

# 1980's First Icy, Cold Weather Leaves Its Mark On The County

The first really cold weather of 1980 moved into the area last week, blanketing the county with a layer of ice and snow and causing damage to some of the county's

Electric power was disrupted in some areas of the county Wednesday, Jan. 30, and employees of the Prentiss County Electric Power Association had to work well into the night to resttore power to local residents.

Booneville Police Chief W.W. Stacy said that inspite of the freezing rain and smow, the city's streets had remained passable for the most part and there were relatively few weather related accidents reported.

Radio operator-dispatcher Joey Cobb said that the Prentiss County Sheriff's Department had received a few calls on weather related accidents, "more than ususal." However, he said that most of them were minor accidents, such as cars off in ditches.

Prentiss County schools were closed several days because of the weather conditions.

J.W. Abernethy, manager of the Prentiss County Electric Power Association, said Tuesday that power over the entire county was out for 14 minutes Wednesday, Jan. 30, due to a TVA power line being knocked out by a tree in the Burmsville-Iuka area.

Abernethy said that was the only time the Baldwyn substation was out. "We didn't have nearly as much ice south of here," he said.

However, in areas around Booneville and in the nor-

thern part of the county, the PCEPA work crews were extremely busy with a number of trees and limbs on the lines the first day of the ice, Abernethy said.

"At one point, we had some 3,000 customers out of service," he estimated. "The longest outages were from about 4 to 10 p.m. Wednesday.'

"We had one very serious case of trouple out east in the county that took us a good while to repair," he said." but we had everybody back in power by 11 p.m."

Abernethy said that the power association had not had any major trouble since that time. "We've had a few limbs on service lines that knocked one individual customer out and he would call us and we would repair

"Our system stood up really well under the ice," he said. "Our customers allowing us to clear our right-ofway really paid off."

Abernethy said that the outages were caused by both ice on the lines themselves and by ice causing tree limbs to break off and fall on the lines.

'We lost one pole out on Highway 30, he said. "That was caused from the weight of the ice breaking the guy wire and, in turn, breaking the pole. That was the longest outage we had. It affected the most customers."

'We had a number of lines where pine trees, particularly, heavy with ice would fall through the power lines or lean against them," he added.

Abernethy said that there have not been any such problems at all so far this week.

# Inquiry On Tenn-Tom Defeated

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway project came under scrutiny in the U.S. House of Representatives last week when a member of the House from Pennsylvania introduced an amendment requesting that a task force be established to investigate the project. However, the amendment was defeated when put to a vote.

The Edgar Amendment, named after its author, sought to "establish a task force to review the construction, organization and management of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway to determine the extent to which they conform to the purposes and intent of the project's authorization."

In making his presentation to the House, Congressman Edgar said the amendment "simply tries to address the problems we face with the Tenessee-Tombigbee Waterway."

"It is designed to be a study and analysis of this particular project with an expeditious reporting back to Congress on that particular project," he said.

Stating that the amendment would not block construction of the project while the studies proposed by the amendment are underway, Congressman Edgar said that the purpose of the amendment is "to provide the Congress with an updated objective base of information on the largest public works project in the country.'

# SO, YOU THINK ONE RELIGION IS AS GOOD **AS ANOTHER?**

In the last couple of Months the consequences of a religion known as Islam (or Moslem) has demanded world attention. Its adherents, though divided, number approximately 700,000,000 and are scattered over the entire globe. Islam, as a religious system, was originated by the Arabs who for the most part, are descendents of Abraham. To Abraham and his handmaid, Hagar, was born Ishmael. God promised to bless Ishmael, to multiply his seed exceedingly, and make him a great nation. Genesis 17:20. He had twelve sons and at least one daughter by his Egyptian wife. Genesis 25:12-18. Ishmael's tribes did become a great nation and it was prophesied that he would be an uncontrollable type of person, striving against all men. Genesis 16:12.

Esau, son of Isaac and twin brother of Jacob, married two Hittite women and later one of Ishmael's daughters. Genesis 26:34; 28:9. It is reasonably certain that these off spring of Abraham were the ancestors of the Arabs in the world today. Islam is composed of several different races; Arabs, Turks, Persians (Iranian or Indo-European) and others.

