Rienzi Fire Station Nearing Completion

The town of Rienzi has a new fire station. Located next door to the Rienzi post office, the fire station is expected to be completed within the next several weeks, weather permitting, according to Rienzi mayor Danny Lowrey.

Work on the fire station is being funded through insurance rebate money that comes back to the town, he said. TVA funds are also expected to be received to be used to pay for the \$15,000 project.

Local labor has been hired to build the fire station. The land was donated by Joe Curlee. "This probably saved the town about \$4,000 on the cost of a lot," Lowrey noted.

Rienzi has also ordered a new 500-gallon tank fire truck to use in addition to the 750-gallon tank truck they have, Lowrey said. The fire truck is currently housed at the Rienzi Town Hall.

The fire station will be named the C.B. Curlee Memorial Building, Lowrey said.

Prentiss Ranks Low On Economic Study

A recent study by the Mississippi Economic Council shows that Prentiss ranks 52nd in a composite economic ranking of Mississippi's 82 counties.

This indicates that residents in 51 of the state's 82 counties are better off economically than are residents of Prentiss County.

The MEC study, entitled "Economic Profiles of Mississippi Counties," ranked the state's counties on the basis of seven categories. According to the report, the county with the highest composite ranking is Lee County.

Of other Northeast Mississippi counties, Alcorn County ranked 18th; Tishomingo, 19th; Union, 30th; Tippah, 29th; and Itawamba, 62nd.

Cheese And Butter To Be Distributed

Cheese and butter will be given to Medicaid and food stamp recipients, the unemployed and to charitable organizations in Prentiss County on Thursday, May 19, according to J.P. Davis, president of the Prentiss County Board of Supervisors.

The cheese and butter will be given away to eligible Prentiss Countians at the Farmers Market on North College Street, weather permitting from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m. In case of bad weather, the cheese and butter will be distributed in the courthouse.

Prentiss County will give out 300 cases of cheese and 109 cases of butter. Those eligible will receive a 5 lb. block of cheese and 2 lbs. of butter.

Marijuana Patch Found, One Arrested

The Prentiss County Sheriff's Department confiscated about 200 marijuana plants and destroyed 2,000 plants at a site about four miles north of New Site last week, according to Prentiss County Deputy John Moore.

Steven Rice, 32, of New Site has been charged with possession of marijuana, manufacturing marijuana and probation violation. Rice had served about three months in Parchman on a grand larceny charge, according to Moore.

Senator's Mobile Office To Visit County

U.S. Senator Thad Cochran's mobile office staff will visit Prentiss, Alcorn and Tishomingo counties on Wednesday, May 11.

Sen. Cochran's staff will be at the Prentiss County Courthouse in Booneville at 9 a.m., at the Alcorn County Courthouse in Corinth at 10:30 a.m., and at the Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka at 1 p.m. that day.

The Chancery Clerk's office in each county will have the exact location in the courthouse of the staff members.

Two Candidates Withdraw From Races

Two more candidates have withdrawn from political races in Prentiss County, leaving a total of 70 candidates still actively seeking election in the August primaries.

Charles (Chuck) Eldridge, who had previously qualified and then withdrawn from the county coroner's race, filed papers to qualify for the position of Justice Court Judge South on April 29. On May 2 he withdrew from that race, also.

Truman McVey has withdrawn from the 1st district constable's race. McVey said he was withdrawing because he has moved from the first district to the second district. He said he does not plan to seek the constable's position in the second district.

Local Multi-County System

TVA To Help Set Up Computer Center

County supervisors and other officials from the six-county area served by the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District learned Tuesday that the Tennessee Valley Authority will help install and set up a multi-county computer center for the District.

TVA representatives met briefly with these county officials during the annual

spring district meeting of the Mississippi Association of Supervisors Tuesday at Northeast Junior College.

The meeting was hosted by the Northeast Planning and Development District. It involved representatives from Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo counties.

Charlie Spearman, executive director, of the Planning and Development District, pointed out that TVA performed the initial feasibility study for the

computer project. He said TVA will now come in and oversee the purchase and installation of the equipment, as well as the training and instruction of personnel for a six-month period.

Spearman said the Appalachian Regional Commission has approved a \$240,000 grant to fund the computer program, which has been in the planning stage for some time now.

As outlined earlier, under this program a central computer will be located at

the Planning and Development District office on the Highway 30 Bypass in Booneville.

Each of the six counties in the district will have four terminals through which they can access the computer, plus each will have a printer to give them a hardcopy printout of their data as needed.

TVA's Hugh Grenade pointed out Tuesday that TVA and ARC have not yet finalized all the contracts involving the computer

system. "Hopefully the contractual arrangements can be worked out soon," Spearman said.

Grenade told the supervisors that once the contracts are finalized TVA personnel will meet with representatives of each county on an individual basis "to find out what your needs and expectations are and to see if we can meet them."

Neal Davis, district administrator with TVA's general manager's office in

Tupelo, told the supervisors Tuesday that TVA became involved in the project at Spearman's request.

Davis said TVA's economic development staff will do the work on the project.

James Cotton, president of a local government data processing center in Columbia, Tenn., is also working with TVA on this project. He warned the supervisors Tuesday that "it

Board Of Aldermen Hire Two New Police Officers

The Booneville board of mayor and aldermen voted to hire two new police officers -- one part-time and one full-time -- during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night at City Hall.

Upon the recommendation of Alderman Charles Steen, the board approved the hiring of Phillip Edward Coley, a former sheriff's deputy in Florida, as a part-time Booneville policeman,

and Marion Holley Tenison, a law enforcement academy graduate, as a full-time officer.

Also during the meeting, Alderman Wade Lambert recommended that the city

seek bids for liquid asphalt and slag to repair and seal city streets.

Rather than take bids on a per-mile basis as the city has done in the past, Lambert recommended that

the city advertise for bids on the liquid asphalt on a per gallon basis and for the slag by the square yard.

He said he thought this would save the city some money because of the wide

variance in the width of the city's streets.

Most of the bids when they are taken on a per-mile basis are for 20 to 24 ft. widths, he

Police Radio Dispatcher Started As Meter Maid

She used to write as many as 75 parking tickets a day when she was Booneville's meter maid.

Mary Wallace was not only Booneville's first and only meter maid, she was also the first female employed at the Booneville Police Department.

"They were dumb-founded," Mrs. Wallace smiled, as she recalled the reactions of the policemen after she first came to work at the Booneville PD sixteen years ago.

"They would just stare. It was sort of amazing to

them."

