Four Arrested In **Robbery Of Woman**

Ronnie Staggs of Booneville was charged with strong armed robbery and Jerry Lee Davis, Jimmy A. Cummings, and Patricia Eaton, all of College View Apartments, Booneville, were charged with accessory to strong armed robbery.

Frances Reese of Hatchie Street was allegedly robbed of \$108 July 6 while she was at her sister's home in Wheeler, according to Prentiss County Deputy John

Davis, Cummings and Eaton are out of jail on \$500 bond. Staggs, whose bond was set at \$5,000, remained in jail as of Wednesday morning.

Deadline Nears On Postal Site Submissions

The U.S. Postal Service is still seeking a suitable site to build a new main post office building in Booneville, according to postmaster Jack Wright.

The "preferred area" for site consideration is bounded on the north by West Chambers Street, on the east by North College Street to North Street to North Smith Street, on the south by Stanley, Lafayette and East Church Street, and on the west by Second Street (Hwy.

Site size needed is approximately 50,000 sq. ft. of land, or a lot with minimum dimensions of 200 ft. by 250 ft. Property owners are asked to submit their site offerings not later than Aug. 5 to William Deason, realty management and acquisition specialist, Field Real Estate and Buildings Office, U.S. Postal Service, P.O.

Drawer 3744, Memphis, TN 38103-0744. After a suitable site has been located and the Postal Service has accepted an offer to sell from the owner, an architect will be hired to design the building, according to a spokesman for the Southern Region office in

The proposed new postal-owned building will have approximately 7,554 sq. ft. of interior floor space.

Special Prosecutor Will Not Bring Charges In Win-Way Burglary Case

A special prosecutor hired to look into allegations against four Booneville police officers has placed the investigation back into the lap of the Prentiss County Grand Jury.

In February, New Albany city judge Talmadge D. Littlejohn was hired by the Booneville mayor and board of aldermen to look into allegations that four Booneville police officers burglarized the Win-Way store in downtown Booneville on Nov. 23, 1979.

months of investigation, Littlejohn reported to the board Tuesday that the former owner of the store, S.Q. Whitehead, has refused to sign an affidavit in the case. Consequently, Littlejohn has recommended the case be closed. "This refusal of the owner

to do this (sign an affidavit) ends the case," Littlejohn said in a written report to the city board. "It is elementary law that

a person cannot be prosecuted in a municipal court without jurisdiction," Littlejohn said. "An af-

After more than four fidavit is the instrument that breathes life into such jurisdiction. Without such, I cannot legally subpoena a witness and compel obedience thereto and I have found no other person who is willing to sign an affidavit; therefore, there is no case for me to further investigate or prosecute."

However, in his report the special prosecutor did not completely let the city government off the hook nor did he totally shut the door on the case. In fact, Littlejohn seems to hint that perhaps the Grand Jury should look into how the

"There are aspects of this inquiry that in my considered judgement should have been pursued more thoroughly at the time of, or immediately subsequent to, the alleged happening," he said. "However, for

The burglary of the store is alleged to have occurred on the night of Nov. 23, 1979, when a Booneville police officer making a routine check of the downtown area discovered the door of the Win-Way store unlocked.

After more than a year of passing the buck on the investigation between the Booneville Police Department, the Prentiss County Sheriff's Office and District Attorney John Young's office, the case was finally presented to the Prentiss County Grand Jury in

The Grand Jury reported that the evidence was insufficient to return a felony indictment. But they ordered that Young's office turn over to the city government all material pertaining to the investigation and that the city pursue possible misdemeanor charges against those involved.

It was at this point that the city hired Littlejohn as a

special prosecutor - more than 31/2 years after the burglary is alleged to have occurred.

"It is even too late now to secure a valid search warrant," Littlejohn reported this week to the city board. "Time has buried such an idea in the tomb of remoteness."

"A proper identification of the items allegedly taken cannot be made nor can a discernible value, an indispensable element of the crime of larceny, be placed upon the items even assuming that the same could be recovered and identified, which is now legally impossible."

"However, all of the foregoing conjecture fades into oblivion in the absence of an affidavit," he continues. "A municipal court does not possess the almost limitless authority of a grand jury to investigate. When the Grand Jury of Prentiss County made its report concerning this matter, this basic premise. in my opinion, was overlooked in situation."