All Islamic people hold Mohammed as their original prophet and the Koran as their Bible of religious authority. The Koran, they believe, was written by Mohammed and was the direct revelation of God (Allah) to Mohammed. Moslems (Islamic people) consider all other people of the world, regardless of their religious beliefs, to be infidels. Now, do you really believe that one religion is as good as another? What do you think of Islam? About seventy percent of the Iranian population are Moslems. Much of the sorrow and mental anguish that members of fifty American families have known over the past two months have resulted from a religious action on the part of a religious people who say they believe in God. Is one religion really as good as another? If not, what are the exceptions, and on what are the exceptions which you

The so-called prophet Mohammed (Muhammad) was the source of Islam, not God. His life is surrounded by mythical traditions. Mohammed was born of poor parents in Mecca, Arabia (Now Saudi Arabia) about 570 A.D. He was relatively an uneducated man who attributed the successes and prosperity of both Jewish and Christian people to the Bible. He realized that the Arabs had no such book. One of his major objectives was to achieve prosperity and power. He offered to ally himself with the Jews and require his followers to face Jerusalem when they worshipped. His offer was rejected by the Jews so he required them to face Mecca instead, which is presently the religious center of Islam. Being disappointed in the Jews, and Christianity, as it appeared to him, Mohammed set about to develop his own religious beliefs based on the unity of God. Mecca was declared to be holy in 630 A.D. From then on no non-Moslem has knowingly been allowed

to enter the city. Islam is military, political and religious in nature. Its adherents had just as soon kill you as sit down and discuss the religious differences between you and them. Most of the land area of the world conquered and controlled by Islamic people was originally "Christian." Islam, or Moslem (meaning surrendered to the will of God) taught that God was only one being. (No trinity or Godhead.) They initially held that Christ was born of a virgin, that he was a prophet of God like Mohammed, but that he was not the Son of God. Following their conquests of large sections of the "Christian World" Islamic leaders began to "de-Christianize" their doctrine.

The Koran is a strange mixture of Jewish and Christian ethics and morals, and interpretations made by Mohammed and his followers. Islamic tradition says that the Koran is the true word of God, and that it was dictated to him by the angel Gabriel. (A similar claim is made by a group in this country concerning another book claimed to be the word of God also. Such claims, under close and open-minded investigations, have proved false.) But, this is not all. Adherents to Islam say that the Koran is a correction in the word of God of all mistakes made by Jewish and Christian writers. No true believer of the Bible can believe such.

Apparently, Ishmael is still a violent and uncontrollable man, striving against men. Those who opposed him and what he would impose on the rest of the world would be either taken and held captive, expelled or shot. Would this be true if they knew the Christ of the Bible, his love, his salvation, and the principles of truth he taught and lived?

So, you think one religion is as good as another? Yes? How could you in light of Islam and what it is doing and causing in the world today?



**Addition to Hospital Planned** 

"The consideration of the plans are underway for the construction of another wing to the Northeast Mississippi Hospital, to begin sometime im the Spring. Our hospital has been running 106 percent capacity during January and February.

The estimated cost of the new wing will be about \$200,000. It is hoped assistance will be received under the Hill-Hill-Burton Act to furnish these new facilities.

The proposed new wing is to give 25 to 30 beds to the existing 50 beds that we now have, making the Northeast Mississippi Hospital the second largest hospital in this part of the state. Our hospital will then be classified by the Mississippi Hospital Association in the large hospital group.'

#### Itawamba, Prentiss and Tishomingo This week was highlighted by an address by Governor William Winter to a joint

session of the Legislature. Governor Winter stressed the need for a good working relationship between the legislative and executive branches. He called for the need of the legislature to establish and maintain some very tough and realistic priorities.

I would like to repeat worthy and very important words spoken by Governor

"It is our responsibility to do whatever is necessary to eliminate inefficiency, duplication, poor performance and corruption wherever we find it in all areas of state government. It is my considered judgment that there remain a great many places where we can tighten up and save money and apply those savings to the delivery of services to the people.'

These words were very timely for our state with the tight money situation. The greatest tax we pay is the tax dollar that is stolen or wasted.

We can no longer tolerate corruption and waste in government. It was very rewarding to me to hear Governor Winter's remarks regarding this matter.