She worked as meter maid for 10 years and has worked as radio dispatcher for the last six years. She has been employed at the police department longer than any of the current employees.

The last three years she worked as meter maid she rode a Cushman -- those first seven years she walked the "beat."

"I got used to the weather," she said. "But there were times when I came to work that the weather was so cold the parking meters would freeze from the moisture and wouldn't take coins."

"I liked walking," she

continued. "I met people, such as old school friends, that I hadn't seen in years."

When there was two hour parking in uptown Booneville, she would mark the automobile tires with yellow chalk during the first hour -- and white chalk the second hour.

She had her share of people trying to get out of paying parking tickets by smearing the chalk or moving their vehicle forward so that the chalk mark wouldn't show.

But those people didn't bother Mrs. Wallace. She soon learned to put a small

chalk mark on the sidewalk. "And after working so many years, I knew who every car belonged to."

There were some days when she would write 75 tickets or more. "I hardly ever wrote less than 50 tickets for expired parking meters," she said.

Mrs. Wallace didn't give favors when it came to writing parking tickets. Whether it be friend, family, police chief, mayor or police commissioner -- they received a ticket if their automobile was parked illegally.

"If I did it that way I didn't have to take it from people that I let so-and-so get by."

She never gave tickets to law enforcement officers if they were in their patrol cars. But it was another story when the officers were in their personal cars and illegally parked.

Mrs. Wallace even gave parking tickets to both her children.

She remembers that when her son, Jerry, who is now a fireman at the Booneville Fire Department, was given a ticket "he saw me in town and he waved the little envelope at me and said 'It says 25 cents - but I don't find a quarter in here.'"

Her daughter, Patsy Shouse, who is a supervisor at Blue Bell, received a ticket one day when she

parked at Kuhns.

"Patsy later told me that she didn't see me anywhere and she didn't have any change. She thought she would be safe for a minute. But when she returned she had a ticket."

There were times, but not too often, when people would chew her out after she had given them a ticket. "I always told them it was my job and I was just getting paid to do it."

And there were those who took their complaints to the police commissioner. "The police commissioner said as long as he got complaints he knew I was doing my job."

She recalls that when she first went to work people would tell her if their meter expired there would be change on the car's dash and she could reach in and get it. "But I didn't do things like that. I told them I wasn't hired for that. They'd have to help themselves."

During the time she worked as meter maid she only had to make an arrest once. That occurred when a man and four women began fighting in front of Wright's. Mrs. Wallace stepped in between them and placed the group under arrest. Then a squad car was called to pick up the scufflers.

When free parking uptown went into effect her days as Booneville's meter maid came to a halt.

"I loved being a meter maid but I wasn't sad when free parking came. There were such few cars to work over town that I had too much time on my hands."

Now she loves her work as dispatcher at the police department equally as well.

One of the most important parts of her job is the "Lifeline" service.

Elderly people or people who live alone call Mrs. Wallace at the police department each day before 11 a.m. to let her know they are all right.

If Mrs. Wallace doesn't hear from them, a policeman is dispatched to check on them.

When the people who participate in "Lifeline" are going to be away from home they let Mrs. Wallace know in advance. On the days when Mrs. Wallace is not working, the other dispatchers handle the "Lifeline" calls.

Anyone wishing to be placed on the "Lifeline" list can call Mrs. Wallace at the Booneville Police Department at 728-3161.

Before she came to work

at the police department, Mrs. Wallace worked at Blue Bell for 25 years. She and her husband, Omer, have been married for 41 years. They have five grandchildren.

Although she doesn't write tickets anymore, the memory of those days is never far away.

"When I go uptown I often remember what it was like being a meter maid and I think about the days when I wrote tickets," Mrs. Wallace said.

"I still see people who are illegally parking - and I feel like we still need a meter maid in Booneville. Especially when I go shopping hurriedly and I can't find a parking space."

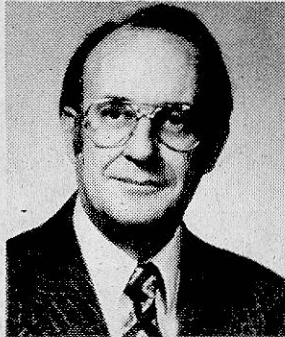

proud. It is a beautifully framed picture which depicts five generations of the Curlee family. The top left photo is John

McFerrin Curlee who was killed in the Civil War at Selma, Ala. He was her late husband's uncle. Next follow photos of her husband, her son, grandson and great-grandson -- all named John McFerrin Curlee.

The frame the picture is in was one of six found in Mrs. Curlee's attic. The frames were restored and repainted in cream and gold colors by her daughter-in-law, Beth of Aberdeen.

The Curlee family, originally from Rienzi, was one of the first families who settled in Booneville.

Mrs. Curlee and her husband attended Booneville School together and were married in 1920 following World War I. They had been married 48 years when he died in 1968.

Her husband worked at Curlee Clothing Company in Corinth. Prior to her marriage, she taught school in Tennessee. Later she taught at Tuscumbia and Wheeler.

The house they live in was built by Mrs. Curlee's father in 1903. Located on Washington Street, it is one of the most beautiful homes in town.

The 12-foot ceilings in the house set off perfectly the antique furniture and the

In addition to her church and club work, she also gives piano lessons to her great-granddaughter, Elizabeth, age 8.

