mississippi Delta and cities hit by tornadoes in Northeast Mississippi.

A new statute requiring names and addresses on all petitions presented to cities and governments.

A statute allowing cities to draw interest on surplus funds as states and counties are now allowed to do.

Re-codifying and rewriting of Mississippi privilege tax laws.

Hospitality Group To Be Honored Here

Two leaders of the Mississippi Hospitality Industry will be honored at a special dedication ceremony at 11:30 a.m., today (Thursday) on the Northeast Mississippi Junior College campus here announced Harold T. White, president.

White said that the Hotel-Motel-Restaurant Management Technology Program will dedicate the lobby of its hotel-motel complex to the late George M. Wilkinson, and the dining room to Mike Christopher of Bay Springs, Miss.

Wilkinson was a native of New Orleans and served as

president and managing director of Courtes Inn, Inc., owners of the Hotel Heidelberg, the Jacksonville Master Hosts Inn and Le Fleur's Restaurant in Jackson, Miss.

He served on the board of directors of the Mississippi Innkeeper's Association and the American Hotel and Motel Association. Wilkinson served as president of the MIA and of the Mississippi Restaurant Association.

In 1967, he received the Hospitality Magazine's Award as the Most Outstanding Hotel Man of the Year, and was installed in the Hospitality Hall of Fame.

Christopher arrived in the United States from Izmir and settled in Jackson in 1905. Traveling extensively, he became known as "The Best Known Man in the State."

Dedicated to uplifting the operational and service standards of the restaurant industry in Mississippi and the South, he published "The Restaurant Review" magazine, which remained the official voice of the Food Service Industry in the South until his retirement in 1964.

Following World War II, Christopher was instrumental in forming vocational training classes in food service in Mississippi. Vitrally interested in training and education for many years, he was made an honorary member of the Mississippi Restaurant Association. He was a mainstay and proponent of the organization of the MRA in the early 1940's. He is

a veteran of World War I having served in France as an infantryman, then as a cook.

White said the dedication will be followed by a buffet luncheon prepared by the student under the direction of Roy Bailey, instructor. The HMR Program is a two-year Associate of Arts course offering instruction in the operational and business courses required for a hospitality management career.

Representatives of the food and lodging industries from throughout Mississippi will be present for the dedication. The HMR lobby and dining room is located on the second floor of Wright Hall on the Northeast Mississippi Junior College campus.

Best Way To Handle Income

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: My wife and I both work. She insists on each paying certain bills. I feel the better way is to put all the money together and pay expenses out of the combined amount. What do you think? - W.O., New Tazewell, Tenn.

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: Personally, I think one of the easiest and least confusing ways to handle money when both spouses work is to have a joint checking and/or savings account. Both paychecks should be deposited in the same account. On this basis, both know for what the money is spent as well as the total income each pays.

It doesn't matter which one pays the bills as long as both agree on the arrangement. The amount left over should be spent, invested, or put into a savings account with the mutual agreement of both. This method of handling the family income keeps distrust over finances at a minimum. Certainly, each spouse should have a little spending money for lunch, coffee, and other miscellaneous items but it should be minimal. If all money is accounted for, there will be less distrust and fewer arguments, at least over finances. Also, the couple will be surprised how much can be saved.

For the benefit of other readers, there are other ways of handling money; however, if your method is satisfactory, at least for you, by all means, continue rather than necessarily making a change.

ARE SEX AND LOVE SEPARATE?

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: I am a senior in high school and have dated this guy for over a year. He says that sex and love are separate. My social science teacher says they go together. I'm confused. - L.E., Princeton, W. Va.

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: Sex is a biological drive and has no conscience. It is controlled by what a person believes, or his philosophy of life. In other words, sex is a function of the body. Love, on the other hand, is a much broader area of emotions, attitudes, ideas, and ideals which include sex as only one aspect. Love encompasses much more than just sex.

Love is characterized by putting another's well-being above oneself; by sacrificing to protect and enhance the other's welfare and happiness. In other words, love is other-centered; sex is self-centered. Love involves what you can give others; sex involves what you can get from others. Love directs and guides the proper use of sex.