"...It is my opinion that there is nothing left upon which a valid prosecution could be predicated in municipal court and it is my recommendation that the case be closed," Littlejohn concluded. The next Prentiss County

Grand Jury is scheduled to convene in October. It is not known if the Win-Way case will be pursued further or if the grand jury will request an investigation into how the original investigation was handled.



Electric Power Rates Should Return To 1982 Level

temporary April-September rate reduction means electric power bills may return to October 1982 levels on Oct. 2 of this year.

TVA Manager of Power Hugh Parris recently told the TVA board that with the end of the temporary rate reduction, the present revenue credit expiring and with a new revenue credit for 1984, consumer bills next October would be at the same level as they were from October 1982 through February 1983.

This means an increase in the bills some customers are

"With the expiration of the (5.8 percent) temporary rate reduction, there will be some increase in consumers' bills... back to

levels consumers were paying in October 1982," Parris said.

Following Parris' report, the TVA board took the rate matter under advisement and plans to vote on fiscal 1984 rates after a final recommendation from Parris on Aug. 24. The 1984 rates will take effect Oct. 1.

"No action is required for TVA's rates to revert to the levels established last October, before the April-to-September rate reduction went into effect," Parris In addition to the ex-

piration of the temporary rate reduction, a \$140million revenue credit from 1982 operations will also expire Sept. 30, the last day of the current fiscal year. According to TVA of-

The expiration of a approximately the same ficials, this revenue credit has held the TVA wholesale power rate 3.4 percent below the actual rate level approved by the TVA board last October for 1983.

> Without the revenue credit in effect, the wholesale rate would increase an additional 3.4 percent in October.

> However, Parris advises that an improved financial outlook for the current fiscal year is expected to enable TVA to declare a new revenue credit of \$150million to apply against 1984 revenues, effectively replacing the revenue credit due to expire.

> "We are talking about applying excess revenue from the current fiscal year as a new revenue credit during fiscal 1984," Parris

Prentiss Low On List For Northern District **Highway Construction**

Lee counties stand to receive the most in Northern District highway construction funds during the next three years, according to figures published by the State Highway Department.

These three counties are slated to receive about 64 percent of a total of almost \$140 million allocated for the district.

Over the three-year period, the Northern District is allocated \$139,709,000 for road construction. Itawamba, Marshall and Lee counties are to get \$89,535,000 of this. That leaves only \$50,174,000 to be divided among the remaining 29 counties.

Prentiss County, slated for \$2,970,000 over the next three years, is number 11 on the list in the amount of money allocated for road con-

Itawamba County gets the biggest share of the pie, with

Itawamba, Marshall and \$53,130,000 allocated for the three years. Marshall is second with \$24,875,000, and Lee County is third with \$11,530,000.

In FY 1984, Prentiss County is allocated \$970,000 for road construction. The next year, FY 1985, Prentiss but in FY 1986, Prentiss is

scheduled to get \$2 million.

Five counties in the Northern District receive no funds at all during the threeyear program. Lafayette, Leflore, Quitman, Tallahatchie, and Tunica are slated for no construction during fiscal years 1984-86.

In total funds for the threeyear program, the Northern District comes out on the short end over the other two districts in the state.

The Central District is slated for \$148,431,000; the Southern District \$144,043,000; and the Northern District, \$4139,709,000.



Eyes On Mississippi

Candidates Face Strong Challenges

JACKSON, Miss. -- A number of old hands in the Legislature are being challenged at the polls next week, in most instances by younger progressives being pushed by organizations seeking to make the Legislature more responsive to educational reform.

Several upsets could be in the making, if the mood for change on the legislative front proves to be as widespread as some political observers believe.

In any case, quite a few lawmakers unaccustomed to challenge on the homefront are at least finding out their constituencies may have different ideas.

The legislative race most closely watched is the one in House District 53, composed of a part of Warren county, along with Issaquena and

Sharkey counties. Here is where House Speaker C.B. "Buddie" Newman, after 36 years in the Legislature, is facing stiff competition.