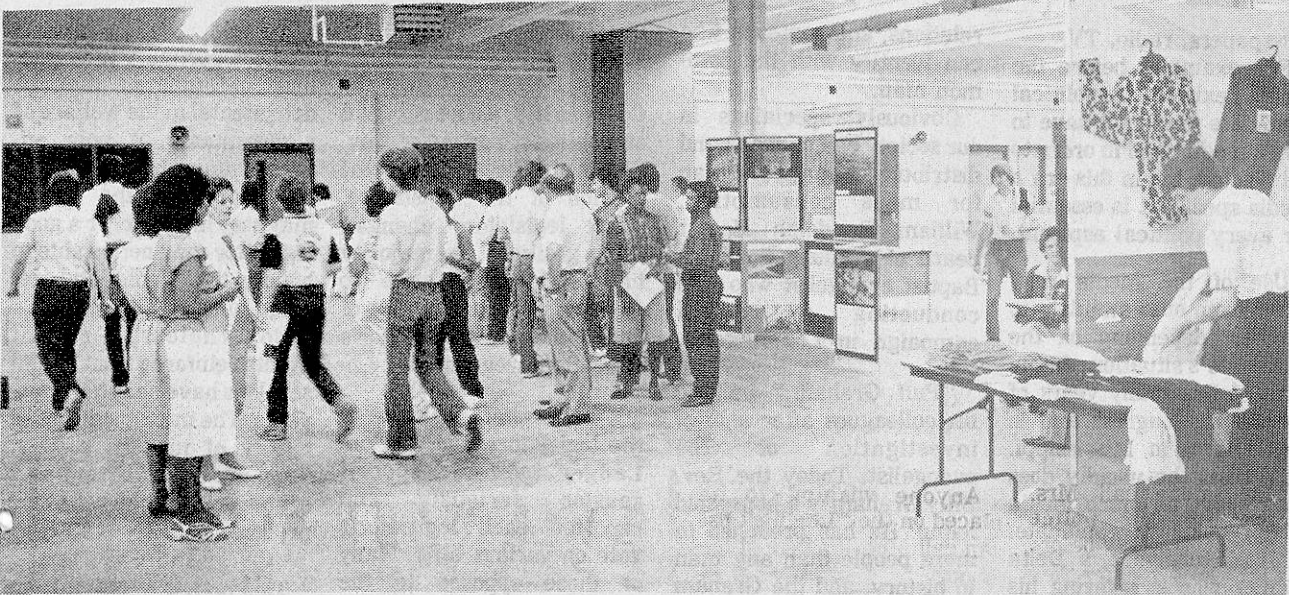
At Christmas, Mrs. Curlee presented Elizabeth in a recital held for the Curlee family. Programs were even printed for the special occasion.

Eyes On Mississippi

Turner Catledge, A Great Teacher For All Of Us

JACKSON, Miss. - Turner Catledge was more than a great newspaperman. He was a national resource. . . a journalistic treasure trove of American lore about some of the greatest, and some of the most outrageous, public figures of the 20th century.

What we should remember most here is that Mississippi, regarded by many Americans as the nation's most backward state, could send one of its own to edit the world's most powerful and literate newspaper, the New York Times.

There are no pat answers for that seeming incongruity. Perhaps the one Catledge gave me several times when we were together is just as good as any, and is typical of this man's puckish humor.

"They thought I was a Southern gentleman, and they just liked to hear me

talk, that's all," Catledge said of the Sulzbergers and Ochses, the liberal newspaper dynasty which has owned the Times.

Claude Sitton, the Times' correspondent in the South in the turbulent 50s and early 60s, and later national editor of the newspaper, agrees that Catledge's Southern charm and storytelling ingratiated him to the Yankee establishment, "but he couldn't have survived if he had not been an exceptional journalist."

Sitton, now executive editor of the Raleigh (N.C.) News & Observer, credits Catledge as "a great teacher for a lot of us. . . he could always cut through a mass of information and get right to the heart of it."

The days I loved to hear Catledge tell about were his years as a reporter, first in the South, then later in Washington, D.C., for the dawn of the New Deal. These were the times

before the explosion of Washington news coverage after World War II, when Catledge, with his rich Mississippi drawl, became confidant of the might, including Franklin D. Roosevelt himself. His recall of who said what back then was uncanny.

Catledge often milked Mississippi's own Sen. Pat Harrison, a powerful ally of FDR, for some of the best leads to come out of the Roosevelt Administration, much to the consternation of FDR.

Despite Roosevelt's ability to sometimes stretch truth, Catledge admitted to me in a lengthy interview on Mississippi ETV we did 12 years ago that he believed FDR would go down as this nation's greatest president.

Catledge and I established an unusual friendship back in 1958 when he had made plans to marry a New Orleans lady, and at the last minute discovered he did not

have a certificate of his Mississippi birth.

The further complication was no birth record existed in the State Board of Health for any Mississippians born prior to 1912. Catledge was born in 1901.

George Healy, then editor of The Times-Picayune and at the time my boss, appealed to me to see if I could help so the wedding could go on as planned three days later.

To issue a birth certificate, the registrar for the Board of Health would accept certain documents, such as school records, church records and the like. I managed to find in the State Department of Education some aged school records from Philadelphia public schools that in fact showed Turner Catledge enrolled in the years that matched his "alleged" birth.

But for other documentation, I was stumped until

somebody mentioned "Who's Who in America" as a possible reference. In a matter of minutes, a "Who's Who" was produced, Turner Catledge was found to be listed, and acceptable to the Board of Health lady. The birth certificate was issued, and I had it on the way by bus to New Orleans in time for the nuptials.

After that Catledge would always come to speak at our professional journalism society meetings in Mississippi at my request, delighting in telling that I was responsible for his "rebirth."

The fact that the distinguished executive editor of the New York Times hailed from Philadelphia, Miss., didn't cut any ice with the townspeople of Philadelphia during the tensions of 1964 when reporters from the Times came in to cover the story of the three missing civil rights workers. Sitton recalls the time

when he and another reporter were confronted by a group of toughs on the courthouse square. Remembering that an uncle of Turner Catledge ran a hardware store just across the square, Sitton and his friend headed for the store and a possible haven.

"I'm from the New York Times and I wonder if you could go out and reason with these folks," Sitton pleaded with the uncle, Joe Turner Sr.

It didn't matter if his nephew was a big shot with the Times, said the elderly man, "you have no business being here and I don't mind if you get run out of town."

Importantly, when his home town of Philadelphia had taken some positive steps to redeem its good name a few years later, Catledge sent one of his top reporters back to do a "Philadelphia Revisited" piece that ran on Page One of the Times.

Good Or Bad—Handle The Media, Stay In Office

"This whole thing about the flag makes me furious," a senior Journalism major told a professor last week during a Journalism class. "The newspapers are making it an issue."

Some black and many white students agreed with her assessment of the controversy that surrounded use of the Confederate flag as a symbol at The University.

"The way it sounds in the newspapers, this is the only racist university in the state," a black student said during another class.

For several weeks the 20th anniversary of the Meredith enrollment at Ole Miss and the refusal of a black cheerleader to wave the Rebel flag, kept Ole Miss in

the news nationally and regionally.

These events were discouraging to many who have watched the progress of race relations at The University of Mississippi. But they were great examples of the place of the mass media in society. In more recent months political candidates have dominated the news, and analysts have described and evaluated the media performance of various political candidates.

Clearly, the media influence all our lives and raise implications for modern society. Mass media scholars have noted two important points.

First, the mass media give rise to activities for the manipulation of symbols. In other words, the mass media generate activities which did not exist before

newspapers, radio, TV.

For example, before the media existed a political candidate would not have to hire a media man in order to get elected, but in this era a media specialist is essential for every political aspirant.

