Hans 'Second To None' At Checkers



Clifton Hans At The Checkerboard

When it comes to playing checkers, 74-year-old Clifton Hans of the Carolina community is second to no one.

Anyone traveling on Highway 30 in the Carolina community can usually find Hans and one of his neighbors or friends sitting on the front lawn playing checkers.

Hans said he has been playing checkers for as long as he can remember. "I started playing as soon as I could walk. Now, it's about the only thing that I can do," he

Though Hans is originally from Hardaman County, Tenn., he has lived in Prentiss County for almost

Asked why he spends so m time hunched over a checkerboard, Hans said, "because the young people don't have time to talk to the old people. That leaves us nothing to do except play checkers."

Not wanting to sit around wasting

time like most people do, Hans said he prefers to play checkers. But he insists that he plays strictly for the enjoyment and nothing else. I never have played for money

and I never will. That is gambling and the Bible teaches against gambling," he said.

But life hasn't always been a

game of checkers for Hans. He said he experienced hard times while he was bringing up his family.

"I used to do whatever I could to make money for my family. And I can remember working for, 50 cents a day. Mainly, I did a lot of farming to raise our money," he

The Roosevelt era is one that Hans said he would especially like to forget because he said life was so bad then that his family ate rabbit meat at almost every meal.

"We had to go catch rabbits and cook them," he said. "If we didn't catch any rabbits, then we wouldn't have anything to eat.". According to Hans, you could

purchase gas for less than ten cents a gallon 40 years ago. However, not many people had cars to drive. Hans now lives with three of his

children. Two others have married and moved away. His wife passed away seven years ago. "All of the elder people need something to do once they get my

age," he said. "Since I have this arthritis in my legs, watching television and playing checkers is about all I can do." Hans tried to join the Army when

he was a young man, but he was rejected because of his bad leg. "I wish I could have got into the

MHP Says Shooting Was An Accident

An investigation into the shooting death of a Booneville man who was shot by a Tippah County Deputy shows that the shooting was accidential, according to Walter Tucker, chief investigator with the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Tucker said Tuesday that the investigation supported the deputy's claim that he did not intend to shoot the man.

The shooting occurred when Billy Dewayne Eaton, 25, of Booneville, and another man fled from Tippah County Deputies, Roger Bowen and James M. Moore, around 12:30 a.m. May 21, after the deputies told them to halt.

The deputies were staking out a wooded area three miles west of Jumpertown where a partially disassembled pickup had been found. The pickup has been stolen in Baldwyn.

Eaton and another subject drove up to the site and began loading the engine into another pickup.

After the deputies identified themselves and told them they were under arrest the men started running and Deputy Bowen fired one warning shot from his 12-gauge

More Prentiss Countians Employed

The number of Prentiss County residents employed continued to climb at mid-April, according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment

Approximately 10,620 county residents were employed compared to 10,470 one month ago and 10,120 one year ago. The number unemployed continued to decline to reach 940 individuals, or 8.1 percent of the civilian labor force.

This is 80 less than the estimate for March and 780 below the estimate for April, one year ago.

The civilian labor force, which is a combination of employed and unemployed, also edged up a midmonth to 11,560, 70 above the March figure, but 280 below the figure for April, 1983.

Manufacturing employment in the county at 3,000 experienced only a minimal drop from last month but climbed 190 over the estimate for one year ago. A total of 4,020 individuals were employed in nonmanufacturing jobs in the county, 40 above the March estimate and

210 above the April, 1983, estimate. Smith also noted that the civilian labor force for the four-county area

of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo totaled 45,110 at mid-April. This represents a slight upward trend of 20 from last month, but a significant loss of 2,010 from the estimate of one year ago.

There were 40,010 workers employed at mid-April, up 440 from March and 1,420 above the estimate for April, 1983. All categories, with the exception of Agriculture, experienced increases over the month and year.

The number of area residents unemployed at mid-month fell to 5,100 compared to 5,520 in March and 8,530 in April, one year ago.

The unemployment rate for the four-county area was estimated to be 11.3 percent of the civilian labor force. This rate compared to 12.2 percent in March and 18.1 percent in April, 1983.

A total of 15,650 persons were employed in manufacturing jobs in the area at mid-April. This shows a

decrease of 100 from the previous estimate; however, a significant rise of 1,970 was experienced from the estimate reported one year ago.

This large increase from one year ago was noted in several groups. The number of persons employed in nonmanufacturing jobs was estimated to be 16,170 at mid-April, up by 120 from last month but down 270 below the estimate for one year ago with Construction experiencing the largest decrease from one year

'Landmark Legislation' Passed

Rep. McCoy Rates Legislative Session

"Despite its slow start, the 1984 Legislative Session produced some landmark legislation that will affect the government of Mississippi and our citizens for years to come," said District 3 Rep. Billy McCoy.

In regard to the criticism about that slow start, Rep. McCoy said, "I feel that some of the criticism is justified. But, probably, if you look back over the history of the state, the first year in any administration is a slow one."

He said some legislation had been enacted that should speed things up "a week or two," but the proposed changes in boards and commissions had helped to hold up the session's start by making the legislators "uncertain" about how they should handle the fiscal situation. "These things were all being

considered diligently each day, even though it may have looked to the Press and others like we weren't working. But I can assure you many of us were. There was never a day that we were all just sitting around," Rep. McCoy said.