In western society, the mores dictate that the proper place for sex is in marriage. When a guy backs a girl into a corner by saying that if she really loved him, she would give in, then, she should consider seriously whether he really loves her and if so, why would he seek his own selfish gratification, not considering her welfare, her reputation and her feelings.

True love doesn't demand; it gives. Sex, on the other hand, demands and it takes. Emphasis on sex without love is characterized by selfishness, lack of consideration, and self-centeredness.

Sex is only a part of life, not to be considered separately. It's true, many engage in sex for the purpose of sheer sexual gratification with no thought of love. However, for sex to be meaningful and emotionally gratifying, it should be within the greater context of love and marriage.

'Can't Have Cake And Eat It Too...'

The Mississippi Economic Council notes that the old expression "...You can't have your cake and eat it too" ... seems to particularly apply to our present energy crisis. In the nation's determined search to eliminate air pollution, we have aggravated another growing national concern ... the energy shortage.

The conflict of goals takes many forms, but one that affects each of us is the control of automotive emissions. The control devices, particularly on the newer models, use more fuel. The Federal Office of Emergency Preparedness says that gasoline consumption has increased 300,000 barrels a day because of such pollution controls. It makes sense to hold emission standards at the present level as a conservation measure.


Regardless of what kind of emission controls are ultimately installed on cars, these devices will operate best if the vehicle is properly tuned. Proper maintenance will be as important in reducing automotive pollution as the control devices themselves. A well-tuned car runs more efficiently and gets better gas mileage.

Proper maintenance can be instrumental in achieving the broader goals of a cleaner environment and energy conservation.

BRIDGE for EVERYONE

When the bidding is over and the contract established it then becomes the responsibility of the defender in the opening lead position to establish a line of play to defeat the declarer. This is often a difficult position because his choice of opening can make a great difference in the outcome of the hand. As an example, in today's offering if West opens fourth from his "longest and strongest" South will easily make his three no-trumps scoring three diamonds four spades and the other two aces. The four spade tricks are won by first surrendering a small spade to either opponent.

Later, reflecting on this hand, I may have done better if I had taken the second heart leaving the jack with West to block the suit. This way he may be forced to open up the diamonds or clubs and save one heart trick, however, West counter argued that in this event he will discard the jack of hearts on my third spade, thereby setting up his partner's two remaining hearts. Sometimes you can't win! I still lose three hearts, a spade and the ace of diamonds.

The lesson to learn here is the wisdom of the opening lead. Very often it is safer to open the top of a sequence rather than a broken four or five card suit. Some experts contend that half of the unmakeable three notrump contracts are made by the opening lead. West's king of hearts is obviously safe and will not surrender an otherwise unobtainable trick to the declarer.

Your humble bridge reporter sat in the South position opposite a shrewd West who looked for a better way to defend. He realized his two minor suits were weak and since neither

opponent had mentioned hearts decided to attack from his three heart honors. He opened the king of hearts which I ducked, and he continued with the queen which I also ducked, but now I had to play my ace on the third heart.

Since West had bid diamonds I figured I could count on no more than two diamond tricks, therefore I should try to make all five spades. When the spades failed to break after three leads, I surrendered a spade to East to establish my fifth. East cashed his high heart and got out with the queen of clubs to establish West's king, which with the diamond ace sunk my contract.

Pause For Power

The Man Who Was The Same ...Yet Different

Jesus Christ was a true man. Since the Bible says, "Without the shedding of blood there is no remission of sins," then to deny the real humanity of Christ would be to rob us of our Savior.

Yet, at the same time, we must be careful to observe that there were certain basic differences between the humanity of Jesus Christ and our present humanity. Although none of these detracted from the reality of his humanity, there were four essential differences between his human nature and ours.

First, Jesus Christ had no human father. Jesus was virgin-born. By the virgin birth we mean that the human nature of Jesus Christ was supernaturally conceived in the womb of the Virgin Mary by the Holy Spirit, and this excluded any activity on the part of man. Jesus Christ therefore did not have a natural human father.