Use of the media may differ from one candidate to another, depending on the candidate's situation. Jamie Whitten has many years of service in Congress and is well known in Mississippi. As a result he usually does not require as much media as an unknown candidate.

Mike Sturdivant, a Delta planter who is entering his first political race, has used a heavy media campaign to present himself to Mississippians. His commercial spots have been designed to show him as man with a strong record of public service, a solid family man, a progressive in race

relations, and someone who can identify with the common man.

Obviously, specialists in our society can package and distribute an image of a man for mass consumption. William Randolph Hearst heard of a young Southern Baptist evangelist who was conducting a revival campaign in Los Angeles.

"Puff Graham," he told his colleagues after a brief investigation of the evangelist. Today the Rev. Billy Graham is a household name. He has preached to more people than any man in history, and the Graham Evangelistic Association has an organization that is well equipped to use the media for its purposes.

A second implication for modern society is that the mass media enable organizations or persons to bypass communication

channels and authority structures.

Last December when the Clarion-Ledger did saturation reporting of Gov. William Winter's special session of the legislature, many legislators changed their positions. A majority had apparently gone to Jackson with the intention of voting down the governor's education program.

Unfortunately for some of the legislators, the Clarion-Ledger took the special session seriously and reported each legislator's vote on various bills. Many of those opposed to the governor's proposal caved in.

Although they made many changes, essentially the governor got his way. The Clarion-Ledger reports had enabled him to by-pass the legislators' authority and communicate directly with

the public.

The opportunity to by-pass lines of authority may be detrimental to the welfare of a community. A poor administrator who knows how to manipulate the media may stay in power, or a good legislator may not be able to handle the media and get voted out of office.

Nonetheless, recent events reinforce what media scholars have said for many years. The mass media are a reality of modern society. They are an important part of the public policy making process.

'Mini Lobsters' Strike Mississippi's Taste Buds

Mississippi crawfish are leaving their old ditchbank haunts and invading more sophisticated habitats -- even gourmet kitchens.

They never had it so good!

And instead of just putting the pinch on an overly curious youngster's bare toe or finger, today's bigger and redder versions are getting a few good licks on a growing number of Mississippians' taste buds.

Their elevated status came in this state on the heels of the 1973 delta flood as local folks took advantage of an opportunity learned from Louisiana crawfish fanciers and began netting the healthy deep red specimens left behind as the floodwaters receded.

Almost overnight people began to sing the merits of crawfish, or crawdads, or crayfish, or mudbugs, or miniature lobsters, or

whatever.

Wheeler Timbs, a Sunflower county farmer, hadn't forgotten the post-flood crawfish experiences as he sat in a Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation-sponsored commodity conference in February 1979, and listened to a Louisiana crawfish producer tell of the industry that budded in that state about 20 years ago, and which today comprises about 20,000 acres involved in commercial crawfish production.

Shortly, Timbs and a farmer-neighbor, Joe Evans, visited LSU's Cooperative Extension Service specialists to talk crawfish and to visit ponds in that state. Other Mississippi farmers were soon to follow suit -- among them Washington county farmer Gene Allen Clements who today is president of this state's fledgling Grower's Association.

Today there are over 50 producers of the association who share information on cultural practices. At first the Mississippi growers were interested in crawfish to double-crop on their already flooded rice fields. But they found it wasn't that easy.

In fact, it is not easy at all, for crawfish are very demanding in the oxygen content of their water -- or in fact, for the whole water quality bit. If they don't like it they will crawl, walk or swim off.

Also, when you stock a shallow pond with water about 18 inches deep with between 500 and 1,000 adult crawfish per acre, you've got a bunch of eager eaters that consume no small quantity of decaying organic matter.

Most producers feed their crawfish by dumping bales of decaying rice stubble in the ponds. The feed disappears surprisingly fast.

Crawfish growers produce one crop a year in their ponds with an average production at present estimated at about 500 pounds per acre.

Both Clements and Timbs have their own processing plants and retail outlets, and

have developed local clientele that pay over a dollar a pound for the live, whole crawfish.

Clements' facility on his farm just south of Greenville is where customers can buy fresh or boiled crawfish, or if they prefer, Clements will

cater large cook-outs with a large portable cooker.

At times he finds demand running ahead of supply, but he cautions would-be crawfish growers that crawfish farming is no lark. It demands extensive labor particularly at harvest time.

The Crust Makes The Difference

When it comes to making apple pie, Lorene Pounds Eaton of New Site is one of the undisputed "best apple cooks" there is.

She is frequently asked to share her apple pie recipe. She would share it but this happens to be one recipe that is in her "head."

Her apple pie is one of the specialties she makes to carry to church suppers at the Booneville Church of Christ on Highway 45. (Her family likes to top apple pie with Cool Whip - so she keeps a big supply of Cool Whip on hand when she makes apple pies!)

One reason her pies are exceptionally good are because she makes her own crust. "I've never bought a pie crust," she says. "I'm not saying mine is better, but pies do have a different taste when the crust is homemade."

Mrs. Eaton and her husband, A.C., live behind the New Site Post Office. The couple will celebrate their 46th wedding anniversary May 15.

Eaton served as New Site Postmaster for 25 years before his retirement two years ago. He is now working at Booneville Monument Company.

The Eatons have two sons, Jimmy, a doctor in Germany, and Ricky, a psychiatrist in Portland, Tenn. They have three grandchildren.

In addition to collecting recipes and cooking, Mrs. Eaton also finds time to make beautiful quilts such as the colorful Bicentennial quilts she made for her sons

and their families. She is currently working on a cross stitch quilt.

The recipes she shares this week with **Banner-Independent** readers are ones she prepares frequently.

Poor Man's Pecan Pie is a good recipe to make for people who are unable to eat pecans. This recipe substitutes a cup of oatmeal in place of a cup of pecans.

But for those cooks determined to make the "real" pecan pie, Mrs. Eaton has a no-fail pecan pie recipe, too. She has used this same pecan pie recipe for the last 35 years - and the results are always the same - a pie that is quickly eaten by her family and friends.

When making the green bean and corn casserole, be sure to add the slivered almonds - this is the crowning touch. When served with a salad and dessert this casserole becomes a complete meal.

For a change of pace, try serving Mrs. Eaton's version of Deviled Corn instead of the usual creamed style corn.

Deviled Corn

1 Tb. butter
3 Tb. water
1 green bell pepper
1 small onion
Chop pepper, onion and simmer with butter and water for 10 minutes.
1 can cream style corn
1 egg beaten
1 tsp. sugar
1 tsp. mustard
1 Tb. flour and salt

Add last ingredients to the first and pour into a casserole dish. Top with buttered bread crumbs and bake for about 1 hour at 350 degrees.