Newman's opponent is 36year-old Phyllis Farragut, a Vicksburg CPA-businesswoman and mother of two, making her maiden voyage as a political candidate against the 61-year-old Newman,

Farragut, who is contending that Newman is out of touch with the times and with his constituency, is waging a highly aggressive campaign that indicates she will get a strong vote in the City of Vicksburg, which has one-half of the districts

Unofficially, she has the NAACP, although Newman is making an all-out effort to get black votes, a complete reversal of his attitude in the 1960's when he was one of Ross Barnett's leading segregation advisors.

As an example of his newfound sympathy for black causes, the other day when NAACP national director Benjamin Hooks spoke in Vicksburg. Newman was on hand and came forward to match Hooks' donation of \$20 to the NAACP chapter's treasury.

So, incidentally, did Sen. Ellis Bodron, of Vicksburg, considered by most as the second most powerful figure in the Mississippi Legislature, next to Newman, because of his tight-fisted control of the Senate Finance Committee.

Bodron also faces opposition, but not as tough as and Bodron, however, have been forced to go into rather heavy media campaings, defending their records at great length and reciting what they have done for the

Both Mrs. Farragut and Ken Harper, Bodron's opponent, are being backed by Mississippi First Inc., a political action group formed by a number of young attorneys and young professionals from around the state following the defeat of Gov. William Winter's kindergarten and educational reforms in the 1982 legislative session.

Significantly, the Mississippi Association of Educators, which had been expected to target Newman and Bodron, has shied away from endorsing their op-

Rep. Joe Blount of Union, a former Ole Miss football star and one of Newman's is reportedly in real trouble for re-election in his Newton County district because of his support for House Bill 4. the kindergarten and school reform bill enacted last December.

Blount is being opposed by an old antagonist, Raymond Comans, whom he had unseated eight years ago. Besides kindergartens, school consolidation is being made a big issue in the campaign, despite the fact consolidation is a long way off under House Bill 4.

In Lauderdale County, staunch segregationist Rep. Tommy Horne of Meridian, a consistent foe of public education, is facing a tough

battle for re-election from Rick Fortenberry, a young attorney in Meridian who formerly was a highly regarded legislative staffer for the State Senate. Horne, ironically is backed by the AFL-CIO.

Another Newman

lieutenant, Rep. Will Green

Poindexter of Inverness, could become an upset victim at the hands of G. Clark Johnson, and Indianola alderman, say knowledgable local political observers. In Jackson, two of

Newman's staunch supporters, Rep. Emmett Owens and Rep. "Farmer Jim" Neal, both face stiff opposition for re-election because of their opposition to the education program. ut the irony twist is that the MAE has given Neal its endorsement, and the AFL-CIO has endorsed Owens.

What is described as a "real shoot-out" in the Delta is a campaign to unseat controversial Sen. Robert Crook of Ruleville, who had led the opposition to the Winter Administration's prison reform package aimed at reducing the growth of the encarcerated population, and who nearly blocked decentralization of prison facilities.

Crook, a veteran of 20 years in the Legislature, during which time he has maintained a fulltime home and raised his family in Jackson, has the hardest campaign of his career. He is opposed by Turner Arant, member of a well-known Delta farming family and: Elijah Wilson, head of the Coahoma County NAACP.

The Crook district is 63 percent black and while Wilson is expected to get a good black vote, local observers see a runoff between Crook and Arant, which could be determined on "just which one they like better."

Foes of Crook outside the district include those who regard him a major obstructionist to solving the state's prison overcrowding and using his longtime Fees and Salaries Committee chairmanship as a weapon over the heads of state agencies.

nowever, claiming that utility interests are pouring in money and other help for Arant because of his (Crook's) efforts to toughen the utility regulatory act. Arant has the backing of IMPAC, a business oriented political action group based in Jackson. Another hot Senate race is

down in the Marion-Lamar-Walthall-Pike District 40. where Sen. Emerson Stringer of Columbia, the leader of the "country caucus" and staunch procreationist has a tough race with Dwight Wesley, a rural voluntary fire department and civic leader from Marion County.







Pickles Keeps Her Out Of Pickle

It's that time of the summer - cucumbers are ripe and abundantly so.

To keep from getting in a . pickle with all those fresh, green cucumbers on hand make pickles!