"On a personal note, I was deeply honored to have been appointed vice-chairman of the committee on transportation," he said, explaining that the Transportation Committee assignment, along with assignments to the Appropriations, Education and Elections Committees "gave me valuable opportunities to represent the citizens of Prentiss and Alcorn Counties to their best advantage."

Rep. McCoy said his committee assignments demanded a great deal

of his time during the Legislative Session. As vice-chairman, he was required to review every bill referred to the transportation committee and make recommendations to the committee chairman. He said the Appropriations

Committee met every day during the session. "I usually arrived between 7:30 and 8 a.m. and didn't leave until after 6 p.m., and sometimes as late as 9 or 10 p.m.," he said.

Rep. McCoy said he had learned more during the recent Legislative Session than during any other session during the five years he has been in office. "This was due to my added responsibilities," he said.

State Survey Outlines Salaries For 400 Jobs

The Mississippi Employment Security Commission has completed its 1983 Salary Survey which presents salary information for almost 400 occupations across the state.

In occupations common to all responding industries, the survey shows that industrial engineers are the highest paid employees, earning an average of \$12.01 per hour. They are followed by data processing systems analysts, earning \$10.33 per hour, and accountants, earning \$9.35 per hour.

The first two occupations have

been at the top of the scale for the past three years.

The lowest paid workers, employed in occupations common to all industries, are janitors, who earn an average of \$4.33 per hour. Telephone operators come next, earning an average of \$4.47 per hour, followed by file clerks and receptionists, earning an average of \$4.54 and \$4.65 respectively.

These four occupations were also the lowest-paid workers in both the 1980 and 1982 surveys.

The survey not only outlines salaries for occupations common to all industries in the state, but it also gives salary figures for occupations peculiar to each of 34 different industry groups.

The listings for occupations peculiar to a specific industry show that petroleum engineers earn an average of \$22.24 per hour, placing them at the top of the ladder salarywise for all jobs included in the survey.

Next on the ladder were geologists, earning \$19.46 per hour. These are followed by credit analysts, earning \$17.30 per hour, and lease buyers, earning \$17.14 per

According to the list of occupations peculiar to a specific industry, waiters and waitresses are at the opposite end of the salary scale, earning an average of \$2.34 per our, excluding their income

Also among the lowest paid

workers in the state are bellhops, who earn an average of \$3.23 per hour, excluding tips; laundry folders, who earn an average of \$3.40 per hour; and cannery workers, who earn an average of \$3.54 per hour.

The data presented in the report were compiled on a statewide basis from January to May of 1983. Employers were asked to complete forms detailing the number of their employees working in each occupation, the average work week of these employees, and the salary received by the employees.

Brief descriptions of the occupations listed were included on the survey forms to aid employers in determining if the selected occupations listed were similar to positions in their firms. In addition to giving average salary figures, the survey also shows salary ranges for each occupation.

The 1983 Mississippi Employment Security Commission Salary Survey has been released for use by chambers of commerce, industrial development groups, employers and personnel managers.







and Senate during the 1984 Session.
"Of the 1,326 bills introduced only
587 passed both houses," he said,
explaining that many of those were
"routine appropriations and local
and private bills."

In regard to the controversy over the Medicaid Appropriation, Rep. McCoy said it "has doubled since I went to the Legislature four years ago. The State Legislature has not cut the Medicaid Appropriation. The cutback in federal funds, plus the increased cost of medical needs, plus the increase in the number of recipients have put the pressure on the state for the tremendous increases that we have experienced," he said.

He admitted that "some agencies and departments will be underfunded for the coming fiscal year," but said, "the Appropriations Committee did its best to spread the anticipated money available to each agency, based on that agency's need and the priority of its service to the citizens."

Rep. McCoy pointed out that "Mississippi does not spend more than it receives, as does the federal government. To have additional money there must be an upturn in the general economy or taxes must be increased," he said.

He said the reason for un-

He said the reason for underfunding was a disagreement between the House and the Senate on whether additional taxes were actually needed. "The two bodies could not agree on the tax proposals. Thus, the state, in my opinion, will operate with less than needed money."

McCoy said he feels the Separation of Powers Act definitely strengthens the position of the governor in the state by giving him control of the budget. "Up until now, the money has been appropriated by the Legislature and controlled by the Legislature," he

Asked if the act was the first step toward letting the governor succeed himself, McCoy said, "I think that there is a strong possibility that it will not be too long before such a constitutional change will be presented to the voters.

"It may not be next year, o the year after next. But I believe it's an idea whose time has come, he said.

Rep. McCoy said other bills he considers to be "landmark legislation" including the ones eliminating dual registration, improving the public employees' retirement system, dealing with ethics of public officials, bringing a \$57,000 Summer Youth Training Program to the Prentiss County and Booneville school systems, changing the method of inflicting the death penalty from the gas chamber to lethal injection, dealing with sovereign immunity and increasing Homestead Exemption to \$7,500.

"Sometimes the killing of a bill is just as important as the passage of another," Rep. McCoy said. "The Highway Committee receives many bills that deal with traffic laws and vehicle regulation. And we fail to consider many bills favorably each year that we feel unduly regulate our citizens.

"We mustn't forget the old adage that the least government is the best government," he said.





Eyes On Mississippi

'Boys Of Spring' Symbol Of Political Change

JACKSON, Miss. - Perhaps the most tangible proof that this state is changing politically are the "boys' state" elected officials Mississippi now has in three of its top posts in state government.