Sweet Potato Casserole

3 cups mashed sweet potatoes
¾ stick margarine
1 cup evaporated milk

1½ cups sugar
2 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
½ tsp. nutmeg
½ tsp. cinnamon
Mix all ingredients and pour in baking dish. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes.

Topping

1 cup crushed cornflakes
½ cup nuts
½ cup light brown sugar
¾ stick margarine (melted)
Mix ingredients and spread over top of potatoes and bake an additional 15 minutes at 400 degrees.

Green Bean and Corn Casserole

Drain well 1 can French style green beans and 1 can shoe peg corn.

Mix: ½ cup sour cream
1 can cream of mushroom or chicken soup (I prefer cream of chicken)
½ cup grated cheddar cheese

¼ cup chopped onion
Stir over low heat until cheese melts. Pour over green beans and corn. Crumble 1 roll Ritz crackers in ¼ stick margarine and put on top. Bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees. Sprinkle slivered almonds over top before baking, if desired.

Squash Casserole

1 lb. fresh squash or 4 cups frozen
½ stick oleo
1 tsp. sugar
1 egg

½ cup mayonnaise
salt and pepper to taste
½ cup grated cheddar cheese

Cook squash 'untill tender and drain. Add butter and mash. Mix sugar, egg, mayonnaise, salt, pepper and cheese. Add to squash. Pour mixture into casserole dish. Top with buttered bread crumbs. (2 slices of bread cut into small cubes is amount needed.) Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until brown.

Poor Man's Pecan Pie

2/3 cup sugar
2 eggs, beaten
½ stick margarine (1 stick for richer pie)
2/3 cup oatmeal, uncooked
¼ tsp. vanilla extract
2/3 cup white Karo syrup
Mix all ingredients and pour into unbaked 9-inch pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

Pecan Pie

1¼ cups sugar
¼ cup butter or margarine
¼ cup karo syrup, either white or dark
3 eggs
1 cup chopped pecans
dash salt
1 tsp. vanilla extract
Mix sugar, syrup and butter, bring to a boil. Beat eggs, gradually add syrup mixture, beating constantly. Add nuts, salt and vanilla. Pour into unbaked pastry shell and bake 35 to 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

is very important how you structure the management of a computer system."

He said it is a must to have a professional data processing person as the system manager. He said his center in Tennessee has been successful, in part, because "we have removed politics from it."

Cotton said the brand of computer to be purchased is not important, as long as it will do what the district wants it to do.

He also said the district should buy the necessary programs when it buys the computer, and not get into the business of trying to develop its own programs.

IN OTHER business at the

meeting, Jessie Greer of the Mississippi Association of Supervisors briefed the county officials on actions taken by the Mississippi Legislature this year which will affect local governments.

He also briefed them on legislative actions they can look for in the coming few years.

Willie Stevens, also of MAS, spoke to the supervisors about the State Aid Road Program. He urged the supervisors to spend the money they are allotted through this program as quickly as possible.

"We need to let these contracts," he said.

This spending "helps the state economy," he added.

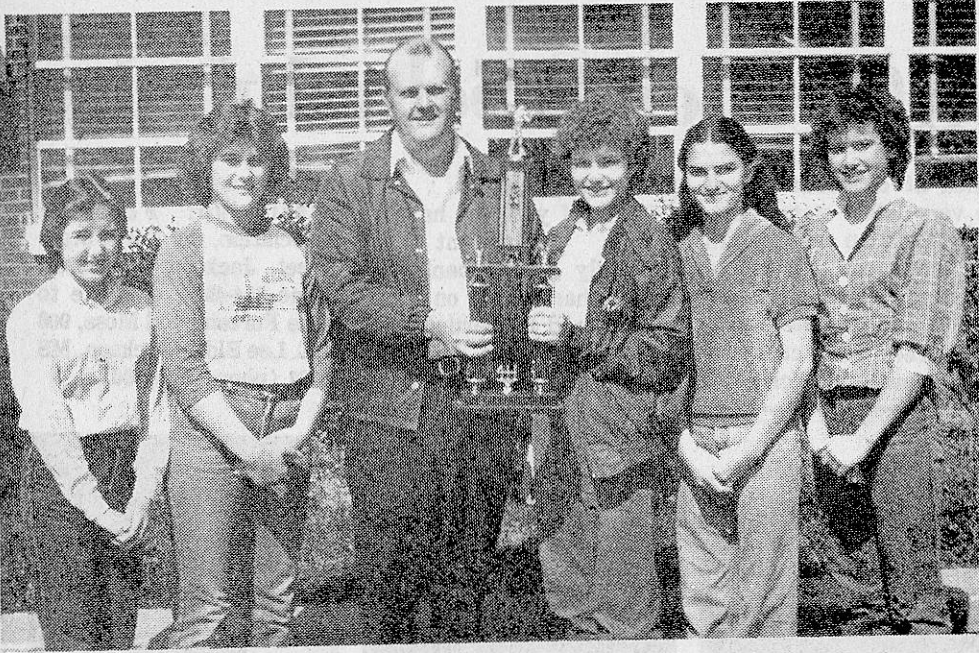

Jumper And Roden Are Named To Bank's Board Of Directors

Bancorp of Mississippi stockholders, meeting in Tupelo Tuesday night, heard senior holding company and Bank of Mississippi officers report that assets of the North Mississippi banking corporation increased 16.9 percent to a record \$482 million, with deposits increasing 18.9 percent to \$434.4 million, at year-end 1982.

More than 800 stockholders were present for the meeting, with more than 85 percent of the outstanding shares voted either in person or by proxy. Those in attendance

represented approximately one-fourth of the total stockholder base of the corporation.

Bancorp chairman and chief executive officer J.C. Whitehead set the theme for the meeting, "Banking in Deregulation."

He explained that in the past year the lifting of certain regulations by the federal government has allowed banks to be more competitive with other financial service institutions, thus creating the opportunity to return capital to North Mississippi to be invested here to stimulate the achievement of the

potential of North Mississippi.

Bank of Mississippi president Aubrey Patterson Jr. reported on the bank's achievements during 1982. He noted that at year-end net loans totaled \$256 million, a 22.5 percent increase over 1981, and a 10.4 percent increase in the capital account to \$30.4 million. Bancorp, of which Bank of Mississippi is principal subsidiary, reported earnings for the year of \$4.1 million, from which \$1.3 million in cash dividends was paid to shareholders in the form of quarterly dividends.