That's exactly what Ruby Michael of Pisgah does. Her husband of 57 years, Nolen, has an acre garden, so she has plenty of cucumbers for making pickles.

Her favorite pickle recipe is the one for "Grace Church Pickles." In fact, it's the only pickle recipe she uses.

"There's no use to make any other kind of pickles," Miss Ruby says. "This is the only kind the family eats."

"These pickles are crisp and especially tasty. They're neither sweet nor sour and yet those are the two elements in making them," she says.

The main thing to remember when making pickles is to start with a good quality cucumber, she said. And if you don't have a churn to put the pickles in, put them in a plastic bucket that's what Miss Ruby

does. Her pickles are delicious, too. So much so in fact, that she only has one jar of pickles left from the several batches she made last summer.

She shares the pickles she makes with friends and her children, Forrest Michael of Booneville, Elizabeth Curlee of Aberdeen, Gwen Cleghorn of Atlanta, and Iris Easterling of Hattiesburg.

Miss Ruby's father was the late B.T. Moore who served as supervisor in the 2nd district of Prentiss County for 20 years.

Mrs. Michael once taught school at Jumpertown and Pisgah. Her pupils called her "Miss Ruby" and that is still how she is known to most people - including her husband.

Miss Ruby likes to make pickles because it's a simple procedure. "It's one of the easiest things to do because you don't get hot making pickles like canning anything else."

And besides, crunchy pickles are a delicious addition to practically any **Grace Church Pickles**



ASCS Report.

A flood May 18 and 19 caused severe damage in Prentiss County. Farms suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under Emergency Conservation Program "ECP" administered by the County Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service "ASCS" if the damage:

Will be so costly to grain program. rehabilitate that federal assistance is or will be required to return the land to productive agricultural use; unusual and is not the type that would recur frequently; materially effects the productive capacity of the farmland; if not treated will impair or endanger the land.

A farmer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost sharing not to exceed 64 percent of the total eligible cost of performing the following types measures:

Removing debris from farmland; grading, shaping or releveling severly damaged farmland; or structures and other similiar installations.

Farmers who feel the damage is sufficiently 20013. severe and their capabilities are such that assistance is necessary to correct the problem should contact the ASCS office and request assistance by not later than Aug. 26, the deadline for filing requests.

Practices should not be started until an on site in-

County Committee or its representative. The County Committee will review this inspection when considering the request for cost share assistance.

ASCS invites comments on whether next year's program should contain a voluntary acreage reduction percentage, payment-inkind, set-aside or land diversion provisions. The written remarks should include the recommended extent of requirements.

Farmers may also comment on whether to allow haying and grazing of conservation use acreage, if an acreage reduction, setaside or payment-in-kind is necessary.

> The penalty consists of immediate repayment of the loan, plus interest, plus early redemption, if applicable, denial or further loans and possible investigation by the Office of the Inspector General.

Some farmers will use their farm-stored loans to satisfy payment-in-kind requirements. If farmers move the grain without permission they will be assessed liquidated damages according to the terms of the PIK contract as well as the regular penalty for unauthorized removal of farm-stored grain.

The ASCS price support loan program provides farmers with operating cash while they bargain or hold their grain for future sales. Variable interest rates are charged and farmers may repay the money before the nine-month maturity date.

Program regulations require that farmers notify ASCS if they intend to sell the grain, or if the grain is out of condition and needs to be moved. If the grain is to be used for feed, the loan must be repaid before it is removed from the storage

Farmers are fully responsible for any loss in the quantity, or quality of farm-stored grain under

4-H Offers Judging Opportunities

depends to a great degree on the ability to make the right decision at the right time. The opportunities offered in 4-H Judging Activities, whether in Livestock, Dairy, Poultry, Horse or Land Judging, are important for a number of reasons. First, young people are taught to make decisions based on sound reasons. Judging forces people to make choices by practice, young people find that judging trains the mind to use sound reasoning.

Judging also teaches people to study beef cattle, horses, soil profiles, etc., so that they become familiar with each animal or soil profile placed in a class. By looking at strong points and weak points of individual animals, we form a habit of seeing these same problems. There is no substitute for a mind trained to see all sides of a problem.