For the first time in memory, if not in history, three major holders of statewide offices are in their 30s -State Treasurer Bill Cole, State Auditor Ray Mabus and Secretary of State Dick Molpus.

Cole is the "old man" of the group . . he will turn 36 in June. Mabus will be 36 late in the year, and Molpus is still 34.

All three came out of the William Winter administration and were part of the "boys of spring," the starryeyed young men in button-down

collars who helped build Winter's version of Camelot. They were thought by many to be politically naive and no match for the legislative dinosaurs that control the turf around Capitol Hill.

In many ways they weren't, because much of the Winter administration was marked by disappointments at the hands of the Legislature. The crowning achievement of the Winter years - the enactment of the Education Reform Act -- finally erased much of the agony and frustration.

Cole had been given the rare political break of filling out the term of Treasurer by appointment from Winter, which made his election to a full term automatic. Without that boost into statewide office, the mildmannered, self-effacing Cole would likely have never entered the

political arena.

In a relatively short career in state office, Cole has become respected around state government as a solid exponent of putting the state's financial management on a consistent, long-range basis in contrast with the quick fixes of the past...

Mabus scored the biggest upset of the political year of 1983 by winning the Auditor's job over an entrenched political establishment.

Molpus proved to be a surprising vote-getter in a rough-and-tumble race for Secretary of State as a neophyte among a number of seasoned politicians.

The three of them - Cole, Mabus and Molpus - represent a brighter, more sophisticated, eager new breed of public figure which may be arising

Certainly, in contrast with most of

those who have held cabinet level posts in Mississippi's state government over the past three decades or so, they bring a strikingly fresh approach to some very stodgy

In years past, the state cabinet officials have been less than innovative, and have operated as though they lived in a world apart from the chief executive or other departments of state government.

The Legislature always regarded them inconsequential and harmless, as long as they stayed out of the way, which they did.

Now you find Mabus taking on the county supervisors - the sacred cows of Mississippi's political system and other local patriarchs and making them live by the law for the

This program will provide teachers for economically disadvantaged students who cannot afford summer school fees. Classes will be offered in English, Math and Computer Keyboarding.

Participants may be in-school students, out-of-school students studying for the GED, and dropouts interested in keyboarding. The age range will be 14-21.

I want to remind those interested in bus driver positions to enroll in one of the bus driver schools this summer. Although we have only a few openings and will not be able to place everyone immediately, those interested should attend the school in order to be qualified when openings are available.

Drivers who already have a certificate may attend one day on either June 7, 8, July 16 or 17. A two-day school will be offered for new drivers tentatively August 2 and 3. These sessions will be at the Prentiss County Vocational-Technical School.

Next year the county district will be adding second grade teacher assistants in our schools. Anyone interested in being a teacher assistant shall be administered a

state required examination on June 15 at 9:00 a.m. at the Prentiss County Vocational-Technical School. Applicants must have a high school diploma or GED certificate and should bring a copy to the testing.



The other day a friend and I went to lunch. Both of us are diabetics. And, when we got to the restaurant, almost the only thing really suitable for us to eat was a salad.

The place had a buffet serving line. And there was a meat choice for us -- roast beef, baked chicken and salisbury steak. But all the vegetables were high starch -- potatoes, corn, beans, that sort of thing.

This is a common problem, one I run into quite often. Approximately 5,000,000 Americans have diabetes. Some, like me, are lucky and can control their condition with diet maintenance and exercise. Others can get by with oral medication. Some must give themselves insulin injections. Still others, like my friend, use a

combination of all these methods. Most of us live normal, active lives. For example, some well-known diabetics include Dan Rowan, Mary Tyler Moore, Jimmy Cagney and the late Jack Benny. And Burt Reynolds

suffers from the opposite condition, hypoglycemia or chronic low blood sugar.

In addition to deleting sugar from their diets, diabetics must also limit their intake of starchy foods that the body converts to sugar, such as breads, crackers and high starch vegetables.

They must limit the amount of fried foods they eat. And, if, like me, they control their condition with diet maintenance, they have a daily calory limit, which means they even have to cut down on things like steaks (The hardest part for me).

My calory limit varies between 1500 and 1800 calories a day, depending on how much physical labor I perform, whether I have time to walk a mile, two or three and whether I have any pounds to lose.

I should weigh between 145 and 150. I managed to get down to 148 before I quit smoking, then I quickly regained 10 pounds. So lately I have been weighing in at about 158 and I need to lose some of that.

This means sticking to 1500 calories and exercising, which for me means walking a lot because diabetics who have weak ankles or knees shouldn't run and I have torn the ligaments in both ankles and messed up both knees when I was younger.

When I can eat at home, staying at or under

1500 calories is no problem. Sara is an excellent amateur diectician. But, when I have to eat out it gets difficult. And I have to eat out quite often.

Most fast-food places are automatically out because all but one hamburger chain grills the hamburgers and all the chicken places bread or deep-fry their chicken. And, obviously, the average pizza contains my entire daily calorie

Restaurants with buffets invariably have things like fried chicken or chicken-fried steak with vegetables like corn, beans, fried okra and potatoes.

I have even been in restaurants that did not provide artificial sweetener for your coffee or

So, you see how difficult it can be. If we were in wheelchairs many businesses would have provisions for us. But diabetes is not such an obvious handicap and people tend to forget how many of us have it.

I'm not suggesting any campaigns like the one for ramps and such or boycotts. I just ask that restaurant owners occassionally remember that we like to eat out, too, and include a few things on their menus that we can eat.