Bancorp vice-chairman James W. Collins reported to the stockholders on the activities of Bank of Mississippi subsidiaries Centry Credit Life Insurance Company, Mississippi Agricultural Credit Corporation and Personal Finance Corporation, which has offices in 15 North Mississippi cities.

He noted that with increased deregulation and more competition among financially related institutions, bank profit margins could be reduced, but with subsidiary profit helping to offset that difference.

He noted too that deregulation and the establishment of the one-banking holding company, subsidiary acquisition has been facilitated.

Stockholders elected 21 directors to serve for the coming year, including Douglas Jumper and E.O. Roden of Booneville. C.W. Yarber of Booneville was named director emeritus.

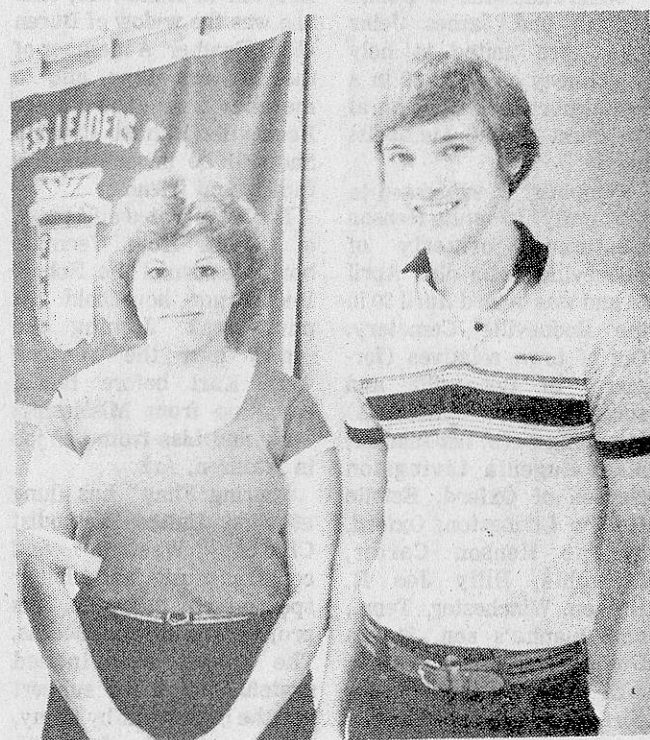

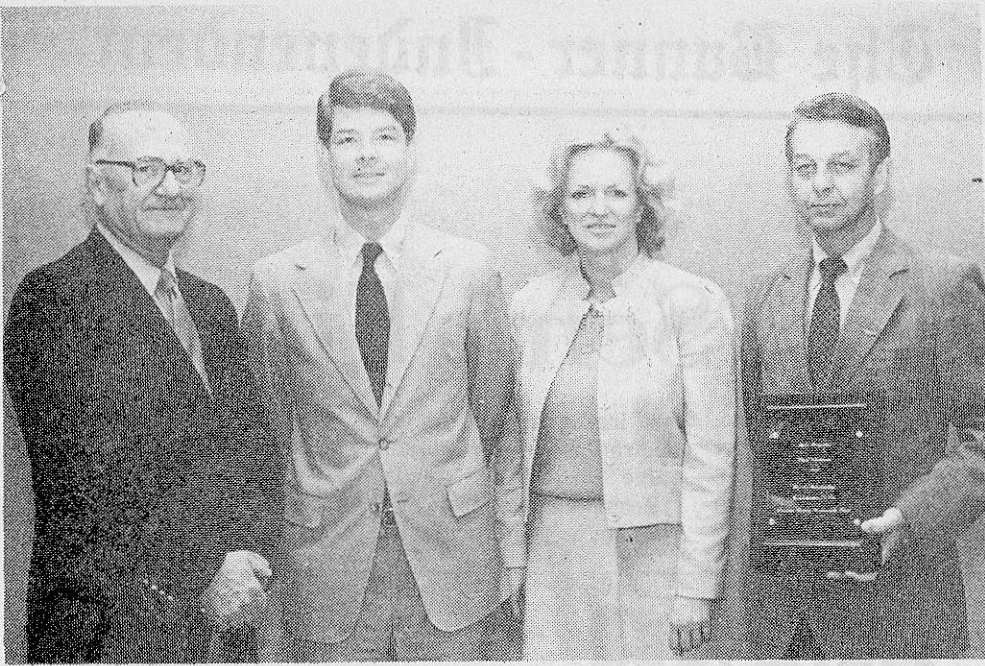

Job Opening Listings Wanted

Mississippi is joining with other states across the nation in a special appeal for more job listings so more jobless workers can be helped by the Mississippi State Employment Service (Job Service).

According to O.H. Simmons, executive director of

the Mississippi Employment Security Commission, "If employers who are hiring on their own respond to our appeal by placing their job listings with the Employment Service, the Employment Service pledges to help more job-seekers find work."

Simmons said Mississippi

employers have suffered as a result of the recession and those who are hiring today are looking for ways to cut their recruiting and training costs. The Mississippi State Employment Service can help, he says. "We will be contacting about 44,000 employers across the state by mail through the month of May," Simmons said. The letters will contain an explanation of the services offered by the Employment Service and a postage-free form for requesting more information or assistance in placing a job order.

This is the first time state Job Service agencies have ever coordinated an appeal to employers for job listings, Simmons said. The effort has been developed by the states themselves, working together through the Interstate Conference of Employment Security Agencies (ICESA). The special job order campaign is being conducted as part of the commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Wagner-Peyser Act which established the nationwide labor exchange system now known as Job Service.

to the one a week before. This time it was from first baseman Jody Presley.