An able judge is always objective. The mind should be free of prejudice. The facts are the only important things to be considered. An honest appraisal of the basic differences between animals and a decision based on sound reasons is the heart of all judging experiences.

Activities : trains 4-H'ers to evaluate traits of economic importance and, consequently, make sound logical decisions; trains 4-H'ers to learn to accurately describe and compare

animals, land sites, etc., Requires them to establish and defend their conclusions; promotes team spirit and stimulates in-

terest in livestock, horses,





five years." Initial projects calls for the employment of approximately 50 people when the plant operation begins in September. By the end of the year, Park Place plans to employ about 75 people, and by the end of 1984, between 100-125.

The company projects a business of \$7 million in 1984, increasing to \$25 million over the next five years. Before they begin production in September they expect to have their product line sold out through

November. other members of the team are not in the business just for the money.

"I'm tired of people saying Booneville hasn't got this or hasn't got that," he Booneville and for me, killing two birds with one stone."

"Our goal," Etheridge said, "is to build the company up to the capacity of this plant, and then add on some more. It will be good for everybody."

The existence of a local "good, trained labor force makes it exciting for us," Green said. 'We think we have the

"People in Prentiss County are fine people when you keep them informed and involved," Etheridge said.

Presently the company has about 400 job applicants on file. About 40-50 of those will be hired when the plant begins production in September. Those who have already applied for positions at the firm need not reapply since these applications are kept on file, the management team said.





Soil Conservation

News

Farmers in Prentiss County saved over 36,000 tons of soil this spring through the use of no-till farming. Farmers saved an average of 20 tons of soil per acre on 1800 acres planted to no-till soybeans, corn, and sorghum.

No-till farming is still relatively new in Prentiss County. The first no-till planting in the county was done back in 1973 when 25 acres of no-till soybeans was planted by Willie Hatfield. No-till has proven to be such a success and has really grown over the past three

Approximately 1,800 acres of no-till crops were planted in the county this spring by 20 farmers. This figure is expected to double next year, especially since the county now has a no-till drill that farmers can rent at a cost of \$2 an acre. The drill will also be available this fall for the planting of wheat behind beans and seeding of grasses and legumes in pastures.

Now is the time to be planning for a no-till cropping system (double cropped wheat and soybeans) for the 1983-84 cropping season. Proper fertility is essential and soil tests should be taken late this summer or fall prior to soybean harvest. Unless a rush order is requested, expect at least two weeks for test results to return.

The Extension soil testing address is: P.O. Box 5405, Mississippi State, Mississippi 39762. For those considering no-till beans after wheat in 1984, it would anvantageous to incorporate the soybean fertility needs while incorporating wheat fertilizer, but only where seedbeds are prepared for wheat.

For economic success with a double cropping system, proper selection of wheat varieties is a must. An early maturing variety is almost a necessity. A week saved on the planting of

soybeans can make the difference in a profit or a loss. Some of the early maturing wheat varieties that have good disease resistance and produce well in north Mississippi are: Coker 762, Southern Bell and

Double Crop. Now is also a good time to check with your local ASCS office on the avalibility of cost share programs for your no-till system. The SL-15 practice is available at present. With this practice the government will pay 65 percent of all chemical, planting and spraying cost to \$26 per acre.





PROFESSIONALISM FOR A CHANGE

The Justice Court System will be completely different next year. Rather than having five Justice Court Judges, Prentiss County will have only two Justice Court Judges. There will be one Judge elected from the Southern District, and one Judge elected from the Northern District. The Southern District is composed of the 3rd, 4th, and Southern half of the 1st Supervisory Districts. The new Judges will

have more authority and county-wide jurisdiction. They will hear cases which originate in both the Northern and Southern Districts. There will be a Justice Court Clerk with an office at the Courthouse with Deputy Clerks, if necessary, all of whom will be working under the direction and supervision of the Justice Court Judges. When a case is filed, either Civil or Criminal, the case will be filed with the Justice Court Clerk who will assign the case to one of the Judges on a rotating basis. This new system will be very much like our Circuit and

Chancery Court systems. Justice Court Judges yield greater authority than most people realize. A Justice Court Judge has the authority to sentence a person to serve up to one year in the County Jail; levy a fine up to \$1,000.00; issue Search Warrants; make complete disposition of misdemeanor cases and Civil cases involving up to \$1,000.00; hold preliminary hearings in felony cases and set the amount of Appearance Bonds for felons in addition to other responsibilities.