I have received much correspondence concerning the condition of the Medicaid Commission. Being new, there are still a great many things I have no knowledge of in this field; however, I shall relay to you the following:

In 1970, the Medicaid Commission was appropriated \$7 million by the Mississippi Legislature. Keep in mind, this does not reflect the various appropriations received from the federal government, which by the way, are substantially higher.

In 1979, the Medicaid Commission received \$51 million in appropriations. Now, Medicaid is asking for supplemental appropriation of \$2 million to sustain itself for the remainder of this fiscal vear.

I would like to make one thing perfectly clear to each one of you-the Mississippi Legislature is withholding any money from this agency. This agency has projected that they will overspend their alloted budget and are therefore asking for an additional appropriation.

I shall probably vote affirmatively on the measure: however, I have strong reservations in this regard. This has become the fastest growing expenditure in the





when it is needed. Many of the more popular news and general magazines are indexed under subject matter headings.





In a final session with the phychiatrist and his parents, Harry finally accepted the fact that he has a problem and his need for help was its greatest. At this time ne is a patient of the state hospital at Whittfield, Miss., for the care that he needs. As this was his choice we are praying that he will soon be returned to us completely

Harry's story is not finished for I am hopeful ar looking forward to writing a happy ending, but this is written in the hope that our young people who read this article, will realize that even though you are tempted to try and experience the effects of drugs, and think, as did Harry, that you are hurting no one but yourself and can stop at anytime, it is not as so easy. And your family, neighbors and friends are very deeply affected by your actions and are hurt the most because of their inability to help. God bless you.





# **Nesting Boxes Help Increase** Local Wood Duck Population

**Soil Conservation** Technician

The wood duck is a valuable asset Mississippi. It is a source of pleasure to sportsmen and bird lovers alike.

Landowners and sportsmen often ask, "What can I do to increase the duck population of our area?" One of the most important and easiest to do is provide nesting locations.

Now is the time to start thinking about erecting wood duck boxes. Wood ducks breed all over the United States and are found in Mississippi the year round. They start searching for a suitable nesting site about mid January in North Mississippi and nesting begins in February and continues throughout June.

Nesting normally occurs in natural tree cavities over water, but those in uplands up to one half mile from water may be used successfully. Dead trees often contain suitable cavities, but they remain in a usable condition for a short time. This is why we should erect artificial nesting structures.

Wood ducks will readily accept the boxes. These boxes should be constructed from one inch cypress or treated lumber. The minimum inside dimension should be 10-inches in diameter and 24-inches in height. A 3-to 4-inch oval hole 16 inches above the bottom is satisfactory for entrance.

These wood structures should have a sloping roof with a 2-to3-inch overhang for runoff water. Four quarter-luch holes should be drilled through the bottom of box for drainage and 4-to6inches of wood shavings added for nesting materials.

These boxes should then be placed on a pole or tree in or near the water. There should also be a predator guard placed around the pole. This is a strip of sheet







Although two parents from each of the county's five districts were elected to the committee, Walden said that parents do not have to sign the petition in the district in which they live. They can sign any one of the petitions, regardless of which district they live in, he said.

Last week, Booneville Mayor Charles Crabb said that a meeting has been scheduled for Friday, Feb. 8, for the Prentiss County School Board, the Booneville Municipal Separate School Board and the Booneville Board of Aldermen to try to solve some of the school systems' problems and "come to some understanding and agreement on some things."

The parents in their public meeting indicated that if the two school boards do not work together on solving the county's school problems, then they plan to seek court action in obtaining the release of their children from the county school system so that they

attend the city schools. Dr. Lovell said that if the parents are going to pursue the issue in court, then the two school systems and the EFC will have to wait until the court makes a decision before they can do anything. "If they (the school board)

are looking for a way to provide what's best for the kids this year," he said, "they can transfer them (the students) for one year until a disposition can be made of what 's going to happen to the children on a permanent basis." "Just assume that the

court says that they do not have to transfer them and they have to go to school in Prentiss County," he continued, "then this extra year would give Prentiss County time to do some planning that they need and get buildings going." "On the other hand," he

added, "if the court says the children will be permitted to go to Booneville, Prentiss County needs to know that also so that they won't start building a lot of extra buildings for these kids."

"It has to be decided before anything in the way of building programs can be started for either district," he said.