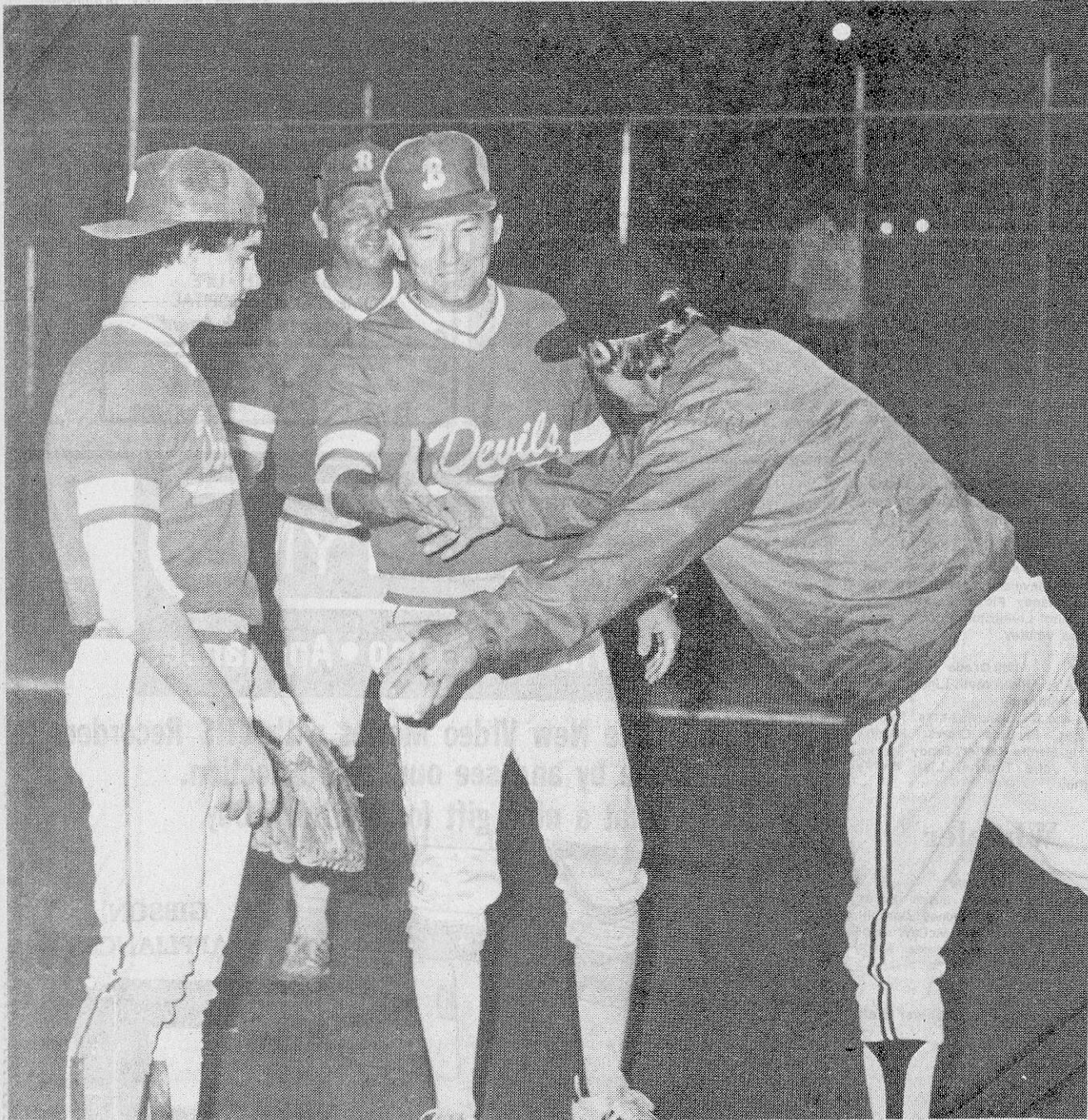
Presley stepped to the plate in the bottom of the

Booneville was down two runs but had two runners on

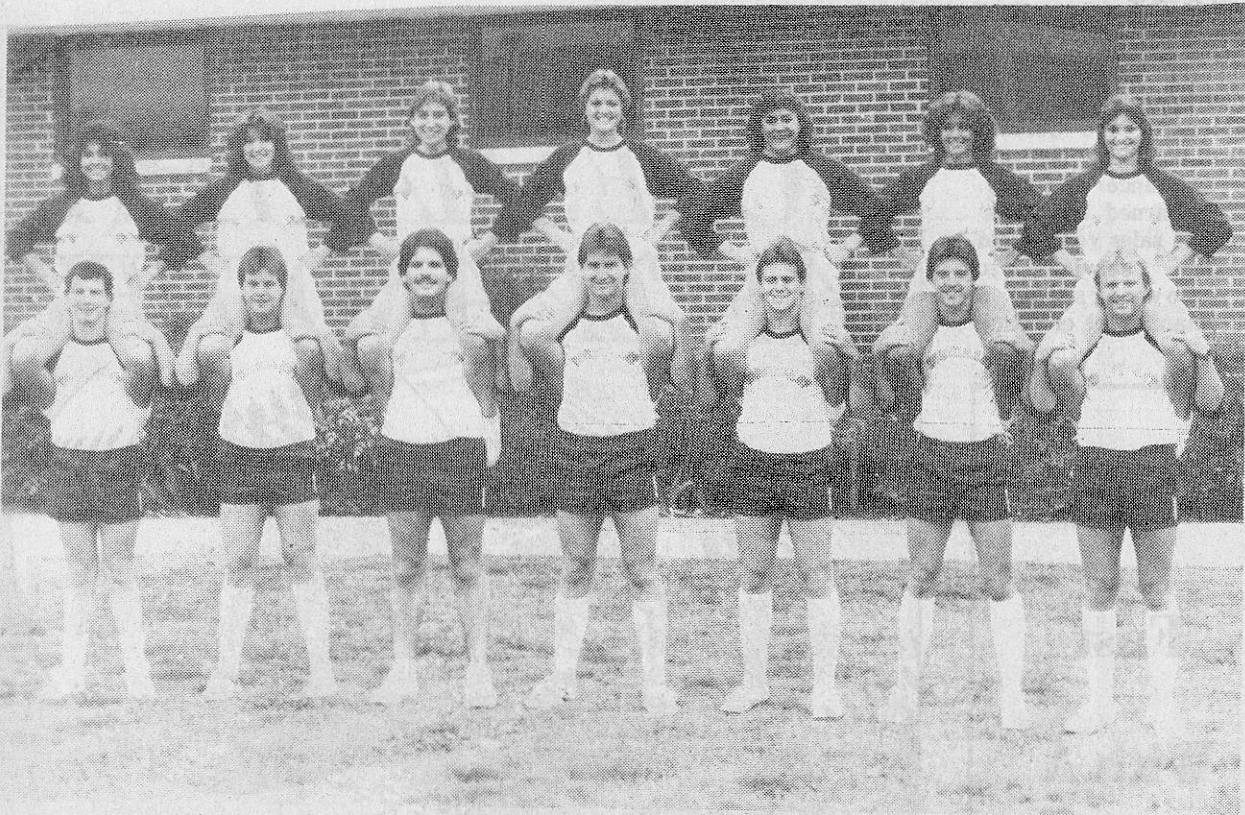
base, making Presley the potential winning run.