The changes made in the office of Justice Court Judge make it imperative that we elect someone who has a judicial background and understands how our Court system works. Mike Bolen, an attorney, is qualified to serve in this office. Mike Bolen is a native of Prentiss County and a 1970 graduate of Baldwyn High School. Bolen is the son of the late

Mrs. Merle Bolen and the grandson of Johnny Copeland. Bolen attended The Northeast Mississippi Junior College for two years and transferred to University Mississippi, where he received a Bachelors of Public Administration degree in Law Enforcement. Bolen was awarded his law degree from Mississippi College School of Law in 1978. Bolen is a member of the law firm of Gifford, Moore & Bolen and serves as Prosecuting Attorney for the City of Booneville.

SOYBEAN CYST **NEMATODE CAN BE** A BIG PROBLEM

What the soybean cyst nematode lacks in size, it makes up for in numbers and ability to reduce soybean yields.

The miscroscopic roundworm feeds on the root systems of soybean plants and reduces the plant's capacity to absorb water and nutrients. High cyst nematode populations have reduced yields in individual fields by as much as 75 percent. Compared to surrounding states, Mississippi's losses "\$3,500.00" were much lower bacause of acceptance of MCES's nematode control

SYMPTOMS

You should suspect SCN infestations whenever you see randomly spaced circular areas of stunted and yellow soybeans in the field. Affected plants may wilt even with adequate soil moisture, and severely infected plants may die. Heavy infection results in root distortion and smaller than normal root systems. The roots of such plants are generally dark and discolored, and the number of Rhizobium nodules is reduced. Careful removal and examination of the root system reveals the white to yellow female nematodes and brown cysts clinging to the roots.

These are somewhat smaller than the head of a pin and are lemon-shaped. Rhizobium nodules are occasionally mistaken for the white-female stage of the cyst nematode; however, these nodules are loosely attached to the roots and are larger than cysts, which are usually embedded in the root surface.

Since the symptoms of SCN damage to soybean plants are not easy to distinguish from damage resulting from other causes such as lightning, herbicides, drought, low ferdrainage, and soil inhabiting insects, you should collect soil samples from fields positive diagnosis.

HOST RANGE

The host range is limited mostly to legumes. Some of the common hosts include annual and common lespedeza, common and hairy vetch, snap beans, and common garden beans. Some weed hosts are hemp sesbania (coffee weed), common mullein, and low hop clover.

LIFE CYCLE

The ability of the SCN to produce high populations in one growing season is one of the factors which make the nematode so damaging and difficult to control. The nematode completes its life cycle in 25 to 30 days, and each female produces 200 to 500 eggs. Some of the eggs may hatch immediately and begin a new cycle. In Mississippi the nematode may complete as many as three cycles in a growing season. Three forms are involved in the life cycle: egg, larva, and adult.

The larva must find a susceptible host plant and begin to feed before the nematode can reproduce. As the worm-like larva feeds, it becomes a white to yellow, lemon-shaped female still attached to the root. When the female dies, her body becomes a tough, lemonshaped, brown "cyst,"

where you suspect cyst which protects the eggs for nematode infestations and several years. The ability to have them analyzed for a survive pesticides, dryness, and starvation for many years is the second factor which makes this nematode difficult to control.

CONTROL

No method of control eliminates the nematode from the soil. Suggested control methods reduce SCN population to allow profitable production with little or no damage. Crop rotation, resistant varieties, and nematicides are methods suggested for nematode control. In addition, some cultural practices may increase

Deep chiseling or subsoiling to break hardpans to allow for maximum root penetration will generally increase yields in the presence of nematodes. In soils low in fertility, satisfying soil fertility needs reduces yield losses from nematodes where low to medium populations are present. However, chiseling, sub-soiling, and increasing soil fertility will not control the nematode. You should control measures in addition to the cultural





If these dates are approved by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Washington, Mississippi hunters will have 70 days of dove hunting during the upcoming fall and winter hunting period.