Thanks...from all of us.

shotgun at their feet, Tucker said. 'An autopsy showed that the two pellets from the shotgun shell apparently ricocheted off the hood of the truck since there were metal or lead fragments on the pellets," Tucker said.

"One pellet that struck Eaton severed an artery near his heart. He bled to death within minutes after being hit. The other pellet went into his back," Tucker said.

Although this investigation shows the shooting to be accidential, Tucker said this report will be turned over to District Attorney Kenneth Coleman and Tippah County Shreriff Leroy Meeks.

The person with Eaton escaped. He had not been apprehended as of Tuesday.

"We think we know who he is," Tucker said, "but we still have not positively identified him. But we do expect to make an arrest."

Deputy Bowen has been placed on administrative leave, with pay, pending the outcome of the investigation of the incident.

Winter Brings Senate Campaign To Northeast Mississippi Area

Former Mississippi Governor William Winter made a brief stop in Booneville last Thursday after making a campaign speech before the combined membership of the Corinth Rotary and Civitan Clubs.

"Every single governor I know understands something is wrong in the management of the federal fiscal system," Winter said. "I was in a position three years in a row to find budget projections were optomistic. But we didn't collect what we thought we would."

Winter predicted that if a solution

is not found soon, the country will return to "the most unprecedented inflation we've ever seen.

"Our system will go down the tubes unless we come up with the discipline and plain old guts to say we won't tolerate this deficit spending anymore," he said.

County Agent's Notes

By CLIFFORD J. HAMPTON County Agent

There have been many questions concerning insects and disease on fruit trees this season in Prentiss County.

Disease and insect control is necessary to produce good quality apples and pears. The success of a spray program depends on factors such as using proper pesticides in the correct concentrations, proper timing of applications, and thorough coverage.

You should apply sprays as mists of fine droplets at adequate pressure to cover twigs, leaves, blossoms, and fruit completely. Be careful in applying pesticides, and follow all manufacturers' recommendations and suggestions.

Various cultural and sanitation practices can greatly improve the control of apples and pear diseases. Plant only varieties adapted to your area (see MCES Publication 966) and maintain good plant vigor by applying fertilizers based on soil test recommendations.

Prune trees properly to permit light and spray penetration throughout the tree. Prune and remove all dead and diseased branches. Remove fruit remaining on the tree and on the ground after the final harvest. Keep weeds away from the tree trunk. These

sanitation practices will greatly reduce the overwintering sites of many insects, fungi, and bacteria.

Wooly Apple Aphid

The wooly apple aphid is the most destructive species of aphids attaching apple trees. It does considerable damage to the foliage, but the major damage is in the root zone. Parasites may reduce the aphid population.

Spray Schedule

Spray - Dormant - After leaves drop in fall and before buds swell in spring; Material and Amount Per Gallon, 21/2 cups liquid lime sulfur

or oil emulsion according to manufacturer's directions. Spray -Pre-Pink -- First pink color of flower buds; Material and Amount Per Gallon, 34 to 2 Tbs. captan 50 percent WP alone or in combination with 1/4 Tbs. benomyl 50 percent WP. Use the higher rates when captan 50 percent WP or maneb 80 percent WP are used alone. Spray -Pink -- Just before blossoms open: Material and Amount Per Gallon: Same as pre-pink. Spray - Petal fall

- 90 percent of flower petals off; Material and Amount Per Gallon, Same materials as pre-pink plus 3 Tbs. methoxychlor 50 percent WP plus 1 Tbs. malathion 57 percent EC. Spray -- 10-14 days after petal fall and at least 14-21 day intervals thereafter until 7 days before harvest; Material and Amount Per Gallon: Same materials as petal fall. Observe all precautions and directions on manufacturer's

- One-third -11/2 Tbs. maneb. 80 percent WP can be substituted for captan 50 Percent WP for use on apples, especially when cedarapple rust is a problem, but do not apply maneb 80 percent WP within 30 days of harvest. Benomyl 50 percent WP should be applied in combination with another fungicide on apples, but can be applied alone on pears. Request Plant Disease Dispatch M-110 in control of fire

Benomyl 50 percent WP can induce russetting on the fruit surface with applied during the hot summer days. Malathion may cause fruit? injury to McIntosh and Courtland varieties if applied within four weeks to harvest.

Soil Conservation News

On the average, Mississippi calf producers are producing only 89 pounds of beef per acre of pasture. The potential beef production per acre of pasture in Mississippi is 350 to 400 pounds.

One of the major causes of this low production is poor pasture management. Lets look at a few management practices that could improve our production.

species and the soils on which these species are planted can help to increase production. For example, Bahiagrass will perform well on sandy and silt loam soils. Bermudagrass will perform well on most all soils. Tall fescue will perform well on slightly sloping to gently sloping soil, but will not perform well on thin droughty soils or soil that remain wet most of the

Fertilizer and lime should be applied on the basis of a soil test. If a soil test has not been made, a good

of actual nitrogen per acre in two split applications and 60 pounds of phosphate and potassium per acre.

If the forage stand consist of at least 40 percent clover, the spring application of nitrogen may be omitted. Lime should also be applied on most pastures at the rate of one ton per acre every 3 years. Proper liming will provide an adequate pH and make other plant nutrients more available to the

Weed control will also help improve forage yields. Cattle will not graze weeds, yet the weeds will use as much or more moisture and


nutrients as will the forage plants. Weeds should be controlled as early as possible by the use of the proper herbicide or by clipping.