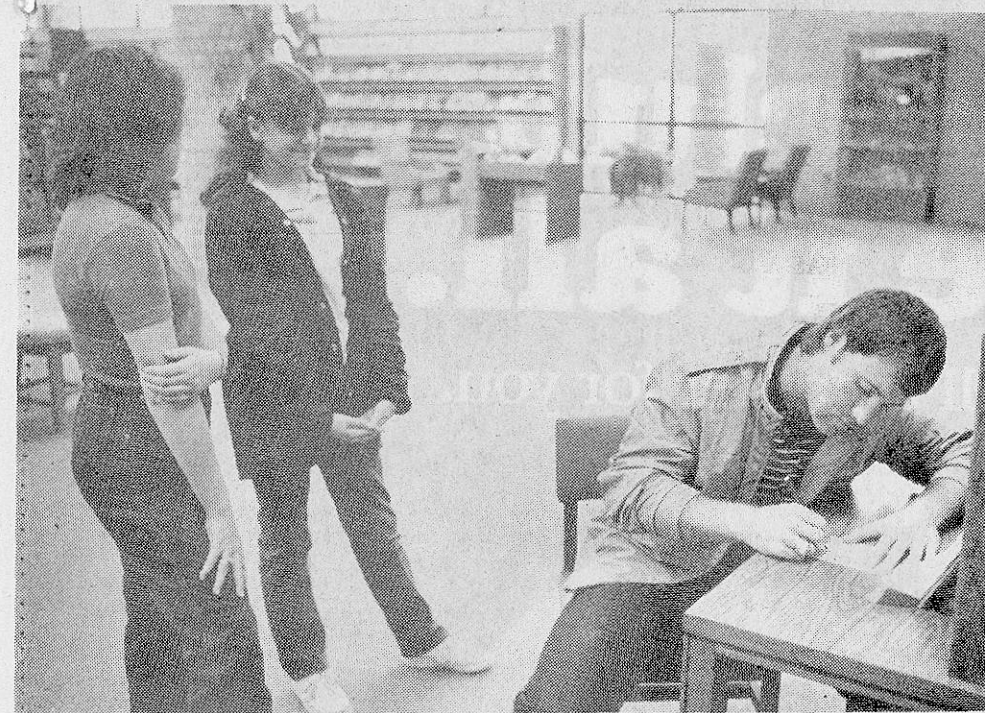

With High Unemployment Rate

Con Artists Develop New Fraud Schemes

Medical fraud and work-at-home schemes are still high on the Postal Service's list of scams con-artists work through the mails, but Postmaster Jack Wright says high unemployment among industrial workers over the last couple of years has given swindlers a new and desperate audience.

Postmaster Wright issued the warning in connection with Postal Consumer Protection Week, April 24-30.

"These dealers in disappointment continue to insist, without one shred of truth, that there are scads of good jobs available in Alaska," Wright said.

The postmaster cited an advertisement for high-paying jobs in Alaska that resulted in hundreds of unemployed persons in southern California each sending \$350 to cover the

cost of an ocean trip to Alaska.

"When they gathered at a dock in Los Angeles after sending in their money," Wright explained, "they discovered there was no ship, that their money and the swindlers were gone, and that there were no jobs."

A newspaper ad in Detroit was aimed at the hundreds of laid-off auto workers. It said six workers were needed immediately, gave them a phone number to call, where they were given a date to report for work and told to send in five dollars. "Nobody was ever called to work," Wright said, "and when this dealer in disappointment failed to respond, the Postal Service obtained a mail stop order and remittances were returned to senders."

An advertisement in a

Youngstown, Ohio, newspaper promised detailed information on jobs with drilling crews for oil companies.

"Until he signed a consent agreement with the Postal Service to stop the practice," Wright said, "the operator sent by mail only general information on how to look for a job, not any help on actual jobs."

The "Inland Rivers Barge Lines," operating out of a post office box at St. Louis,

ran ads in newspapers in four states saying that deck hands, engineers and cooks were needed for immediate employment by barge companies.

"For the \$20 they mailed to the non-existent company those who responded got a list of boat and barge companies in the U.S.," Wright said, "but they didn't get a job."

The postmaster said a postal inspector who investigated the case found

that the barge industry was in the middle of a recession bordering on depression.

"If you weren't aware just how frantic some of the unemployed were to find work, before you heard of this case," the postmaster said, "you certainly were when you learned that one of the men who responded to the barge line scam came all the way to St. Louis from Oregon in hopes of landing a job."

Jobs Bill To Provide \$129 Million In Grants For Mississippi

Mississippi will receive \$6.9 million in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds through a recently approved Emergency Jobs Funding Bill, according to Dick Molpus, executive director, Governor's Office of Federal-State programs.

The jobs bill, which was passed by Congress and signed by President Reagan March 24, will provide emergency funds, productive jobs and federal construction projects to assist states in combating high levels of unemployment.

Mississippi's total funding under the jobs bill is estimated to be \$129 million, which includes the CDBG allocation.

"The jobs bill funding could contribute substantially toward reducing the state's high unemployment," said Molpus. "The CDBG segment of this will enable Mississippi communities to continue progressing in areas such as economic development, public facilities and housing."

The special funding is in addition to the regular 1983 CDBG funding cycle of \$30.3 million. Local governments should, therefore, make separate applications for the jobs bill funds, he said.

The CDBG program provides grants to local

governments for community development activities in areas having a population of 50,000 or less. Under the jobs bill, up to 50 percent of the funds may be used for eligible public service activities.

According to Russell Davis, director of the state CDBG program, Mississippi will follow similar guidelines and application procedures used in the regular CDBG program.

The state has begun to work on the program based on preliminary guidelines and will begin accepting applications as soon as complete details are received from the Department of Housing and Urban

Development.

"It is anticipated that applications will be received for this program by July 1 and that awards will be made as soon as possible after that date," Davis said. "Local communities should remember, however, that these applications must be separate from the ones scheduled to be received by the state on June 1 for the regular fiscal 1983 funding cycle of CDBG."

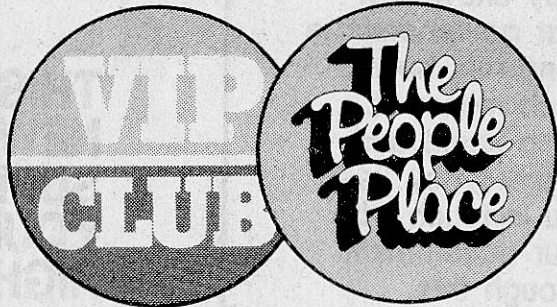