Second, Christ did not have a sin nature. Now, you and I are born with a sinful nature. Jesus Christ said, "That which is born of the flesh is flesh" (John 3:6). By the word, flesh, Jesus referred to sinful nature. Jesus Christ was therefore saying, "That which is born of sinful nature is sinful nature." But the Bible records the announcement of Jesus' birth in these words, "And the angel answered and said unto her, The Holy Spirit shall come upon thee, and the power of the highest shall overshadow thee; therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God" (Luke 1:34). Notice those words, "that holy thing," referring to the human nature of Jesus. The Holy Spirit, in the hour of conception, preserved the human nature of Jesus Christ from the corruption of original sin. This is why Jesus is called the last Adam. As the first Adam was created perfect and sinless by God the Holy Spirit.

The third difference between the human nature of Jesus Christ and our human nature is this: his humanity was not characterized by any act of sin. Jesus Christ was not only sinless in nature; He was also sinless in conduct. The Bible says, "In him is no sin" (1 John 3:5). The Bible calls Jesus, "a Lamb without blemish and without spot" (1 Peter 1:19). Jesus never thought a sinful thought. He never spoke a sinful word. And He never committed a sinful act. Jesus Christ was absolutely sinless.

The fourth difference was this: his humanity was not subject to physical death. Once again, Jesus Christ was also like the first Adam in this respect. When the first Adam was created, he was not created to die. His humanity was not sub-

Proper Farm Machinery Storage Protects Investment

Proper machinery storage during off seasons is important to farmers who are interested in protecting the investments they have made in farm machinery. Mr. Kenneth Geno, agriculture teacher at Vo-Tech School, indicates that some farmers often leave farm machinery where they get through with it at the end of the season. Proper storage can save money by preventing rusting, deterioration, and other damage that exposure to weather causes.

Mr. Geno also indicates that cleaning and parking a piece of farm machinery under a shed is beneficial but may not be enough. The machinery storage shed will protect the exterior of the machinery from exposure to the weather. Internally, engines may need certain specific care, such as the removal of old oil and grease. Fuel should be drained from the tank, line, and carburetor to prevent the formation of gum. Rust preventive oil should be poured into each cylinder. The ends of the exhaust pipe and breather pi-

TO CUT HEATING BILL
The best way to cut your home heating bill -- or keep it at its lowest possible point -- is to avoid heating the outdoors.

Warm air rises and expands, and if there are ways for it to get out of your house it will. Here are some tips that may help you cut the cost of heating.

First, insulate. Insulation is a relatively inexpensive material and a properly insulated home has little heat loss. Place 4 to 6 inches of insulation between the ceiling joists in the attic. Fill spaces between walls. Also put insulation between floor joists under all rooms that cover unheated areas such as crawl spaces.

Use storm windows and storm doors. You can substitute clear vinyl or plastic sheetings if you wish. Secure sheeting to outside window trims with strips of screen molding.

Keep doors closed. It's a good idea to install self-closing fasteners on storm doors.

Close fireplace dampers when fireplace is not in use. If the fireplace is never used, close it off with insulating board. This will reduce the

ject to death. But Adam disobeyed God; and in the hour that Adam disobeyed God, Adam died spiritually, and the seeds of physical death were sown into his body so that one day Adam died physically. Every child of Adam, since the Garden of Eden, is born to die. Every man carries within him the sentence of his death. The Bible says, "It is appointed unto man once to die" (Hebrews 9:27).

But Jesus Christ was not subject to death. The Bible says, "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). But since Jesus Christ had no sin nature and since Jesus committed no sinful act, death had no right to Jesus Christ.

But someone will object, Jesus did die physically. Quite true! But, Jesus died, because He chose to die. He was not liable to death. Jesus himself said, "I lay down my life, that I might take it again. No man taketh it from me, but I lay it down of myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again" (John 10:17, 18). You and I have no say in this matter of death. We are appointed to die. Because we are sinners, even saved sinners, we are subject to physical death and we will one day die physically. But, since Jesus Christ was sinless, He was not subject to physical death. He did die, but He died because He chose to die.