Rotational grazing will also provide more and better forage by forcing cattle to graze evenly. Rotational grazing also permits grazing of the forage when it is in its most nutritional stage.

These four management practices: Proper Species and Site Selection, Fertilization and Liming, Weed Control, and Rotational Grazing will more than double your forage production, allowing you to double your stocking rates, while at the same time provide better

The proper selection of forage rule of thumb, is to apply 120 pounds Home Economist's Notes

Extension Home Economics recently sponsored a food preservation workshop at the County Extension Office.

Mrs. Melissa Mixon, Extension Food Preservation Specialist presented the information. She discussed the importance of using proper canning techniques, canning methods and drying foods.

Mrs. Mixon also discussed the food preservation update and the newest USDA recommendations for canning applesauce, tomatoes, pumpkin and winter squash. This information follows.

Food Preservation Update

- If a processing time, either in a boiling water bath or a pressure canner, is less than 15 minutes, the jars should be sterilized for 15 minutes and then in the hot water until ready to fill. Then remove the jars one at a time, fill and seal before removing the next jar.

- Pickles should be processed in a boiling water bath for 10 minutes. Begin timing when the water boils.

-- The one-piece threaded zinc cap with its porcelain liner manufactured by Ball Corporation is no longer being manufactured as of 1982. Therefore, if there are any of these lids still around you may want to question their use because the shelf life of the rubber ring (when stored under ideal conditions) is about three years.

-- When mold covers the top of a jar of jelly, we should no longer recommend removing the mold and 1/4 inch of the jelly underneath the mold and then eating the remainder of the jelly. Research now shows that these molds are capable of producing substances called mycotoxins and some of them can be harmful. Molds also feed off the acid present in the food, thereby lowering the acidity of the product (raising the pH or making the food a weak acid food).

Because of the threat that molds pose we are strongly discouraging the use of paraffin as a means to seal jelly for the following reasins:

1. Molds produce mycotoxins that may be harmful.

2. With the variations in temperature and humidity in our section of the country, we can't be assured of a good seal with paraffin because the paraffin is expanding and contracting with temperature

3. When using paraffin as a means of sealing the jelly, the jelly is processed by the open kettle method of canning. This is no longer recommended because the dust and airborne spoilers that the jars, food and kitchen utensils come in contact with during the filling of the jars are not destroyed by further processing in a boiling water bath or pressure canner and are potential spoilers.

4. Many homemakers when using paraffin re-use old paraffin or use dusty paraffin. This is a potential for spoilage because of the impurities in the wax.

- Research now shows that alum used in pickles may make them crisper initially but after about three months the alum actually has a reverse reaction and makes the pickles soften.

New USDA Recommendations for Applesauce, Tomatoes Pumpkin and Winter

Applesauce - pint and quart jars and No. 2 and No. 21/2 cans, 20 minutes in a boiling water bath at 212 degrees F; fruit purees - pint and quart jars and No. 2 cans and 2½ cans, 20 minutes in a boiling water bath at 212 degrees. This is 10 minutes longer than was suggested

Hot Pack Tomatoes - pint jars and No. 2 cans, 35 minutes, and quart jars and No. 21/2 cans, 45 minutes in a boiling water bath at 212 degrees. Previously, the suggested time was 10 minutes. The raw pack method of preserving tomatoes no longer is recommended until additional research can be completed.

Tomato Juice - pint and quart jars and No. 2 and No. 21/2 cans, 35 minutes in a boiling water bath at 212 degrees, up from 10 minutes for jars and 15 minutes for cans.

Pumpkin -- Strained pumpkin no longer is recommended to be canned. It is suggested that pumpkin be cubed and canned in a

pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure, 240 degrees, pint jars 55 minutes, quart jars 90 minutes, No. 2 cans 50 minutes, and No. 21/2 cans 75 minutes. If strained pumpkin is required, it is suggested that the pumpkin be preserved by freezing.

Winter Squash - Follow the same procedure as for pumpkin.

With the busy food preservation season approaching you need to make certain your pressure canner is up to standard. Bring your pressure canner by the Prentiss County Extension Office, 404 East Church St., for testing. Label the canner with your name, address, and phone number. 

Tips in Selecting a Camera

With so many cameras on the market, it is difficult to decide which model to buy. Before you buy an expensive 35 mm camera or even an instamatic camera, think about how you plan to use it.

There is no "all purpose" camera. The various types, makes and models have features that make one more useful than another for a specific kind of work.

Before selecting a camera, youth ehrolled in the 4-H photography project remind you to ask yourself these questions:

- What will be the principal use of the camera? Do you need pictures for the newspaper? Do you plan to make color slide sets? Do you need close-ups such as of insects or plant parts? Will you be taking many pictures indoors?

-- In what price range must you

- Do you have a budget for film and other operating costs?

-- Will you need any accessories that are not built into your camera like a flash attachment or electronic flash unit, supplementary lens, extension tubes or an exposure outside in the dust, a leather case or a gadget bag is recommended.

-- How many people will use the camera? If more than one person will use it, you may be interested in a dial that shows the kind and speed of film in the camera. You also should select more simple and durable equipment if several people will be sharing it.

