## Soybeans Stolen Monday

A truck load of about 200 bushels of soybeans was sto-len from the W. M. Murphy Farm here Monday night, ac-cording to Prentiss County

authorities. County Sheriff Roy Elder said that the soybeans were stolen from the truck sometime during the night. It was noted that the beans were supposedly loaded on-to another truck and hauled

The farm is located some six miles west of Boo-neville, on the New Bryant

Officials said that some truck tracks were found at the scene, and a complete investigation is being carried on by the county Sheriff's Department.

Local farmers are being asked not to leave cotton and soybeans in the fields unattended. Officials said that "if their equipment is broken down or they have to leave these products in the fields, they should notify the Sheriff's Department so

Local people are also asked to report any suspicious looking vehicles traveling the roads, and if seen, try to obtain the tag number and the description of the vehicles. These reports should be made directly to the Sheriff's Department.

Officials said this is the first incident of this type this year.

Mr. Murphy commented that a reward is being offered to anyone who provides information which leads to the arrest and conviction of the suspects.

The soybeans are reported to bring "somewhere in the neighborhood of %5 per bushel."



### **Best Way To Handle Income**

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: My wife and II both work. She insists on each paying certain bills. I feel the better way is to put all the money together and pay expenses out of the combined amount. What do you think? -- W.O., New Tazewell, Tenn.

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: Personally, I think one of the easiest and least confusing ways to handle money when both spouses work is to have a joint checking and/or savings account Both paychecks shoulld be deposited in the same account. On this basis, both know for what the money is spent as well as the total imcome each payday

It doesn't matter which one pays the bills as long as both agree on the arrangement. The amount left over should be spent, invested, or put into a savings account with the mutual agreement of both. This method of handling the family income keeps distrust over finances at a minimum. Certainly, each spouse should have a little spending money for lunch, coffee, and other miscellaneous items but it should be minimal. If all money is accounted for, there will be less distrust and fewer arguments, at least over finances. Also, the couple will be surprised how much can be saved.

For the benefit of other readers, there are other ways of handling money; however, if your method is satisfactory, at least for you, by all means, comtinue rather than necessarily making a change.

### 'Can't Have Cake And Eat It Too ... '

The Mississippi Economic Council notes that the old expression . . . "You can't have your cake and eat it too" . . . seems to particularly apply to our present energy crisis. In the nation's determined search to eliminate air pollution, we have aggravated another growing national concern . . . the energy shortage.

The conflict of goals takes many forms, but one that affects each of us is the control of automotive emissions. The control devices, particularly on the newer models, use more fuel. The Federal Office of Emergency Preparedness says that gasoline consumption has increased 300,000 barrels a day because of such pollution controls. It makes sense to hold emission standards at the present level as a conservation measure.

Regardless of what kind of emission controls are ultimately installed on cars, these devices will operate best if the vehicle is properly tuned. Proper maintenance will be as important in reducing automotive pollution as the control devices themselves. A well-tuned car runs more efficiently and gets better gas mileage.

Proper maintenance can be instrumental in achieving the broader goals of a cleaner environment and energy conser-

When the bidding is over and the contract established it then becomes the responsibility of the defender in the opening lead position to establish a line of play to defeat the declarer. This is often a difficult position because his choice of opening can make a great difference in the outcome of the hand. As an example, in today's offering if West opens fourth from his "longest and strongest" South will easily make his three notrumps scoring three diamonds four spades and the other two aces. The four spade tricks are won by first surrendering a small

Opening lead-King of hearts. Your humble bridge re-porter sat in the South position opposite a shrewd West who looked for a better way to defend. He realized his two minor suits were weak and since neith-

er opponent had mentioned hearts decided to attack from his three heart hon-ors. He opened the king of hearts which I ducked, and he continued with the queen which I also ducked, ace on the third heart.