Let me point out, however, that these four differences do not alter in the least bit the fact that Jesus Christ was a true man. Jesus was a real man.

May I remind you in closing that the Savior of sinners must be both God and man. As a man, Jesus Christ was able to shed his blood and to die for sinners. As the infinite God, however, his death is of infinite value.

To sum up: the death of Christ is an atonement of infinite value simply because it was effected by an infinite person, the God-man, Christ Jesus.

RYEGRASS SEED FOR 1974

At the present time it appears that Ryegrass seed supplies for 1974 will be adequate. Some sources expect an increase in acres harvested in 1974. There is some question about potential yields because of the nitrogen shortage.

Prices will be at least as high as they were this year and probably higher, possibly 40 cents to 45 cents. Seed companies have been contracting production with Oregon producers at 20 cents per pound to the farmer. Contracting with producers in Oregon has stopped indicating that companies feel that supplies are going to be adequate.

In view of the probably high prices this would be a good time for farmers who have harvesting, handling and storing facilities to produce and save Ryegrass seed.

TIMBER MARKETING

In growing timber for a profit, you must favor those trees that can be sold. Trees that are in less demand must be removed, sold if possible, to make room for the better trees.

To distinguish between pulpwood, sawlogs, poles and veneer requires a good deal of effort and technical information.

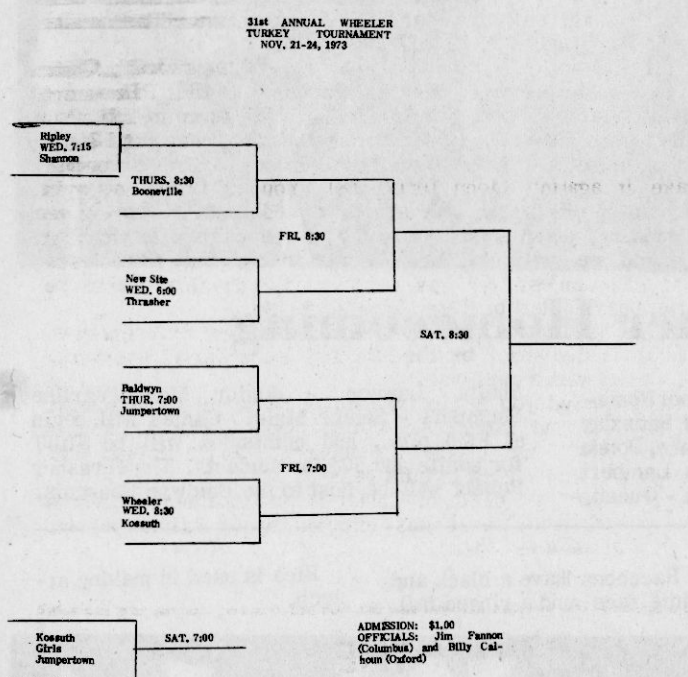

ASCS News

Nominations Completed For ASC Farmer Committees
Some 30 farm residents of Prentiss county are in the running for 5 Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) community committees.

The mail election for ASC community committees is being held this month, and ballots will be mailed on or before Nov. 23 to all persons eligible to vote in the farmer committee elections. The final date for mailing voted ballots, or for dropping them off at the county ASCS office, is Dec. 3. Ballots will be counted on Dec. 5 in the county ASCS office, Front Street, with the public invited to attend.

On Dec. 13 the newly elected community committees will hold a county convention to nominate and elect 3 county committee members and two alternates. The newly-elected county com-

mittee members will serve for three years, the alternates for one year.

ASC community committees not only elect members of the ASC county committee, but also assist the county committee throughout the year in the administration of federal farm programs locally. In Prentiss County the principal farm programs are cotton, feed grain, price support, FSF loans.

In the community committee mail election, farmers in each community will elect three committee members and two alternates, all to serve one-year terms.