Remember simple cameras offer you more and more each year for the relatively low price but closeups and other special effects are not possible.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION, REMOVAL, AND DISPOSAL OF REFUSE, GARBAGE, TRASH. AND WASTE WITHIN THE CITY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF BOONEVILLE, MISSISSIPPI SECTION 1. This Ordinance shall

be known as the "Garbage Collection, Removal, and Disposal Ordinance" of the City of Booneville, Mississippi. SECTION 2. As used in this

have the following meanings:

(a) GARBAGE. "Garbage" shall include and mean all accumulations of animal, fruit, or vegetable matte that attends the preparation, use cooking, and dealing in, or storage of meats, fish, fowl, fruits, vegetables, and other matter of any nature whatsoever which is subject to decay, putrefaction, and the generation of noxious and offensive gases or odors, or which, during and after decay, may serve as breeding or feeding material for flies and-o other germ-carrying insects, bot ties, cans, or other food containers which, due to their ability to retain water, may serve as a breeding place for mosquitos or other water-

breeding insects.
(b) TRASH. "Trash," unless specifically provided to the con-trary, shall include and mean all household trash, and garden and trimmings, hedge trimmings, leaves, grass, and weeds, wh and customarily originate The term "trash" as used in this rubbish, and refuse resulting from the construction, remodeling or demolition of buildings, or other

(c) BUSINESS, COMMERCIAL, AND INDUSTRIAL WASTE. "Business, Commercial, and Industrial Waste" shall mean any and all accumulation of non refuse, debris, rubbish, trash, and waste products generated by the operation of and which is usually and customarily commercial, or industrial establish-

(d) HAZARDOUS WASTE "Hazardous Waste" shall mean waste that are considered to be pathological, explosive, radiological, or toxic characteristics, or any materials that the Mississippi State Health Department determines to be hazardous

(e) RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMER. "Residential Customer" shall mean anyone residing in a dwelling unit such as a home or multi-family dwelling of eight or less units, no including hotels or motels which require service for solid waste

(f) BUSINESS, COMMERCIAL OR INDUSTRIAL ESTABLISH-Industrial Establishments" shall than residential customers, as commercial, industrial, multifamily apartment unit (meaning more than eight units), church, buildings, and facilities.

(g) CONTRACTOR. "Contractor" shall mean the individual, partnership, or corporation who would agree to perform the work and-o services or to furnish materials or equipment or both required by this Ordinance and pursuant to the terms and conditions of a contract between said Contractor and the City acting through the Mayor and Board of

(h) CONTRACT HAULERS. 'Contract Haulers" shall mean any private person, partnership, or corporation, other than a public body, which is in the business of contracting with business, com-mercial, or industrial establishments for the collection, removal, and disposal of business, com-mercial, and industrial wastes.

SECTION 3. All residential customers and all business, commercial, or industrial establishresponsible for picking up and placing in approved containers, or at curb side, as defined herein any and all garbage, refuse, trash, and other waste material which may accustomers or establishments. All such customers and establishments shall be held responsible for the

SECTION 4. The Contractor, as defined herein, shall within the corporate limits of the City furnish r, vehicles, and materials to collect and to dispose of all garbage contained in containers and all household garbage, rubbish, yard trash, and tree trimmings collected and placed at the curb in accordance with this Ordinance. SECTION 5. All residential customers shall cause the residential waste to be placed within five (5) feet of the street curb line and said waste shall not be behind a struction so that it is not accessible by employees of the Contractor, with the exception of those residential disability, certified by a doctor and approved by the Mayor, are unable to carry the approved containers to garbage for these persons shall be regular rates. It shall be the duty of trimmings, shrubbery, shrubbery trimmings, hedge c tings, and the like, to cut the same in lengths not to exceed five (5) feet, limbs bundles, and place same within five (5) feet of the travelled portion of the street or sidewalk in a niform and even manner, and at the same time as provided for garbage collection for residential customers above, in order that same may be conveniently handled by employees of Contractor. Leaves, grass clippings, hedge, and shrubbery clippings must be containerized, maximum weight of 75 tractor may refuse to remove any the manner required herein. It shall be unlawful for such trash to be placed in side-drain ditches, gutters, or the travelled portion of the City approved method as defined

and quantity to be approved by the City or the Contractor. SECTION 7. There shall be no

obligation on the part of the City or the Contractor to clean up or pick up trash, refuse, or debris resulting from the construction, remodeling, or demolition of buildings or other structures. It shall be the duty and responsibility of all customers and establishments to see that construction contractors, builders, and odelers, tree trimming tractors, tree surgeons, land-scapers, and the like remove all of the rubbish, trimmings, and trash resulting from their operations on the premises during the course of their operation and immediately following same so as to leave the premises free and clear of such rubbish, trimmings, and debris.

SECTION 8. No residential customer shall utilize any business, commercial, or industrial establishment container unless the same shall have been previously authorized by the business, com-mercial, and industrial establishment, the City, or by a contract hauler which shall from time to time have a contract with said business, commercial, or industrial establishment to handle commercial trash SECTION 9. All business, com-

mercial, or industrial estab ments shall be responsible for the collection, disposal, and removal their own waste material by con-tracting or otherwise agreeing with an approved contract hauler for said collection, disposal, and removal. It shall be the duty of all confract haulers through the business, commercial, or industrial establishment served, to apply for and receive from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen a permit for the doing of such collection, disposal, and removal within the City. Such permit shall be granted only on an application in such form as may be required by the City and when said contract hauler has complied with the below prescribed conditions, and future. Said permit application shall provide the following:
(a) Contract hauler's name and