Since West had bid diamonds I figured I could count on no more than two diamond tricks, therefore I should try to make all five spades. When the spades failed to break after three leads, I surrend-ered a spade to East to establish my fifth. East cashed his high heart and got out with the queen of clubs to establish West's king, which with the diamond ace sunk my con-

Later, reflecting on this hand, I may have done bet-ter if I had taken the second heart leaving the jack with West to block the suit. This way he may be forced to open up the diamonds or clubs and save one heart trick, however, West counter argued that in this event he will discard the jack of hearts on my third spade, thereby setting up his partner's two remaining hearts. Sometimes you can't win! I still lose three hearts, a spade and the ace

The lesson to learn here is the wisdom of the opening lead. Very often it is safer to open the top of a sequence rather than a broken four or five card suit. Some experts contend that half of the unmakeable three notrump contracts are made by the opening lead. West's king of hearts is obviously safe and will not surrender an otherwise unobtainable trick to the declarer.

Pause For Power

Jesus Christ was a true man. Since the Bible says, "Without the shedding of blood there is no remission of sins," then to deny the real humanity of Christ would be to rob us of our Savior.

Yet, at the same time, we must be careful to observe that there were certain basic differnces between the humanity of Jesus Christ and our present humanity. Although none of these detracted from the reality of his humanity, there were four essential differences between his human nature and ous.

First, Jesus Christ had no human father. Jesus was virgin-By the virgin birth we mean that the human nature of Jesus Christ was supernaturally conceived in the womb of the Virgin Mary by the Holy Spirit, and this excluded any activity on the part of man. Jesus Christ therefore did not have a natural human father.

Second, Christ did not have a sin nature. Now, you and I are born with a sinful nature. Jesus Christ said, "That which is born of the flesh is flesh" (John 3:6). By the word, flesh, Jesus referred to sinful nature. Jesus Christ was therefore saying, "That which is born of sinful nature is sinful nature." But the Bible records the announcement of Jesus' birth in these words, "And the angel answered and said unto her, The Holy Spirit shall come upon thee, and the power of the highest shall overshadow thee; therefore also that holy thing which shall be been of the shall be called the that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God" (Luke 1:34). Notice those words, "that holy thing," referring to the human nature of Jesus. The Holy Spirit, in the hour of conception, preserved the human nature of Jesus Christ from the corruption of original sin. This is why Jesus is called the last Adam. As the first Adam was created perfect and sinless by God the Holy Spirit.

The third difference between the human nature of Jesus Christ and our human nature is this: his humanity was not characterized by any act of sin. Jesus Christ was not only sinless in nature; He was also sinless in conduct. The Bible says, "In him is no sin" (I John 3:5) The Bible calls Jesus, 'a Lamb without blemish and without spot" (I Peter 1:19). Jesus never thought a sinful thought. He never spoke a sinful word. And He never committed a sinful act. Jesus Christ was absolutely sinless.

The fourth difference was this: his humanity was not subject to physical death. Once again, Jesus Chrsit was also like the first Adam in this respect. When the first Adam was created, he was not created to die. His humanity was not sub-

## Agricultural-ly Speaking

Proper Farm Machinery Storage Protects Investment Proper machinery storage during off seasons is important to farmers who are interested in protecting the investments they have made in farm machinery. Mr. Kenneth Geno, agriculture teacher at Vo-Tech School, indicates that some farmers often leave farm machinery where they get through with it at the end of the season. Proper storage can save money by preventing rusting, deterioration, and other damage that exposure to wea-

Mr. Geno also indicates that cleaning and parking a der a shed is beneficial but may not be enough. The machinery storage shed will protect the exterior of the machinery from exposure to the weather. Internally, engines may need certain specific care, such as the removal of old oil and grease. Fuel should be drained from the tank, line, and carburetor to prevent the formation of gum. Rust preventive oil should be poured into each cylinder. The ends of the exhause pipe and breather pipe should be plugged to keep our moisture. The exter-ior belts and chanis on machinery should be loosened. Wooden blocks should be used under axles to remove weight from tires. The battery should be removed and stored so that it is protected from freezing. The cooling system should be drained, flushed, and winterized. To prevent the clutch facing from sticking to the flywheel or pressure plate, the clutch should be disen-

All of the above activities are of general importance in protecting farm machinery during storage. Operator's manuals often give the details on the storage of specific machinery.