Any farmer who is eligible to take part in any ASCS program is eligible to vote in the mail election. Voting eligibility is determined without regard to race, sex, color, religion or national origin.

A list of known eligible voters is on file at the county ASCS office, and is open for public inspection. If a man or woman feels he or she is eligible to vote and is not listed, just call

it to the attention of anyone in the office, and it will be checked out right away. Farmers might also want to check at the county office to be sure which ASCS community they are in.

Nominees for ASC community committees are listed below by communities. In the mail election, those with the three largest number of votes will be elected community committee members, the next two highest will be alternates. Jimmy Moore, Jim Sorrell and Eugene White; Community B - J. P. Davis, T. W. Hatfield, Joe H. McKinney, Carey Pike, Leon Tidwell and Hershel Williams; Community E - Travis Barron, Sylvester Crow, Wayne Grimes, R. L. Lindsey, Thurman McCreary and J. Q. Weaver. Cotton Production Records

Essential

Cotton growers are reminded that complete, accurate records of 1973 cotton production on each farm are essential.

The actual production of cotton on each farm in 1973 will be used to set up the payment yield under the 1974 cotton program.

In keeping adequate records producers in Prentiss and adjoining counties should know the farm serial number of each farm on which cotton is being produced and that it be furnished to the ginners as each bale of cotton is delivered. Also, the form, Record of 1973 Cotton Production, recently forwarded by the County ASCS Office, should be used and a separate list maintained for each gin and each farm. Additional forms can be obtained by calling or visiting the office.

Where cotton was planted on the farm for 1973 and none produced, it will be necessary for the county committee to make a determination as to whether or not the crop was planted and handled in a workmanlike manner.

The 1974 payment yields for cotton farms cannot be determined until the 1973 production records are turned in to the county office. If no production evidence is furnished, the production for 1973 will be considered as zero. To prevent misplacement and oversight, records should be filed at the county office as soon as possible after harvest is completed.

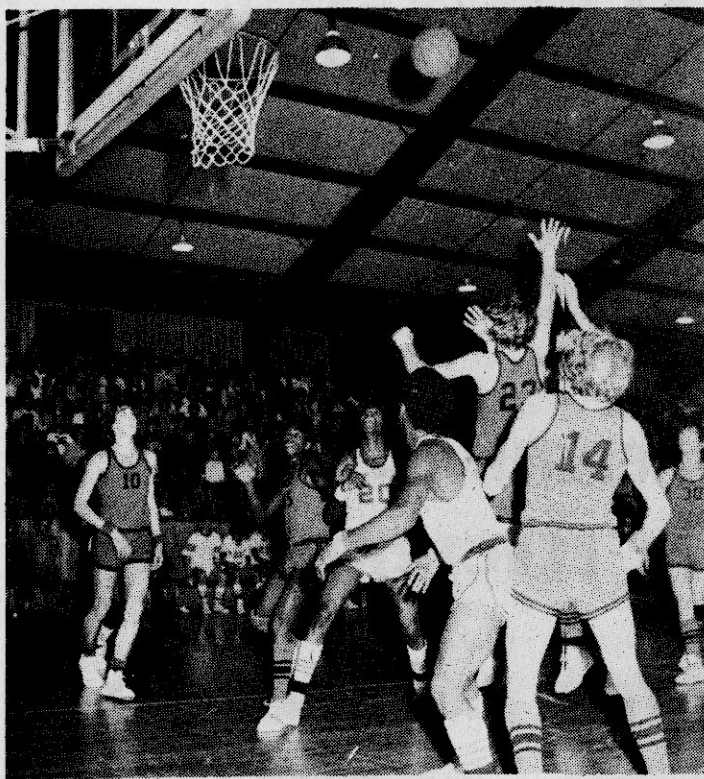

Marijuana is one of the drugs that is most widely used today, especially among our young people. Outside of alcohol, it is probably the most abused drug in Prentiss County. Marijuana is a hemp plant and was introduced in 1962, even though it has been grown for 5000 years. The principal drug was identified in 1964 and serious study was begun in 1968. The male plant flowers and sheds its leaves, however, there is no more drug in the female plant than in the male variety. The marijuana plant doesn't contain any medicinal value but is used as a food in but the seed is used as a food in many places.