(c) Proof of liability insurance issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of Mississippi in the Minimum amount one person in one accident, \$20,000 person in any one accident, and 10,000 property damage. (d) Such other and further

oformation as the City may require.
SECTION 10. No persons, partnerships, or corporation except as otherwise provided herein, will be permitted to use the City streets of the City of Booneville, for the pur pose of transporting, havling, or in any manner disposing of garbage, trash, and waste matter except the City, the Contractor, any authorized tract hauler, any other public body, or any residential customer or private business, commercial, or industrial establishment disposing

of waste from their own premises. SECTION 11. The cost, fees, or charges for the collection, removal, mercial, and industrial wastes shall hauler(s) and the business, commercial, or industrial establishment(s). Prior to the doing of any business within the City, all contract haulers, to be approved, shall pay a franchise fee to the City for said

SECTION 12. Contract haulers and industrial waste collection at least once per week. SECTION 13. It shall be the duty of

each business, commercial, or in-dustrial establishment generating over 11/2 c.y. of waste per week to provide a suitable waste container of not less than two (2) cubic yards for its own use; the location of said containers shall be at street level and at such locations as may be determined and approved by the City and at such locations as so designated and agreed to by the contract hauler. No person other than the owner or person lawfully in control of any premises, or any authorized contract hauler shall interfere in any manner with a container used for the accumulation for handling of garbage, rubbish, or waste, or remove any such contained from the location where it shall have persons, nor shall any such person remove the contents from any such

SECTION 14. All business, commercial, and industrial establishments, all contract haulers, proper containers, covers, or procedures are provided to prev pilling, dripping, or blowing of all materials being transported on the uniwaful for any such establishment, hauler, or Contractor to allow any such refuse or waste to fall upon any street in the City without promptly and completely removing

SECTION 15. It shall further be the duty of each business, com-mercial, or industrial establishment to maintain each container and the area surrounding same, in a clean

business, commercial, or industrial wastes shall be disposed of by the Contractor or by an authorized County landfill facility or such other City, in its discretion. It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose or or cause to be disposed of any garbage, trash, or other waste materials upon any property other sanitary landfill.

Proof shall consist of a signed statement from reflecting that said person, firm, or corporation is depositing its garbage there. The garbage and trash charges and fees provided herein are levied against all residential customers including all occupants, tenants, or lessees using any building, house, or structure in the City. Fishing Roundup

Bream Busily Biting At Bay Springs

By SCOTT McKINNEY **Sports Writer**

The bream at Bay Springs Lake have really been biting lately, making for an excellent week of fishing.

Numerous reports show that many fishermen have caught over 100 ish in one day. Last weekend, over 1,000 bream were caught at Bay Springs. And, according to area anglers, this weekend will be another great fishing weekend at the lake.

Area semi-professional fisherman Danny Comer of Baldwyn said that he bream will continue to bite throughout the next few weeks. "The bream are biting mostly crickets, red worms, and popping bugs at Bay Springs," Comer said. "Also, the best place to fish for bream at the lake

WEATHER REPORT -- A cold front moved through North Mississippi earlier this week, causing the temperature to drop 20-25 degrees. However, this temperature change should not affect the fishing.

"Although the temperature has dropped so much so soon, the fish will still bite." Comer said. "The change will cause the fish to move to a different location in the lake to feed.'

According to Comer, the bass that have been in the 7-15 foot area will now move to shallow water to feed. Also, the other types of fish will move into shallow water while the weather is unstable.

OUTLOOK -- The bass have almost completely quit biting at Bay Springs. However, they are still biting very well at Sardis and at the Auburn Watershed on the Elvis Presley Lake in Tupelo.

The best bait for bass at these lakes are worms and three inch bagleys palsa bees according to Comer. Also, the best areas on these lakes are in the seven foot areas around the ledges.

The bream will again be the hottest biting fish for the week. Bay Springs will continue to be the hot spot for bream.

QUESTIONS - One reader wrote in with the following question; What produces the best results, bank or boat fishing?'

According to Comer, boat fishing usually produces the best results. With a boat, you can get just about anywhere on the lake." Comer said. 'However, when you bank fish, you can't always get where you want.''

Another question was concerning the use of pesticides in area fields and the draining of the chemical into area lakes. Comer said that although the mercury level of the fish was very high seven or eight years ago, no confirmed reports show that the fish that are being caught in this area are poisoned.

"A lot of people are concerned about that particular problem in this area, especially in the watersheds." Comer said. "However, we are not really sure about the actual level of chemicals in these lakes. Nothing should worry our area fishermen at the present time, because the fish are still safe to eat."

TOURNAMENT UPDATE -- Craig Robinson, a 28-year-old Memphis railroad man, won the St. Jude Bass Classic at Sardis last weekend. Robinson had a winning total of ten fish weighing 27.99 pounds on the computer scales.

Robinson, fifth in the event the past two years, boated some 20 miles upstream and fished the points and outside bends of the Tallahatchie River with plastic worms and crank baits.

Robinson outfished 355 other anglers, including the runnerup, Dana Sulcer of Marion, Ark., who had 20.37 pounds. Third place went to Charlie Johnson of Corinth, who used the tournament's biggest bass, a 7.13 pound large mouth bass, to post a ten fish total of 20.35.