But, Jesus died, because He chose to die. He was not liable to death. Jesus himself said, "I lay down my life, that I might take it again. No man taketh it from me, but I lay it down of myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again" (John 10:17, 18). You and I have nos ay in this matter of death. We are appointed to die. Because we are sinners, even saved sinners, we are subject to physical death and we will one day die physically. But, since Jesus Christ was sinless, He was not subject to physical death. He did dile, but He died because He chose to die.

Lett me point out, however, that these four differences do not allter in the least bit the fact that Jesus Christ was a true man. Jesus was a real man.

May I remind you in closing that the Savior of sinners must be both God and man. As a man, Jesus Christ was able to shed his blood and to die for sinners. As the infinite God, however, his death is of infinite value.

To sum up: the death of Christ is an atonement of infinite value simply because it was effected by an infinite person, the God-man, Christ Jesus.

RYEGRASS SEED FOR 1974

Att the present time it appear's that Ryegrass seed supplies for 1974 will be adequate. Some sources expect an iincrease in acres harvested in 1974. There is some question about poten-tial yields because of the nitrogen shortage.

Prices will be at least as high as they were this year and probably higher, possibly 40 cents to 45 cents. Seed companies have beeen contraciting production with Oregon producers at 20 cents per pound to the farmer. Contracting with producers in Orregon has stopped indicating that companies feel that supplies are going to be adequaite.

In view of the probably high prices this would be a good time for farmers who have harvesting, handling and storing facilities to produce and save Ryegrass seed.

TIMBER MARKETING

In growing timber for a profiit, you must favor those trees that can be sold. Trees that are in less demand must be removed, sold if possible, to make room for the better trees.

To distinguish between pulpwood, sawlogs, poles and veneer requires a good deal of effort and technical information. But it can mean as much as 300 percent to 400 percent more money.

An example: We genera-lly think of three to four cords of pulpwood per 1,000 board feet of sawlogs (Doule Rule). If pulpwood brings \$6 a cord stumpage, that amounts to \$18 to \$24 per 1,000 board feet. For sawlogs, stumpage would be three or four times as much. However, many trees that can be sold as pulpwood cannot be sold as sawlogs.

Also consider this: By the Doyle Rule, a tree 12-inches in diameter has twice the board foot volume as a 10inch tree. The tree under

good management can grow from 10-inches in diameter to 12-inches in four to six years. You can double your volume and money in this additional time, and that's a pretty good return on your investment. FARM-CITY WEEK



Essential Cotton growers are reminded that complete, accurate records of 1973 cotton pro-

duction on each farm are es-

sential. The actual production of cotton on each farm in 1973 will be used to set up the payment yield under the 1974

cotton program. In keeping adequate records producers in Prentiss and adjoining counties should know the farm serial number of each farm on which cotton is being produced and that it be furnished to the ginners as each bale of cotton is delivered. Also, the form, Record of 1973 Cotton Production, recently forwarded by the County ASCS Office, should be used and a separate list maintained for each gin and each farm. Additional forms can be obtained by calling or visiting the office.

Where cotton was planted on the farm for 1973 and none produced, it will be necessary for the county committee to make a determination as to whether or not the crop was planted and handled in a workmanlike

The 1974 payment yields for cotton farms cannot be determined until the 1973 production records are turned in to the county office. If no production evidence is furnished, the production for 1973 will be considered as zero. To prevent misplacement and oversight, records should be filed at the county office as soon as possible after harvest is completed.

Once the surface is thoroughly clean, the original luster of fiber glass can be re-stored with a light application of automobile wax, liquid or paste. Since a waxed surface can be slippery when wet, do not wax areas used for standing.