In answer to questions from the Prentiss County School Board and the EFC. the State Attorney General's office has issued an opinion that all school property owned by the Prentiss County School System which is inside the city limits of Booneville became the property of the Booneville Municipal Separate School District when it was established. This apparently said, "but it is my opinion also includes the Prentiss County Vocational Technical School and the school bus garage.

"My idea was that it (the Vo-Tech) remained the property of the county, Lovell said, "but in the Attorney General's opinion, all school property--the school houses, school furniture, teacher's homes, vacant lots, or whateverthat the county school system owns inside the city limits of Booneville, automatically became the property of the Booneville Separate Schools when the district was established."

"It would seem to me then," he continued, "that it would be to the county's advantage to sit back and say, 'Now what kind of position are we in here.'

"The county has got a trump card in that they've got the children," he said. "The city's got a trump card in that they've got the property. What they need to do, instead of fighting each other with it, is to sit down and work amicably together and work out a solution to the problem."

"And it can be done," he added, "if they will just forget their animosities."

Refering to the resolution passed by the parents at their public meeting asking the two boards to work together, Lovell said, "Living in America, when the people say to their elected officials, 'Look, you folks have got to sit down here and quit fussing and work out the problems that we've got,' that's not an unreasonable request."

"I think the parents are probably acting with real restraint and are hoping that their officials will sit down and work out the problems," he said. "And, frankly, I don't see how they can keep from doing it. After all, our business is to educate children."

another year, as some have suggested. 'That would be a matter for the Attorney General or the courts to decide," he that there is nothing in the law which allows the EFC to delay or abolish the school district."

The separate school district was created by a city ordinance, the way the law provides that it be done, Lovell said. When the proposal for a separate school district is submitted to the Educational Finance Commission, he said, there is only one decision the commission has to make and that's whether or not to approve it.

"When that decision is made," he said, "the EFC is through with it. The EFC approved it (the Booneville Separate School District) and there's no provision in the law for the EFC to change its mind," he continued. "In other words, it's done. It's a legal entity."

"If that district is postponed," he said, "in my opinion, it would have to be done by a court." I think a court would say, 'Look, you don't have to postpone this district. You folks could go ahead and operate if you would just sit down and cooperate together.' "

"I think that's what the court would say," he continued. "because this district was organized and approved in a manner which has already been approved by the Supreme Court of the state."

"I hope they get the problem solved," he continued. "If they will just sit down, men and women of good will, and say, 'Look, we've got some problems.'

"Now we (the EFC) may have caused some of them (the problems) and you folks may have caused some of them," he said, "but that doesn't really matter any more. What we've got is a bunch of kids here whose education is being threatened and we need to arrive at solutions to the problems."

# Severance Tax

But both were told to keep their hands off the severance tax so as not to disturb struggling Mississippi oil and gas production, which was only marginal anyway.

But while nobody in state government has been paying attention, suddenly Mississippi's natural gas production has begun to skyrocket from what it was just three or four years ago, pushing the state well up the line among the gasproducing states.

Specifically, since 1976, natural gas production in Mississippi has gone from 80.8 million MCF to 171.3 million MCF in 1979, more than double, and it is increasing monthly as old gas fields are being expanded because of the higher prices under new federal decontrol of interstate gas, and rising demand for intrastate gas.

Just nine years ago, Mississippi-produced natural gas was being sold for an average of only 16.5 cents



If you have children, it is difficult to keep a gun handy for an emergency and out of their reach at the same time. Once it becomes 'known' you have a gun or guns, you become a prime candidate for a burglary. With all that said, let's

compare killing vs. stopping power. All guns can kill, but few can stop someone fast enough, knock-down ability if you prefer, to save your life. Many police and security officers, using powerful, small caliber handguns, have fatally wounded an attacker, but were killed anyway because their weapon could not stop their assailant quickly enough.

In some cases, the criminal suceeded in getting close enough to stab or even strangle the officer before dying or collapsing from his wounds. When it comes to stopping or knockdown power, nothing beats a large caliber, relatively slow moving, moderate energy bullet.

If you decide to buy a gun, be sure you get someone competent to show you the correct way to shoot and maintain you weapon. Cleaning and proper care is essential in keeping your gun ready when you need it.

Forget about shooting with 'one hand.' It worked well for Roy Rogers, but the 'two hand' method has proven to be superior in real