FISHING TIP -- This week's fishing tip comes from semi-pro Comer of Baldwyn. "I recommend that if you plan to do any fishing this weekend, fish for bream at Bay Springs." Comer said. "Also, for all the fishermen who will be bass fishing, make sure to carry red worms along as bait. You should get some great results this weekend, wherever you

Health Care Available For Ex-POWs Now

The Veterans Administration is reminding former prisoners of war that a law enacted in 1981 broadened the agency's authority to provide health care for ex-POWs and liberalized rules for determining whether compensation can be paid for certain medical conditions.

Residuals of certain conditions suffered in prisoner-of-war camps are presumed to be related to the POW experience. A former POW who is not disabled by one of these conditions may qualify under the law for VA disability payments without the need for additional proof. It will be presumed, in the cases of former POWs, that the conditions originated in, or were aggravated by, military service.

A recent law added dysthymic disorder (depressive neurosis) to a list of such diseases which already included chronic dysentery, helminthiasis, nutritional deficiency (such as beriberi, pellagra), psychosis, and any of the anxiety states including post traumatic stress disorder.

Any former POW who was detained or interned for 30 days or more, and who became disabled by one of these conditions at any time after his military service, will be presumed to have incurred the condition during his military service unless there is evidence of some other cause.

VA Regional Office Director, Charles Wickes urges all former POWs to contact the VA to 100 W. Capitol Street, Jackson, or call 1-800-682-5270 toll-free. Veterans in the Jackson area should call 960-4873. Information on disability compensation and other benefits, including medical and dental care, will be provided along with assistance in applying.

Adult Courses On ETV This Summer

Mississippi ETV's summer session for adult learning begins this year on Monday, June 4, with three courses: Making It Count, a college credit introduction to data processing; English Composition I, a college credit English course; and The GED-TV Series, a course to help viewers prepare to take the General Educational Development test.

Making It Count will feature lessons each week: at 7 a.m., Mondays through Thursdays, with rebroadcasts at 3:30 p.m., Mondays through Thursdays, and from 1 to 3 p.m., Saturdays.

The programs in this series present a broad overview of data processing concepts and problems. Fundamentals of hardware and software, programming languages and programming logic also are covered.

Five lessons from English Composition I can be seen each week on ETV: at 7:30 a.m., Mondays through Fridays. Rebroadcasts will be presented at 2 p.m., Mondays through Fridays.

This series provides instruction that will enable the student to improve his or her writing. The course involves analyzing sentence and paragraph structure, looking up words to check spellings and meanings, limiting the subject for a paper and discriminating between appropriate and inappropriate styles.

The GED TV Series will present four lessons each week: at noon, Mondays through Thursdays, with repeats from 3 to 5 p.m., Saturdays.

The series is designed to help those persons who never finished high school to brush up on the English, math and reading skills covered on the General Educational Development Test.

Some water heater cycling switches manufactured for TVA and installed under TVA's Cycle and Save Program could fail and will be replaced, TVA announced recently.

"We're tracing the serial numbers of the potentially defective switches," said Robert C. Steffy Jr., TVA Deputy Manager of Power. "All affected consumers are being informed of possible problems with

the switches and our plans to replace them."

The malfunction associated with

The malfunction associated with the faulty switches may cause an electrical component to overheat and, in extreme cases, interrupt the circuit and shut off the consumer's hot water supply until the switch is replaced.

The malfunction could also cause the outer plastic box containing the cycling switch to overheat.

Although there have been no fires associated with the switches, it is conceivable that overheating could ignite any combustible materials touching the outer box.

"For this reason, we're asking all of our Cycle and Save consumers to follow common-sense safety precautions by making sure no combustible materials, such as newspapers or rags, are in contact with their cycling switch, or any other electrical equipment," Steffy said.

Consumers who have questions may call their local power distributor or TVA's Citizen Action Line for information. The toll-free Citizen Action Line number for residents in Mississippi is 1-800-251-9242.

About 35,000 consumers across the Tennessee Valley have received water heater cycling switches through the program and approximately 11,000 of the switches could be affected. To date, only about 240 switches have been found to be faulty. Switches used for airconditioner cycling are not affected.

VOT Students Need Jobs

Tax Credits Now Available For Area Summer Youth Employers

"Mr. employer, I want and need a job." This is the cry of the more than 65 students who have signed up for the Cooperative Business Program at the Prentiss County Vocational Technical School.

Its official name is Cooperative Vocational Office Training – the students call it just "VOT."

About half of them have jobs already, according to Mrs. Laura Cartwright, Coordinator of the Program. And, there are training stations that are available that have not been matched with students, but more training stations are needed for this many students.

When the program at the Prentiss County Vocational Technical School started in 1975, there were 20 students. As is evidenced by the above number, the program has not doubled, but tripled, Mrs. Cartwright said.

Some of these students are excellent typists, some are good on the cash register, they can operate the calculators, photocopiers, and a great many are proficient on the microcomputers. And they are all good on the telephone, she said.

In an effort to help improve the youth employment picture by giving employers an incentive to hire young people, the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 established qualified summer youth employees as a target group in the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit program.

A good number of the VOT signups for 1984-85 will qualify for the summer youth program under the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit program.

This tax credit can be a real money-saver for Prentiss County employers, Mrs. Cartwright noted. Through the program, an employer can get a tax credit of 85 percent on the first \$3000 paid to an eligible summer worker, which could amount to a savings of up to \$2250 for each eligible summer youth hired.

Under the program, a qualified summer youth employee is someone who starts to work after April 30, 1984, works any 90 consecutive day period between May 1 and Sept. 15, 1984, has not previously worked for the employers, and is certified by the Mississippi State Employment Service prior to starting work.