The Mexican plant is more potent than those grown in our country, therefore, about 95% of that used here is brought in from Mexico.

The individual on marijuana usually talks more, becomes stimulated, has increased sensory awareness, has a sedate situation, hallucinations, has a lack of motivation and experiences psychosis. Unlike a person on alcohol, a marijuana abuser doesn't stagger or have a slur of speech.

Some signs to look for in

telling whether a person is on marijuana are: redness underneath eyes, dry mouth, dilating of eye pupils, change in behavior and attitude, awareness of strange odor. Sometimes marijuana is called grass, weed, pot, hashish or Mary Jane. It may be swallowed as well as smoked. The organic damage to the body is unknown.

Registering the guest upon their arrival in the church foyer were Judy Eaton and Gloria Phillips, sisters of the bride.

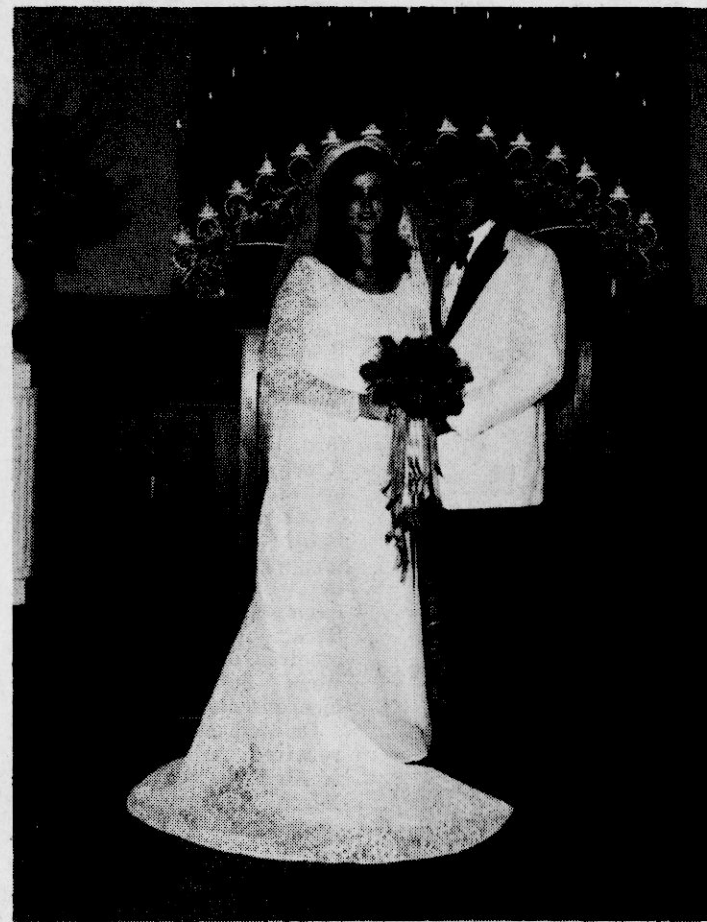
Mrs. Crabb chose a gown of blue net for her daughters wedding and wore a cor-

Tested Tips To Help You

TIPS ON TUBS

Making an old fiber glass bathtub or shower stall look like new can be as easy as polishing furniture.

Start by removing built up dirt and grime with any

popular liquid detergent—full strength from the bottle—rubbing with a sponge. Non-abrasive scouring pads made of nylon, saran or polyethylene can be used sparingly for hard-to-remove stains.

As a last resort, turpentine or paint thinner should remove persistent spots. Be sure to follow safety directions on the container and use these volatile materials only in well ventilated areas away from open flame.

Never use metal scouring pads or abrasive powders. They will remove the protective coating on fiber glass fixtures.

Once the surface is thoroughly clean, the original luster of fiber glass can be restored with a light application of automobile wax, liquid or paste. Since a waxed surface can be slippery when wet, do not wax areas used for standing.
